



Parish Membership: Every family and single adult to be considered active members of St. Bartholomew's Parish must be properly registered in the parish, receiving and regularly using the parish weekly donation envelopes. Only in this way can the parish issue documents attesting to parish membership and Catholic practice, e.g. a letter to be a Godparent or Sponsor. New parishioners are requested to visit the parish office.

Sick & Shut-ins: The priests are available to administer the Sacraments to those who are unable to come to Church. The Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick is part of the healing ministry of the Church, and should be received early in an illness or before a serious operation.

Baptisms: Please call the parish office to make arrangements.

Marriages: In order to provide sufficient time for the Marriage Preparation Course, please call the parish office and ask to speak with the pastor at least six months in advance of the wedding.

Parish Council: Meets on the Monday evening after the third Sunday of the month.

Holy Name Society: Meets on the Monday evening after the second Sunday of the month. President, Anthony Martelli

Rosary Altar Society: Meets on the Monday evening after the first Sunday of the month. President, Liz Mulvaney

Joseph, An Example of Obedience

Obedience: Who wants to listen to a sermon on obedience again,



or read it for that matter. It has been talked about for what should really be more than enough times. But like a lot of

the virtues we are supposed to have acquired as Christians, we are not only finding it difficult to acquire this all-important virtue, we (or many Christians) seem to have given up on it entirely, at least in many aspects of their lives.

As we draw closer to the celebration of the Lord's birthday, the Church presents Joseph to us for reflections. He appeals to us from different perspectives – faith, fatherhood, mercy, patience, sacrifice, etc. He is also a wonderful example of obedience. To assume the role God wanted him to play meant giving up his personal dreams. It meant going against his own will. It meant obeying God, even when it hurts and especially when it doesn't make sense.

We encounter situations where we want to hold onto our dreams. There are so many situations where we want to satisfy our own desires. There are many situations that could hurt us if we are to follow God's will. The challenge is to follow God's will and trust that "in his will is our peace".

I read a report today in the New York Times. It's about an empirical result that disproves long held belief that women who committed abortion suffered from depression, etc. years after the incident. The new survey, they claim, shows that it is not true. It shows that women who committed abortion feel the same as those who were denied abortion. As I skimmed through the report, I shook my head in sorrowful amazement.

Remember that little quote, **"Which Part Of Thou Shalt Not Kill Do You Not Understand?".** We not only disobey this fifth commandment, we convince ourselves that we are right in doing so. So, we have deadened our consciences. I use this example because at a time we should be rejoicing in the gift of a child, Jesus, and encouraging respect to life, 'experts' are busy publishing a research to convince us that it's OK to kill unborn babies without any qualms.

Well, that's just one out of so many examples of our collective and individual disobedience. And it's not just adults; it's our children too. I always wince when an embarrassed parent asks a child (in public) to do something and the child blatantly refuses. I personally don't know where we're all heading in this issue of obedience. Everyone wants to be free and to do their own thing. And it's leading us to go astray and to our own destruction. But the devil will make sure that we are not fully aware of the repercussions.

Like Joseph, may we choose well; may we obey the Lord in all His ways and His will, for in His will is our peace.
