THE GUIDANCE OF THE HOLY SPIRIT

In the city of Babel the plurality of languages produced misunderstanding and drove people apart. In Jerusalem at Pentecost the plurality of languages will



produce understanding and draw people together. At Sinai the presence of God was obscured by fire and smoke, by trumpet blasts and thunder. In the upper room locked doors could not prevent Jesus from bringing the Holy Spirit to the disciples. In Ezekiel's vision dead, dry bones lie in graves. Paul speaks of being reborn in the Spirit, suggest-

ing Ezekiel's vision of the spirit bringing the bones to life. Joel prophesies that everyone will be rescued when the spirit comes. Paul tells the Romans that having the first fruits of the Spirit, we await the redemption of our bodies. In every way, the Holy Spirit transforms the world.

In the Hebrew scriptures whenever God's spirit was invoked, it was upon people of special importance: kings, judges, prophets. When Joel writes that the Lord's spirit will be poured out "upon the flesh... even upon the servants and the handmaids," it is a radical shift (Joel 3:1-2). No longer will only a select few be blessed with God's spirit. Everyone will. "Everyone shall be rescued who calls on the name of the Lord." (3:5). No wonder Peter quotes this passage after the Holy Spirit came down upon the apostles. The universal spirit envisioned by Joel has been realized.

It wasn't only Joel who realized the breadth of God's blessings. Ezekiel never said that just "some" graves would be opened. Paul speaks of "all creation" being reborn. Jesus offers Himself to "anyone who thirsts;" all who believes will be blessed with the Spirit flowing within them. You, me, our neighbor, all creation. If the Holy Spirit were visible, we would be blinded by the energy flowing within us all. Our challenge is to make the Spirit visible and help renew the face of the earth.

We hear two accounts of the coming of the Holy Spirit upon the apostles today

and they are markedly different. In one, the Holy Spirit comes only after Jesus had ascended to the Father, but in the other Jesus is still present. In the first, the Holy Spirits comes with a gentle breath and no visible manifestation. In Acts, the apostles speak at once in foreign languages. In John, the apostles fall silent. The coming of the Holy Spirit may be more like a process than an event. At times the Holy Spirit comes upon someone powerful-



ly with visible consequences; at other times the Spirit comes gently and quietly. The same Spirit produces different workings in different people and at different times.

In the Pentecost Sequence, we implore the Holy Spirit to "Bend the stubborn heart and will." Easier said than done! Our feelings are usually quite ingrained in us, as is our behavior. It is easier to change one's mind than to change one's heart, let alone one's habits. Those opinions that we cling to most intensely lend to be ones formed in the heart, not the brain. That explains how reasonable arguments often fail against ingrained opinion. Yet we ask the Spirit today to overcome our stubbornness. Approximately three months ago, on Ash Wednesday, we heard the prophet Joel tell us to rend our hearts and return to the Lord. May the Holy Spirit bend and rend our stubborn hearts whenever they lead us astray!

Before Jesus breathed the Holy Spirit upon the apostles He offered them one other thing: peace. "Peace be with you," He said this twice, the second time after they realized that it was the Lord in their midst. In the next sentence He commissioned them to go out into the world as His Father had sent Him into the world: to bring peace throughout the world. The Holy Spirit enables them to do so. And us as well. We too have received the Holy Spirit. May we bring peace wherever we go— into anxious hearts, difficult relationships, stubborn conflicts.

QUESTION OF THE WEEK:

Do I rely on the Holy Spirit for guidance? When I search my heart, what stubbornness do I find that could use honest examination?
