A Word from Rev. Jackson

If you ever go to the place where Jesus is supposed to have had breakfast with His disciples, you will find it to be a peaceful and calming location. It's a small beach which would be a perfect place for a gathering of close friends on the shore of Galilee. You can see right away why Jesus may have chosen this spot to reinstate Peter and recharge His disciples.

Jesus never tried make them feel guilty about what they did on Maundy Thursday evening. He could already see their hearts and knew they probably had a profound sense of guilt. Adding to it would benefit no one. Instead He asked: "Do you love Me?" When they responded "yes" three times, He told them "Feed my lambs"; "take care of my sheep"; and "feed my sheep". No guilt, just a commitment to love Jesus Christ and tell them what they needed to do from now on.

When Adam and Eve tasted the forbidden fruit, they hid out of guilt. The disciples ran away and went out to fish. God searched for Adam & Eve and Jesus found His disciples and gave them their fish. When we are sorry for our sins our Lord searches us out; not to condemn us, but to forgive us. We are prone to run away from the one who can forgive and restore us. Although they lost the garden, God did not give up on Adam and Eve. He still worked with them and helped them in their daily lives. Jesus still found redeeming value in His disciples and He still finds value in us.

There is an important lesson we can gather from this encounter on the quiet Galilean beach. In spite of our sin, we still have value to the Kingdom of God. It is Jesus who can redeem our lives and show us the mission ahead. We are not to carry around our guilt, but leave it at the cross and see what God can do with our talents and gifts.

In this post Easter season, may we turn to our Lord, be redeemed from our sins and be used by Him for his glory. Let us go forth as a resurrected people and act on the good news Jesus has put into our hearts. Be not afraid and move ahead in faith.

See you in church! Because He lives!

The Explorer will be ready to be filled to the roof. Please have your items on the stage at the church, ready to be delivered


We Remember

History Room:



Where does it begin and where does it end? This question has been asked many times over the decades, probably the correct answer is still in question.

But, Tatnuck is what we

are talking about.

Doing a bit of research in the history room, I came across a delightful article that dates back c.1948, pointing out the much debated question...where does Tatnuck begin and end. Even then it was anyone's opinion, including what became known as West Tatnuck. We know it had to end at the Paxton and Holden lines, but unsure where it started in relationship to West End Worcester and THE square.

In the late 30's and 40's it was generally thought that Tatnuck began at Lenox Street and continued to Whittaker (Tatnuck) Sqaure – but no solid basis for this theory. It was the fastest growing, and most attractive residential community in Worcester, even with the constraints of the war. It boasted three churches; Congregational, Episcopalian and Catholic. It soon added a Jewish synagogue with a home for the aged and a children's orphanage. When the little red brick school house was rebuilt on the present site of Tatnuck Magnet School, a fire house was built in its place.

Tatnuck's first library in 1839, had a membership that paid \$2.00 per share to belong. It was housed in the Levi Gates house opposite the Congregational Church on Pleasant Street. If more than one person wanted the same book, then lots were drawn to see who would check out the book first. Since then, the library has been located in the Tatnuck Magnet School, where Willard Tavern (the stagecoach stop for Paxton, Barre and Boston) stood.

The square at the time of the article had 4 gasoline stations, shops to fulfill the needs of the community, the churches, school, and fire station already mentioned.

A monument dedicated to the heroes of World War 1 is still part of the square, but the natural surroundings have evolved with time.

Pleasant Street westward was a one-lane road to the western highlands. Tory Fort Lane led to a ledge of rocks called Tory Fort. Tradition claims that the Revolutionary War Tories hid from the ire of the patriots on this natural fortification of sorts.

The beauty of the reservoirs, cascading falls, ponds and springs were home to wild turkeys, wild cats, gears and wolves. A bounty was offered for the rattlesnakes in the area, soon becoming a hunter's adventure.

From the Tatnuck Farmers Club Winter Outings, ice fishing on Cooks Pond, the story of the hermit that lived on Rattlesnake Hill (the Hermitage), to the many stories of the Nipmuc Indians that first settled the area – the stories of Tatnuck defy conventional "boundaries". Those of us that have fond memories of how it was, or have watched all the changes taking place, are proud of its history, even if the question of just where Tatnuck begins or ends will probably still be debated and not ever truly answered.
