FEEDING ON GOD

Prov. 9:1-6; Ps. 34:2-7; Eph. 5:15-20; John 6:51-58

Not too long ago, I had a discussion with a parishioner who told me that for him, "The Sacrament is like a Reserve Bank, it never runs out of funds." In the past three Sundays we have been reading the Gospel of John on the "Discourse on the Bread of Life," where Jesus has been saying to us: "I am the living bread...whoever eats this bread will live forever...the bread that I will give is My flesh for the life of the world." Even though the practice of feeding on flesh and blood was not alien to the Jews, on hearing these words of Jesus, they complained and quarreled among themselves, saying, "Is this not Jesus, the son of Joseph? Do we not know His father and mother...How can (He) give us His flesh to eat?" They could not understand why a human being would claim to be from God and how He could give them His body to eat, as if they were cannibals.

To many in our contemporary society, like some of the Jews, this is a very difficult passage to deal with: "How can one claim that Jesus is truly present in that piece of bread (Host)." The truth of the matter is that Jesus was basing His teaching on the people's religious belief. The idea of animal sacrifice was central to the Jewish faith and their neighboring nations. During the feast of sacrifice, although the whole animal was offered to the god, part of the flesh was given to the priests as their *perk*, and part to the worshippers to make a feast for themselves and their friends within the temple precincts. It was their belief that the god was present as a guest during the feast; and thus, it was believed that the god entered the flesh upon offering. Therefore, when the worshippers ate the flesh of the sacrificed animal; they were literally eating the god.

Thus, when Jesus tells us "...the bread that I will give is My flesh for the life of the world," He, in effect, is telling us that He is replacing the Jewish animal sacrifices with His precious body and blood. He is the true sacrificial Lamb. The "Lamb of God Who takes away the sins of the world!" Jesus asks us to eat His flesh and drink His blood because it is through this that we would experience His complete humanity. This means that it is in Jesus that we see God Who takes on human form, facing our human situation, struggling with our human problems, battling with our human temptations, and working out our human relationships. Just as food and drink nourish our bodies, so also the body and blood of Jesus, given mysteriously in bread and wine, nourishes and sanctifies our souls.

The Eucharist is the center of our worship! As Catholics it is our belief that the bread and wine, mysteriously transforms into the body and blood of Christ during the consecration at Mass. Jesus is physically present - body, soul and divinity in the Eucharist. Through the Eucharist and other sacraments, Jesus is truly present in His Church. He is present in the sacrifice of the Mass, not only in the person of the minister, but especially under the Eucharistic species. It is in the Eucharist that we encounter the real presence of Christ, where you and I touch Him - feel Him - receive Him and eat Him. Surely, the Eucharist is the "Reserve Bank" of our strength and courage to face the challenges of life - to endure and overcome the threat of separation and alienation - to be strong in the midst of adversity and to find comfort when confronted with rejection and loneliness. You must remember that "...unless you eat the flesh of the Son of Man and drink His blood, you do not have (strength and) life within you."





FEAST OF THE PATRON SAINT OF OUR PARISH, BARTHOLOMEW THE APOSTLE

AUGUST 24



In the New Testament, Bartholomew is mentioned only in the lists of the apostles. Some scholars identify him with Nathanael, a man of Cana in Galilee who was summoned to Jesus by Philip. Jesus paid him a great compliment: "Here is a true Israelite. There is no duplicity in him"

(John 1:47b). When Nathanael asked how Jesus knew him, Jesus said: "I saw you under the fig tree" (John 1:48b). Whatever amazing revelation this involved, it brought Nathanael to exclaim, "Rabbi, You are the Son of God; You are the King of Israel" (John 1:49b). But Jesus countered with, "Do you believe because I told you that I saw you under the fig tree? You will see greater things than this" (John 1:50b).

Nathanael did see greater things. He was one of those to whom Jesus appeared on the shore of the Sea of Tiberias after His resurrection (see John 21:1-14). They had been fishing all night without success. In the morning, they saw someone standing on the shore though no one knew it was Jesus. He told them to cast their net again, and they made so great a catch that they could not haul the net in. Then John cried out to Peter, "It is the Lord."

When they brought the boat to shore, they found a fire burning, with some fish laid on it and some bread. Jesus asked them to bring some of the fish they had caught, and invited them to come and eat their meal. John relates that although they knew it was Jesus, none of the apostles presumed to inquire who He was. This, John notes, was the third time Jesus appeared to the apostles.

COMMENT: Bartholomew or Nathanael? We are confronted again with the fact that we know almost nothing about most of the apostles. Yet the unknown ones were also foundation stones, the twelve pillars of the new Israel whose twelve tribes now encompass the whole earth. Their personalities were secondary (without thereby being demeaned) to their great office of bearing tradition from their firsthand experience, speaking in the name of Jesus, putting the Word made flesh into human words for the enlightenment of the world. Their holiness was not an introverted contemplation of their status before God.

The simple fact is that humanity is totally meaningless unless God is its total concern. Then humanity, made holy with God's own holiness, becomes the most precious creation of God.
