Once again one of our members brought to the clinic a well prepared program using a powerpoint visual presentation. The presenter was Dave Peterson and the topic was the Model A generator. We looked at it's construction and the special tools needed to test and overhaul one. Although there are items that may require rewinding and possibly the work may be beyond what most of the members may not want to or be able to do. What was pointed out is that for the most part the generator design is a very robust and simple design. After all these years of service it is the wear items like the bearings and brushes that take most of the abuse. Replacement, cleaning and lubrication can take care of a large amount of the owners problems. These repair tasks are usually within the skill level and tool ownership of most of the members. The adjustable brush feature of this unit was well explained since it's adjustment is critical to the longevity of your battery and the function of your lighting system.


We've recently come thru an election cycle that has made our citizens very aware of campaigns, slogans, promises and it has brought about a lot of opinions. Enough with the new so let's go back to the old. Pictured is an advertisement of a typical campaign item that was used by candidates in our Model A Era to get their name in front of the voters. What we have here is plate used for the re - election of The 22nd. Governor of Minnesota - Floyd B. Olson. This is just the forerunner of a bumper sticker before adhesives were perfected to create a bumper sticker that would stick. Come to think of it, our bumpers are a bit of big enough enou

narrow so they probably would not have been a big enough canvas for a man with as much vision, potential and accomplishments as Floyd B. Olson.

What did the man do? and how did he get to be our Governor serving from 1931 – 1936 ?. He has been considered as one of the greatest Governors of our state and was considered as one of the most influential politician of that time period. Floyd B. Olson grew up in North Minneapolis, in the poorer section surrounded by immigrant families that had yet achieved middle class American life. He attended North High School and after graduating he worked for a railroad in a labor position. He aspired to better things and after a year or so became a student at the University of Minnesota. He was somewhat of a rebel and disregarded the school's policy of wearing a hat while in class. He favored a derby and also refused to join in the required ROTC drills of the school. He left after a year, working his way thru Canada, Alaska and became a stevedore in Seattle Washington. Some think that his tenure as a stevedore kindled his interest in a populist political view point as he was a member of the Industrial Workers Of TheWorld which represented the stevedores. He came back to Minnesota in 1913. He went to law school at the Northwestern School of Law which later became William Mitchell College of Law. He worked for Hennepin County as an assistant attorney and eventually became the head attorney. A notable case involved the Ku Klux Klan in which death threats were made to him but he earned the citizens respect for his zeal in taking on the tough cases and the dis honest businessmen of this period. There was even a case he led against a hitman who was hired to dynamite a union leaders home. By 1930 the depression had it grip on the nation and the Farmer – Labor party saw a lot of promise in Floyd B. Olson and convinced him to run for Governor. He won in a landslide getting 59% of the vote. With his three terms as Governor he got the legislature to pass bills based on his vision that included a progressive income tax, a social security program for the elderly, guaranteed equal pay for women, a minimum wage bill, unemployment insurance and a collective bargaining law.

He dealt with the bloody 1934 truckers union strike in Minneapolis. This two-month strike resulted in 4000 National Guardsmen being called in and martial law being declared. The Governor had many accomplishments and like all administrations allegations were made against him about his honesty and his associates. These allegations were made by a local newspaper editor who was later gunned down and died. Kid Can a notable gangster of this era with a lot of influence in the city was charged with the crime but was not convicted of this particular crime. During his tenure as Governor the organized crime in Minnesota like most other states had a strong presence. Some of his critics felt he was too close to many of those involved in those activities. In November of 1935 Olson considered running for President of the United States as a third party candidate but decided to run for a U. S. Senate seat instead while still having some time to serve as Governor. In December of 1935 he was diagnosed with cancer and died in August of 1936 at the age of 44.

He had a very large public outpouring of mourners and was buried in a glass topped casket in Lakewood Cemetery. High Way 55 in Minneapolis from downtown going west was renamed Olson High Way shortly after his death and there is a large statue erected of him along this road.

I am not a liberal," Olson declared to the Farmer-Labor convention in 1934. "I am what I want to be-a radical."
