MEET THE NEIGHBORS

A morning routine for Orlando Vera, principal of Thomas Jefferson High School, begins early. He may talk with a grounds keeper about the care of the newly refurbished rose gardens. He checks on staff to make sure all classes are covered or have a substitute. He speaks to parents and students about various concerns. He monitors the hallways to see that students are getting to their classrooms. He comes back to the office and usually finds a few students, parents, or neighborhood people like myself sitting on the long benches outside his office. The secretary, Angie Koebke, reminds him of various commitments for the day. Through it all, he smiles warmly at each person who walks into his office.

Vera has been in education for 35 years and in administration for 15 years. Before that, he was a teacher and a coach. Graduating from Eagle Pass High School, he came to San Antonio and earned his bachelor's degree from St. Mary's University. He received his master's degree in administration from Texas A&M at Kingsville. From there he went on to get another degree in administration from the University of Texas at San Antonio. As a well-educated man, he believes in the value of students succeeding in education and going to college or attaining a successful trade.

He set up the International Baccalaureate program that teaches students to give back to the community by being leaders and risk-takers. "This program is a leadership program and gives students a vision of life after high school." He also set up the AVID program, a college readiness program that utilizes students tutoring other students. The goal is college readiness. "I want to help students take advantage of what is offered.

More values need to be instilled. We have a graduation rate of 90 %. We want our students to get into Tier 1 schools like Trinity University here in San Antonio, as well as schools all over the country." When asked about his rate of getting students into Tier 1 schools, he said "We are at 2%, but plan to be at 5% this year." He said that many students use lack of money as the reason for not attending college

Students a TJHS are required to be involved in an extra-curricular activity. "It can be athletics, Band, ROTC, or any of the various clubs on campus. We want to be connected to the community," he said.

The bond renovations are complete, but there are always tweaks that must be made. Contractors still must be called out when there is a problem. With the new bond passing, he throws up his hands. "More construction, more planning. It is all difficult to be under construction and be functioning as a school," Vera said. "Renovations inconvenience everyone: the students, the faculty, and the community at large." He said he is well aware of this and made apologies for all the trucks coming through the neighborhood. Vera concluded with, "We want to be a hub for the community. We want the neighborhood to feel free to use this place. They have been there for us and we want to be there to lend our assistance too."

"One of our biggest goals is that we are connected to the community," Vera added. As a part of the involvement TJHS will be a part of our "At Home in Monticello" Holiday Home Tour. Anyone going on the tour will be invited to view the historic beauty of the school as well as newly completed renovations." The City's upcoming 2017-2022 Bond is anticipated to be \$850 Million. This will be the largest bond to date and is made possible by the City of San Antonio's financial stability and its AAA Bond rating earned and most importantly maintained. The 2017-2022 Bond is projected to be on the ballot in May 2017 for the citizen's of San Antonio's approval.

Five community bond committees, comprised of individuals with various backgrounds from across the community, will review the list of recommended projects developed by City Staff. They are charged with critically evaluating and recommending a prioritized list of projects to City Council before an election is called.

Residents are invited to participate in any of the five community bond committee focus areas: 1) Streets, Bridges & Sidewalks, 2) Drainage & Flood Control, 3) Parks, Recreation & Open Space, 4) Facility Improvements and 5) Neighborhood Improvements.

The community bond committee meetings are held through December 15, 2016 as needed at the Central Library downtown.

MPNA has presented to 3 of the bond committees and citizens from MPNA advocated in a 4th committee. Here is a Summary:

- 1) Drainage and Flood Control-MPNA requested funding for a project to remove homes and businesses from the 100 year flood plain along the San Antonio River Watershed Kampmann Tributary. City staff estimated a potential project to increase capacity in the Kampmann Blvd underground drainage at \$39 Million. At this time for D7 the priority is to complete the Seeling Channel drainage projects with the final Phase III being recommended for the 2017 Bond by City staff at \$24 Million.
- 2) Neighborhood Improvements-The City of San Antonio is having its first affordable housing bond. The recommended impact areas of the City will have to be voted on by City Council to be designated as blighted. Bond monies may be used for land acquisition, prepare land for development, demolish dilapidated structures, mediate environmental issues and extend utilities, sidewalks, curbs and lighting. The City Staff has recommended a location north of the MPNA Community: Northwest I-10 at 410 the old Malibu sports location. This is north of the San Antonio River Kampmann Blvd Tributary and within the greater watershed. MPNA expressed concern about development within the Watershed when the City acknowledges the drainage south, within MPNA, is undersized. No low impact development standards are required and therefore development adding to runoff is not in the best interest of the residents in the 100 year flood plain along Kampmann Blvd.
- 3) Parks Recreation and Open Space- MPNA requested the City complete the Master Plan for the pocket park, Monticello Park, located at 444 Club Dr. Improvements would include rehabilitation of the walking trail, finishing the Gazebo, landscaping, new park sign, curb replacement, and lighting. City Staff estimates the project scope at \$400K.
- 4) Streets, Bridges, and Sidewalks-Residents of North Drive and Furr Drive advocated at the bond committee meeting for street improvements. City Staff recommends Lake Blvd, Mary Louise, and Shadwell and \$2M for pedestrian mobility for District wide street improvements. Estimates: North Dr from Fredericksburg to Wilson \$3.25 Million and Furr Drive from Fredericksburg to Kampmann \$3.9 Million. Additional improvements for Wilson Median, a phase II project, and Donaldson have been requested.

Overall, the age of the community reminds us all there are great needs but limited funding. Proper maintenance will achieve the best life out of existing infrastructures while planning for capital bond improvements of the future. The list of projects will be finalized by the next newsletter.

Save Money All Year with Winter Averaging

Save water now, save money throughout 2017. It's as simple as turning off your irrigation system. Because SAWS sewer charges are based on your average winter water use, watering your landscape less now can add up to big savings all year long.

Winter averaging monitors the amount of water you use during three complete billing cycles from mid-November to mid-March to calculate your sewer fee for the whole year. At this time of year, your landscape doesn't have the unquenchable thirst for water that it did during the summer. This means plants and lawns don't take in as much water and the soil retains more moisture.

So do your landscape — and your wallet —a favor: turn off the irrigation system.



During my afternoon dog walking exercise, I thought I was watching my neighbor's yard man coming down the street, so I waved. To my surprise, it was no gardener at all, but the local UPS delivery man, and the cart on the back did not hold lawn equipment, it held the many packages to be delivered in Monticello Park!

UPS is taking special delivery to a whole new level with the help of golf carts. Not only is it getting holiday packages delivered faster, it is safer and it is creating jobs. UPS is hiring seasonal workers as usual this time of year. Each one must then piece together the puzzle one by one onto the golf cart. Once it is loaded up, the cart goes off the course and onto the streets.

UPS says that this method is a lot more effective. UPS can keep the big, noisy trucks away from our streets at night by making holiday deliveries during the day. Safety is the main reason they do it this way, but the fuel cost savings factors in to a great degree. The customer gains the benefit of receiving delivery during the time slot that is usually reserved for business deliveries.

So look for the golf cart on our streets during the holiday season, get your packages earlier because of it, ensure that someone is ready to safeguard your packages, and wave at that driver!
