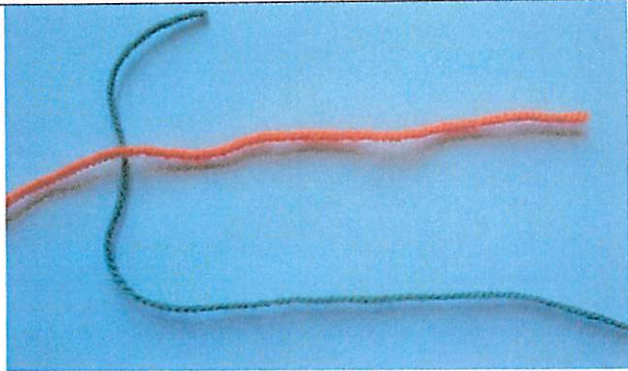
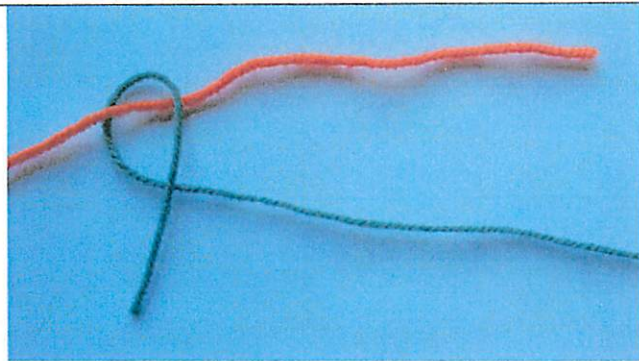


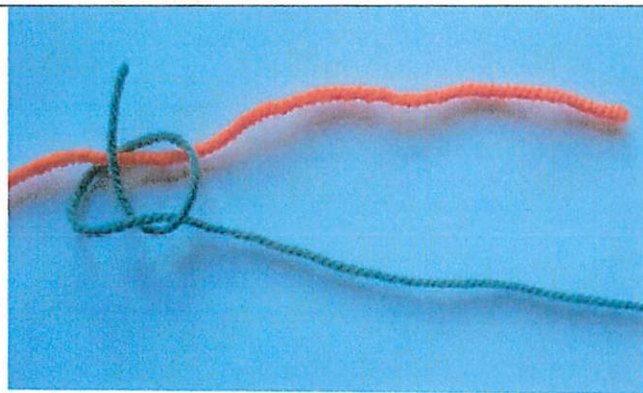
## Magic Knot



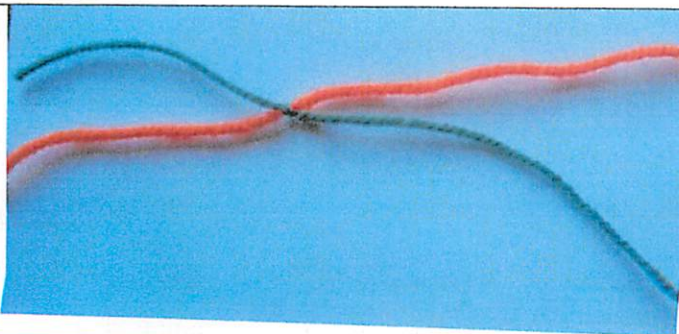
Start with one end, go under the other yarn.



Go over the top of both yarns.

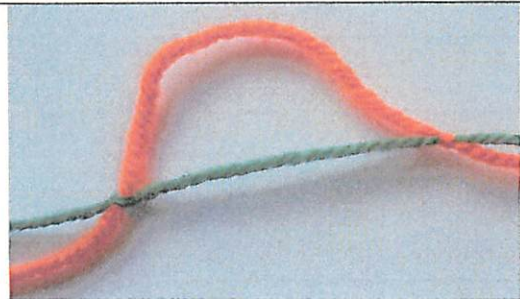
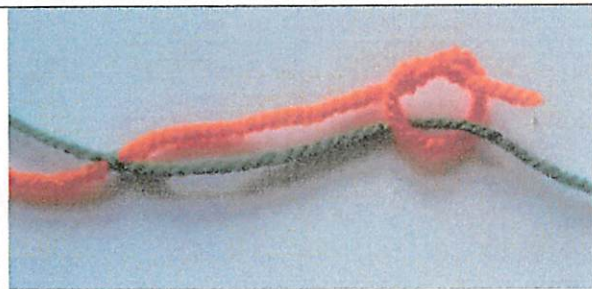
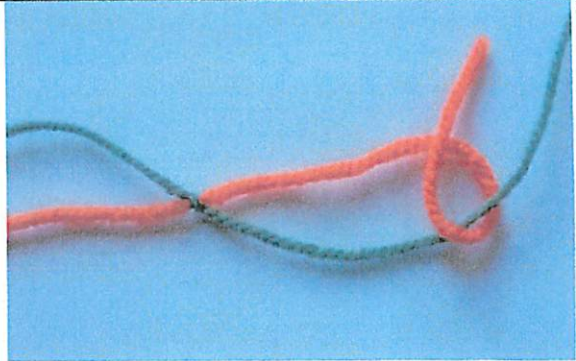
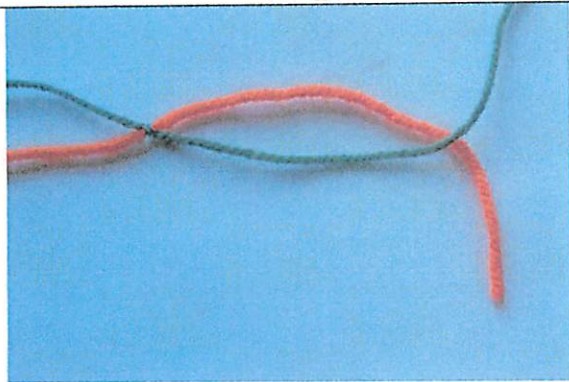


Come up through loop.

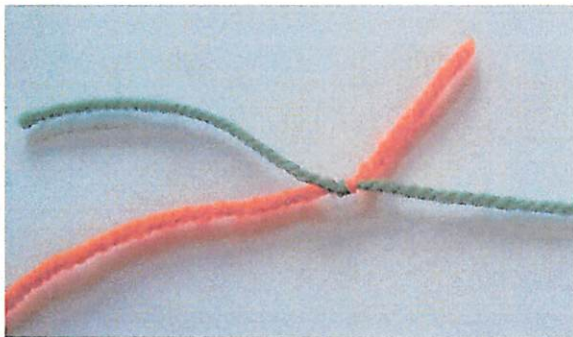


Pull ends to tighten knot.

Do the same process for the other yarn end (see below, follow left to right). End result will be two separate knots as shown in last picture.



To complete the knot, take each end and pull the knots so they are together, giving a fairly tight pull. (if they slip out, the original knot was not done correctly). Cut ends close to knot.



**The following is what WEBS has written up on their website and a link to their video:**

“If you've ever run into a big knot in your yarn while working on a project, this is a perfect way to make it practically undetectable. The Magic Knot Join is a great way to join two strands of yarn together with virtually no visible ends. It could even be used to join a new skein and avoid weaving in ends!”

This technique is best used with a dense stitch pattern like garter stitch or seed stitch. A more open stitch or lace won't hide the knot. It is also best used with a sturdy plied yarn. Single plies and delicate fibers aren't strong enough to hold up to the strength test and will fall apart”
