PASTOR'S MESSAGE

~ Pastor Allegra Hoots ~

Active parents are one of the most valuable resources a community has. They are not activists or child advocates because they don't work to bring about political or social change. Instead, they fill the social gap in the lives of young children in their neighborhoods not covered by schools and other agencies. Such parents exist in every ethnic, economic, and social group in every city in America. The parents work without fanfare and with no expectation of acknowledgment. Usually, they have school-age children, and frequently their motivation stems from a desire to fill their child's or children's social needs.

Involved parents help neighborhood kids in multiple ways. Some start Scout troops, homework help groups, arrange playdates and organize block parties, picnics, and cookouts. They also provide a nurturing environment for children to engage in recreational sports. They coordinate trips to playgrounds, amusement parks, museums, and themed restaurants.

Parents living in relatively safe apartment buildings arrange, for the children who live in their building, to play in the hallways. Children bring their toys into the corridors and play school, house, and even church. Tiny children pedal their plastic tricycles and cars up and down the halls. Parents keep their doors ajar to keep a watchful eye on the children and to allow the children to run into the house to get water and use the bathroom. Typically, one or two parents provide treats for all the kids playing in the hallway. For the kids living in standalone houses with porches or yards, and swimming pools, their parents often coordinate similar activities.



Figure 1 Frick Park is the largest municipal park in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, covering 644 acres. It is one of Pittsburgh's four historic large parks and one I often visited as a young girl.

During the cold winter months, parents organize weekend sleepovers, trips to the movies and malls, the YW/YMCA on Saturday mornings, and skating rinks in the late afternoons and early evenings. They host game nights in their homes and tiny apartments. Weather permitting, they take a group of kids from the neighborhood to a local park, or the basketball court or soccer field when cleared of snow and ice.

In summer, when not in school or attending day camp, young children play on sidewalks near where they live or in nearby playgrounds under the watchful eyes of their parents. On sweltering days, adults in the community use garden hoses or water from a fire hydrant to keep kids cool and give them a chance to play in water, in place of going to a community swimming pool. During these outdoor romps, parents are closely watching out for the safety of all the children in the area. Parents provide snacks that they distribute to every child in the group.

HISTORY AND OVERVIEW OF UNITED PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH

Celebrating 195 Years!



The current building at 525 E. Front Street was erected and dedicated in 1952, as the *First Presbyterian Church* of Plainfield, NJ. In 1971, The United Presbyterian Church was created with the merger of First Presbyterian Church of Plainfield and Grant Avenue Presbyterian Church.

In 1825, thirty-five years before Plainfield was incorporated as a city, “The congregation of the ‘Church of Plainfield’ gathered on July 10th, for its first communion and dedicatory service. Eighteen charter members bowed in holy reverence, broke the bread and raised the cup as founders of the *The First Presbyterian Church of Plainfield*”.

A new *First Presbyterian Church* of Plainfield was built in 1855 as a simple white church, near the site of the present city hall. On June 6, 1888, the Session decided to call a Parish meeting for the purpose of building a **third new church** at 241 E. Front Street. Through much of the first half of the Twentieth Century, this church was a landmark in downtown Plainfield, and is the direct predecessor of today’s church.

In 1945, following the end of World War II, the lack of sufficient space and the accommodation of a large Bible School (near 1,000 attending) was a matter of great concern, and plans were prepared for the construction of additional classrooms, a new Chapel and for the redecoration of the sanctuary of the E. Front Street church. The sanctuary was remodeled, but for various reasons the construction phase was not immediately undertaken.

“A brand new, a truly adequate and beautiful temple, for the worship of God and for the instruction of our children has risen on a most attractive site for First Presbyterian Church” stated Rev. Krohn in 1952, of the new and present church on the former Meade estate at 525 E. Front St. It is a Church of Beauty; A Church of Worship; A Church of Fellowship; A Church of Instruction; A Church of Service; A Church of Opportunity. The Church, built in English Manor architectural style has the original bell from the first church, ornate stained glass from the third building, and unique features to meet the needs of the church and the Plainfield community, such as a large Sanctuary and Chapel, an auditorium with a stage, numerous classrooms and a commercial kitchen.

Grant Avenue’s history began when First Presbyterian initiated the formation of three churches!!

- Second Presbyterian (which later became Crescent Avenue Presbyterian) in 1844
- Warren Chapel (which later became Watchung Avenue Presbyterian) in 1864
- Hope Chapel (which later became Grant Avenue Presbyterian). So, in 1888 Hope Chapel is organized in the West End of Plainfield then these three important events led to the formation of Grant Avenue Presbyterian.
- 1893-- Control of Hope Chapel is transferred to Crescent Ave. Presbyterian Church
- 1917-- land is purchased and on February 22, 1927 the cornerstone is laid for the Grant Ave. Presbyterian Church
- First service at Grant Ave. Presbytery Church is held on June 6, 1927 & on April 22, 1930 Grant Ave. was recognized as a Church within the Presbytery of Elizabeth becoming independent of Crescent Ave

On July 1, 1971 the merger of First Presbyterian Church and Grant Avenue Presbyterian Church becomes official and The United Presbyterian Church of Plainfield is BORN!!!

The United Presbyterian Church is a community of sisters and brothers from diverse backgrounds, that seek to provide a place where all are welcome and will find their setting at the table! Come, and you will find an atmosphere. *Where God is exalted, Everyone Matters, and YOU belong!*

The Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) and the National Council of Presbyterian Men have a Covenant of Agreement. The Council was officially established in 1948 but can trace its beginnings to 1906-1907.

Following the merger of 1983 and a board meeting in April 1986, it was decided there would be a national equipping event for Synod, Presbytery, and Congregational representatives, followed by a major National Presbyterian Men's Assembly in May 1987.

God calls all of us to a Ministry, working for and with each other, in our families, in our workplace, in our communities, in the world, and, in the church. Recent studies, however, have shown that many men know very little of what the Bible says; yet, many express a desire to learn.

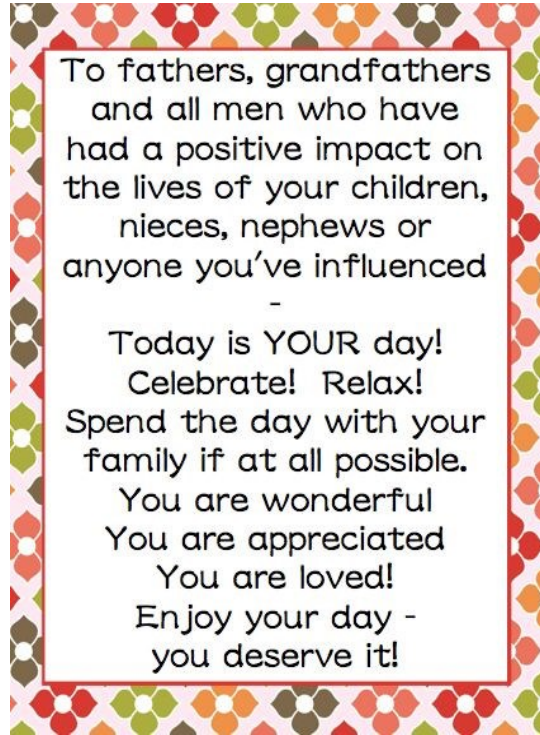

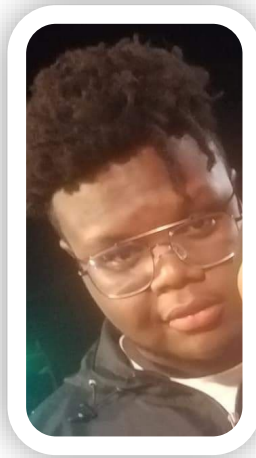

Feeding the Community

Meanwhile, we've joined a partnership with the Rotary Club of the Plainfields, the Plainfield YMCA, DuCret School of Art, and the First Tee and Plainfield Country Club to host a food drive and food packing and distribution project. Details are below.

In summary, we will get food from the Central Food Bank of New Jersey; it will be delivered in bulk to DuCret where we will have packaging events. The goal is to package a box with five-days food supply for delivery to specific locations for pickup as well as for drive-through pickups.

You can help with this project. There are multiple opportunities for social-distance packing, as well as for delivering to set locations, and some delivery to specific individual addresses. In other words, something for everyone. There will be two hour shifts so no one gets overworked.

Concerned parents, active in the lives of children in their communities, have always existed. When I lived and worked in Newark, New Jersey, as a public school teacher, many parents worked together to provide activities for the kids in the neighborhood. Without assistance from organizations, parents carved out safe spaces and coordinated fun activities for kids.

Most of the parents were single, working moms. They worked in the public school system, in local hospitals, for local and state governments, and in private industry. They were supervisors, bus drivers, nurses aides, hospital administrators, and customer service representatives in various sectors. When they were off from work, they took care of their household chores and worked to improve the quality of life for the children in their neighborhood.

Similarly, many years ago, when I was a young girl, growing up in Hawkins Village, a public housing complex in Rankin, a borough of Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, a neighbor was one of the active community parents. When we weren't in school, she frequently walked a group of children, including me, approximately three miles to Frick Park. She stayed in the park with us while we played for hours. Then she walked us home. The same woman often watched over us while we played in the playground near our house.

I don't remember much about the woman who chaperoned our trips to Frick Park or kept watch while we enjoyed the pleasure of frolicking around the playground. Recently, I thought of her and our trips to the park only because I was looking for an uplifting memory to share. But, having conjured those early childhood memories, I am overwhelmed with gratitude for the woman who served as a community chaperone to kids in my neighborhood, and I have a deeper appreciation for all active parents who work to improve life for kids in their areas.

God bless the parents in every town who sacrifice their time, energy, talents, and in some cases, money, to nurture the social development of children in their communities! Active parents look at needs and possibilities. Then they just **"Just Do It!"**

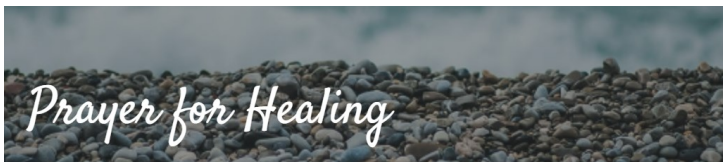
Give to the Flower Ministry

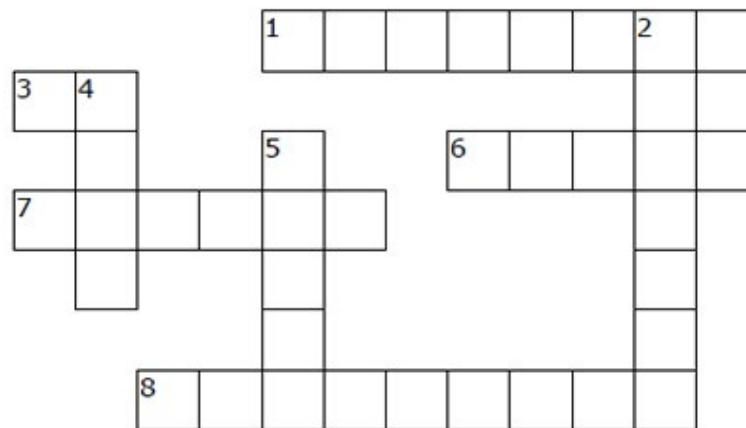

Special Pandemic Issue 2020 - AARP Bulletin – May 2020

Who gets sick and why an aging immune system can make you more vulnerable to disease. Covid-19 shows how important it is to keep yours strong.

Parts of the body where the immune system is affected: Liver and kidneys; blood vessels; gluts (muscles especially of the large muscles and butt); belly fat; brain; stomach; intestines; joints; bones.

Fortunately, we won't always be in a pandemic. But we can use this information to gain an understanding of how our immune system changes with age and how it may be possible to slow the decline and raise our immune reserves for the next time we get sick. Aging effect number one: Fewer immune cells - our body simply doesn't produce as many immune cells as we get older. Aging effects number 2: Rising inflammation - This refers to chronic low grade inflammation that develops with advanced age.

Exercise may be the most important lifestyle intervention you can add

How to save your immune system:

Movement; weight management; self knowledge-We gain a better understanding of where our health is right now. The more we can use digital devices and tools the more will understand if something changes because we're not just going to rush to the doctor ; **nutrition; calm** -Research has shown that unregulated stress can accelerate immune suppression. Stress causes a rise in inflammation selfcare in this area becomes critical. **Medications**-certain prescription medications may inhibit your immune system for example oral an inhaled corticosteroids use for arthritis allergies asthma etc be raise your risk of fungal infections.

COVID-19 lessons
