Let us claim that wonderful promise as we present ourselves humbly before God. Please join us for fellowship after the service.

Scripture Lessons for next Sunday: Exodus 32:1-20, 1 Thessalonians 4:13-18 and Matthew 24:15-28.

Stewardship: “With angels, archangels, and with all the company of heaven ...” When we gather around the altar of the Lord in His House we pray and praise God with “all the company of heaven.” Those we have lost in the Lord are not truly lost to us – they have simply entered their rest with the Lord. As we gather to worship our Lord, we gather along with them. On the Last Day everything that God has given into the care of our stewardship will fade away – everything except our brothers and sisters in Christ. Caring for one another in love and grace is our highest calling.

Communion Statement: As we learn from 1 Corinthians, when we commune together we make a confession of our oneness in doctrine and understanding of God’s Word. Since those who show publicly that they agree with the teachings believed, taught, and confessed by the Pastor and congregation at which the Sacrament is distributed, we ask that those who are not members in good standing of a congregation of the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod, or one of our sister churches to please refrain from partaking of the Sacrament. Instead, if you would like to receive a blessing, you are more than welcome to come to the altar rail and please indicate you would like to receive a blessing by crossing your arms in front of your chest. A list of church bodies with whom we share Altar and Pulpit fellowship is posted on the bulletin board in the hallway. If you would like to visit about this doctrine and practice, please talk to Pastor or an Elder. For further study on this matter see Matthew 5:23ff, 18:15-35, 26:26-39; Mark 14:22-24; Luke 22:19-20 and 1 Cor. 11:17-34. Thank you.

Sunday School Lesson: “God Provides Manna, Water, and Quail” is the Sunday School lesson for today. Just as God provided manna, water, and quail for the hungry and complaining Israelites to preserve them, in Christ, God feeds us with the manna of His Word and the water of forgiveness, satisfying our eternal hunger and quenching our eternal thirst. Consider discussing, “How does sin cause us to be lost and hungry and thirsty for what we cannot have?” Talk about Jesus, the bread of life and the living water, and how He satisfies our spiritual hunger and thirst.

The Proper Preface

The Preface does not only consist of the three responsive verses that were covered last time, but builds up to the Proper Preface. It gets its name because it is determined by the propers of that day, which are "proper" for the time that day falls on in the Church Year. For example, it would not be "proper" to use the Proper Preface appointed for Christmas at Easter. The function of the Proper Preface is multifold. First, it is a rationale of the third verse of the Preface: "It is right to give Him thanks and praise." It explains why it is right to give Him thanks and praise. It recalls what Christ has done for which we give thanks: "It is truly good, right, and salutary that we should at all times and in all places give thanks to You, holy Lord, almighty Father, everlasting God, through Jesus Christ, our Lord."

Second, it relates the moment in Christ's life that we are celebrating at any given time in the Church Year to His presence with us in His Holy Supper. One great example is the Proper Preface appointed for Christmas: "for in the mystery of the Word made flesh You have given us a new revelation of Your glory that, seeing You in the person of Your Son, we may know and love those things which are not seen." This speaks of the incarnation of Christ at His nativity, which was a visible presence among us. It is then our prayer to "know and love those things which are not seen" which includes His invisible incarnation of His body and blood in, with, and under the bread and wine.

Third, it reminds us that because Christ is physically present with us in the Sacrament on the altar, we are before our very Lord "with angels and archangels and with all the company of heaven." Heaven meets earth at the altar as we join in with all the saints in the marriage feast of the Lamb in His kingdom. We will therefore join in the song of heaven in the Sanctus to come next.
