Somehow she got in contact with my first grade teacher's daughter and had Mia Fritsche enroll her daughter, Patty with us. Mia could drive which my mother couldn't do so that was another plus.

Off we went in the afternoon for lessons two or three times a week to Marengo with that ice cold pool.

Those were the days of swim caps. Mother was determined my curly hair stay dry so she stuffed tissues under the edge of the already snug cap. (It didn't really work)

Patty and Kathryn breezed through the lessons. I, on the other hand, had this phobia about putting my head under water.

I'm sure that the "standing dive' was never well done either, but I never could understand the reason for it anyway. Then came diving off the board - no, thank you.

Okay, I tried it ONCE and my teacher had to dive in to rescue me, but by that time I had floated to the surface.

My father, the former sailor, was perhaps more determined then my mother so he got a STOCK TANK and filled it with water.

It didn't exactly fit our desire for an outdoor pool, but beggars can't be choosers.

So for one summer we had this oval stock and where we practiced our "American Crawl", "Dog Paddle", and "Scissor Kick" all the time I kept my head out of the water.

Finally my mother, who had worked hours with me pleading, bribing, whatever just reached in and held my head underwater.

I came out sputtering, telling her she could have killed me. My sister just sat and smirked - probably thinking it was about time.

Well I did go as far as "swimmers" and thus did not have to pass the test at Coe for swimming.

NEWS AND NOTES

German Sister Community Delegation Visits Amana; Meet Them Thursday or Sunday

A delegation of sixteen residents of Ronneburg, Hessen Germany will be in the Amana Colonies July 14 - 20. The community of Ronneburg surrounds the Ronneburg castle near Frankfurt, Germany.

A public reception to welcome the Ronneburg guests will be held at the Hotel Millwright courtyard on Sunday, July 17 from 2-4 p.m. Please stop by to meet our guests and see a special exhibit of illustrations by Ronneburger artist and chef, Reine Erdt, at Hotel Millwright. The exhibition of his work is part of a joint Amana-Ronneburg art project. The reception at Hotel Millwright courtyard is hosted by the Amana Society, Inc.

Thursday, July 14 from 5-7 p.m. the delegation will be the guests of the Amana Heritage Society at the Museum's free admission night – "Night at the Museum." Come say hello and see the entire museum, including their latest exhibits.

The Ronneburg visitors will be staying in the homes of local residents or at Hotel Millwright. Host families, the Amana Society and the Amana Heritage Society have arranged for activities for the group including a tour of the seven villages, a visit to the newly reopened Ruedy Communal kitchen with breakfast there, a tour of Amana farms, visits to a line dancing club and barbecue, local industrial plants, a wine pairing- appetizer workshop and more. Sunday they have been invited to attend the Amana Church.

Some of the delegation members including Reiner Erdt, Hanne Schneider and Elke Itt have visited the Amanas before, for others this will be their first time to the Amanas, explained Jon Childers, Amana Heritage Society, executive director.

The Amana connection to Ronneburg dates back to 1714 when members of the Community of True Inspiration, now called the Amana Church, gathered at and around the Ronneburg after the Prince of Ysenburg invited religious separatists to help repopulate his estates, decimated by years of civil conflict. The Prince had a more tolerant view of religious separatism than most and so E.L. Gruber and his family, J.F. Rock, Ursula Meyer and others came to the Ronneburg castle or rented houses in villages nearby. With the establishment of the first Inspirationist communities 1715 - 1725 they came to rent farms, factories and estates owned by the Prince in the villages surrounding the Ronneburg castle including a set of buildings at the Herrnhaag (Hill of the Brethren) once used by Ysenburg to house his military guard. By the mid 1800s the Amana people had a plan in place to emigrate to the United States in search of greater freedom of worship. However, several families elected to stay in the Ronneburg, Germany area rather than embracing the uncertainty of moving to a new land.

Letter writing kept everyone in contact for nearly 200 years. The letters were both personal and for business purposes as Amana maintained contact with the brethren in Germany to buy looms, textile dye and other specialty products from Germany.

Following World War II a number of the Amana men who had served in the US military sought out those former Inspirationists still living near the Ronneburg. Eventually making return visits in the 1960s, they helped established a new era of contact between the communities of Amana and Ronneburg. In the 1970s and 1980s visits between the communities increased. Social media has helped solidify the connection, enabling many to maintain almost daily contact.

If you visit Ronneburg, Germany, it's is just 45 minutes from the Frankfurt airport making it a wonderful location to spend the first or last day of your tour of Germany. The castle Ronneburg is host to frequent weekend family-oriented festivals and events. Beneath the castle is the Hotel Zur Krone where the Reiner Erdt family operates a regionally-acclaimed restaurant featuring culinary specialties of the German state of Hessen. Visit the nearby medieval walled town of Büdigen.

My sister and I would discuss who/whom we could save in case of drowning - Mom or Dad. (Lovely children!)



PURPLE MARTIN PROJECT - A FOLLOW UP

Last July, Dan Ray wrote an article about bringing back the Purple Martin population to Amana. Early this spring, Dan set up his 42 gourds, ready to welome in these birds that travel all the way from Brazil.

Unfortunately, Dan hasn't been able to enjoy these summer residents since he has been in the hospital for the past two months due to cardiac arrest and a subsequent heart transplant. His family is busy keeping tabs on the birds and documenting hatchlings for the Purple Martin Conservation Association.

Currently, the Rays have 30 nests in their gourds, bringing the total of adult Purple Martins to around 60. They track the nests every five days, and currently the count is up to 111 babies and 35 eggs. In a few weeks, these babies will fledge and head south to Brazil for the winter and will come back to the Lily Lake next spring, where Dan will be at home happily awaiting their arrival.

The Lily Lake flourishes with birds and other wildlife year-round, and the Rays have been documenting what they see on Instagram and would love for you to follow along @lilylakepurplemartins.

nounced last week that the Jingle GX Bike Race scheduled for August 5 - 7, has been cancelled due to challenges within the international bike racing group that would have sanctioned the competition.

As Jensen explained, they were not able to make it work this year, however race organizers have hopes of bringing the event here next summer.

As this was to be an internationally sanctioned event part of the GX Bike race (gravel extreme) bike racing circuit, organizers in Iowa City felt the race must be cancelled this year since it had not been promoted long enough on the international circuit for racers to make arrangements to come to lowa.

As Jingle Cross (Iowa City group) announced July, 6, "We regret to announce the Jingle GX Gravel Race weekend August 5-7, 2022 in Amana, Iowa, including the second US based round of the UCI Gravel World Series, has been cancelled. We had been very excited to be part of this inaugural UCI gravel world series, recognizing many challenges as a first year global event. We also respect the challenges our friends at the UCI had between COVID, world politics, inflation, and trying to launch a new sport and a new global series in the midst of all that. Among the many logistical challenges they had was finding a location and date for the new UCI Gravel World Championships. Unfortunately, this was only recently established 3 and a half weeks ago which shortened our timeline and ability to promote as a UCI World Championship qualifier because it had been unclear if and when a UCI world championship would occur. Therefore, after exhausting all possible options, we regret to announce we must cancel for this year. As a non-profit, we hope you understand our difficult situation and look forward to seeing you down the road. Thank you for your understanding."

Gravel bike racing is a fast-growing segment of the international bike racing scene and involves racers traversing gravel roads, unpaved dirt roads and tracks for up to hundreds of kilometers. Race lengths and difficulty of course varies, but this is, rugged, technical bike racing. MY AMANA SOCIETY EXPERIENCE

This week I'd like to stick close to home and talk a little about production at the Woolen Mill. I've been sewing and finishing for almost a year and a half now, and while I would not say I've completely mastered the process, thanks to the support and patience of my coworkers and supervisor, I'm moving forward with confidence every day.

The big news at the Mill is wool throws are back! We're producing approximately 120 to 150 blankets and throws every week and they are quite literally selling as fast as we can make them! There are four beautiful wool throws already at Warped and Woven, and many more on the way before fall. We're also making three new plaid cotton bed blankets in blue/natural, dark linen/natural, and black/ plum/natural that I would encourage everyone to check out. The rainbow Dorothy throw has already gone through several runs and continues to fly off the shelves. There is a charming red/natural/blue throw called Patriot. My personal favorite, however, is a cotton plum/natural houndstooth throw that is a striking color/pattern combination. There are always new throws and blankets on the website, but I would really recommend an in-person visit to Warped and Woven, just for the immediate gratification of being the first to be in-the-know.

There are so many community members who have worked in the Mill in its various forms throughout the years, it seems every person I meet has a connection. Sometimes at the end of the day when I turn out the lights, the looms are off, and the creel quietly waits for another day, I can imagine those workers still bustling around. And it's a very nice feeling to join them and take my small place in history.
