Dr. Daniel Edelstein

Stanford University and Mapping the Republic of Letters

Dan Edelstein works for the most part on eighteenth-century France, with research interests at the crossroads of literature, history, political theory, and digital humanities. His first book, *The Terror of Natural Right: Republicanism, the Cult of Nature, and the French Revolution* (University of Chicago Press, 2009) won the 2009 Oscar Kenshur Book Prize. Edelstein's second book entitled *The Enlightenment:* A *Genealogy* (University of Chicago Press, 2010) explores how the idea of an Enlightenment emerged in French academic circles around the 1720's. He is currently working on three main projects: A comparative study of revolutionary authority; natural right theory in the French Enlightenment and Revolution; and *Mapping the Republic of Letters*. 3:15 - 4:30 PM
