There are markets in the Carnegie, West End, Bridgeville and Mt. Lebanon. Contact your borough or local library to look for any others that may be near you. Buying fresh and local is well worth any extra effort getting there to shop.

Phipps' Conservatory is having the 87th annual May Market on May 12-13 and is free and open to the public. The market makes a great Mother's Day weekend addition and will feature gardening accessories, lawn decor, seasonal plants, handmade goods, fresh food items and much more! 


have ruined the rest of my day and maybe the entire weekend.


