Through the power of collective giving, each member's annual \$1,000 contribution is pooled to produce these transformative grants. This year's awards will bring the grant total to over \$4 million dollars since its 2008 founding.




### **Front Porch Hosts Hurricane Benefit**

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

## St. Francis, Patron Saint of Animals

The patron saint of Italy, Francis of Assisi, was a poor man who astounded and inspired the church by taking the gospel literally - not in a narrow sense, but by actually following all that Jesus said and did, joyfully, without limit, and without a sense of selfimportance.

Serious illness brought the young Francis to see the emptiness of his lifestyle as leader of youth in the city of Assisi. Prayer - lengthy and difficult - led him to a self-emptying like that of Christ, which led Francis to embrace a leper he met on the road. It symbolized his complete obedience to what he had heard in prayer: "Francis! Everything you have loved and desired in the flesh it is your duty to despise and hate, if you wish to know my will. And when you have begun this, all that now seems sweet and lovely to you will become intolerable and bitter, but all that you used to avoid will turn itself to great sweetness and exceeding joy."

From the cross in the neglected field-chapel, Christ told him, "Francis, go out and build up my house, for it is nearly falling down." Francis became the totally poor and humble workman.

He must have suspected a deeper meaning to "build up my house." But he would have been content to be for the rest of his life the poor "nothing" man actually putting brick on brick in abandoned chapels. He gave up all his possessions, piling even his clothes before his earthly father, who was demanding restitution for Francis' "gifts" to the poor, so that he would be totally free.

He was for a time considered to be a religious fanatic, begging from door to door when he could not get money for his work, evoking sadness or disgust from his former friends.

But genuineness will tell.

A few people began to realize this man was actually trying to be Christian. He really believed what Jesus said: "Announce the kingdom! Possess no gold or silver or copper in your purses, no traveling bag, no sandals, no staff." (Luke 9:1-3).

Francis' first rule for his followers was a collection of texts from the Gospels. He had no intention of founding a religious order, but once it began, he protected and accepted it. His devotion to the church was absolute at a time when various reform movements tended to break the church's unity.

He was torn between a life devoted entirely to prayer and a life of active preaching of the good news. He decided in favor of the preaching, but always returned to solitude when he could. He wanted to be a missionary in Syria or in Africa, but was prevented by shipwreck and illness in both cases.

During the last years of his life, he was half blind and seriously ill and died at age 44.

On his deathbed, Francis repeated Psalm 141, and asked his Father Superior's permission to have his clothes removed when the last hour came in order that he could expire lying naked on the earth, in imitation of his Lord.

In the beginning of October, people will be celebrating St. Francis Day in honor of the Patron Saint of Animals, St Francis of Assisi. In remembrance of his love for all sentient beings, pet owners sometimes take their animal companions to church for a blessing of the animals.

Episcopal Church of the Advent will hold a pet blessing at 3 p.m. Sunday, Oct. 3, on the lawn. All types of pets are welcome but they must be on a lease or in a pet carrier/cage.



And keep in mind that legitimate firms will not ask you to divulge personal information without going through the password or two-step authentication protocols.

The ability to connect with your accounts online can be extremely useful to you – and you'll feel more comfortable about these interactions if you know you've done all you can to safeguard your information.

### **Keep Yourself Protected While Managing Accounts Online**

If you're an investor, you probably enjoy the convenience of managing your accounts online. But you'll also want to make sure that you're not making it convenient for hackers, "phishers" and others with bad intentions to gain the same access.

Fortunately, there's a lot you can do to protect your privacy.

• Use a strong password or passphrase. You'll want to pick a password that would be virtually impossible for anyone to guess, employing capital and lowercase letters, plus symbols and numbers. Of course, you'll want to record the password in a secure place so you won't forget it. Instead of using a password, you may have the option of choosing a passphrase, which contains a series of words strung together. You'll want to avoid phrases taken from popular culture or that are otherwise commonly used. And it's also a good idea not to use phrases containing your name, birthday or other personal identifiers.

• Use two-step authentication. If your investment company offers twostep, or multifactor, authentication, you'll want to take advantage of it, since it's a good security tool. When using two-step authentication, you'll
