By Laws of the

Apostolic Faith Bible College

Article VII-Doctrine

It is recognized that the true church of Jesus Christ consists of all believers who believe in the saving grace of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ and who have accepted Him as their personal Savior. It is recognized and agreed that no organization or man has been granted authority by the Lord to exclude from or accept anyone into the Kingdom of Heaven, as this is done by Jesus Christ only. It is further recognized and agreed that we as Christians are to love all members of the Body of Christ (Christians) and this love and fellowship derives from the unity instilled by the Holy Spirit. Although differences in doctrinal beliefs and interpretations should not influence our love for one another, adherence to similar doctrinal beliefs and modes of worship have bonded together those of the Apostolic Faith Movement as founded by Charles F. Parham in the early 1900's. The scripture teaches us to adhere to the truth and proper doctrine. The common doctrinal beliefs are essentially as follows.

*Triune God: Father, Son and Holy Spirit

*Creation and Formation

*Man is basically sinful and in need of salvation

*Salvation by Grace upon repentance toward God and acceptance of Jesus Christ as one's personal Savior, which is the conception of Spiritual Life.

*Sanctification of the Spirit, Soul and Body, a Second definite work of Grace by the Lord Jesus Christ

*Baptism of the Holy Spirit, evidenced by the speaking in other languages

*Water Baptism (of all believers) by immersion in water in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit

*Sacrament of the Lord's Supper

*Washing of Feet

*Divine Healing through Jesus Christ for all believers

*Do not condone divorce and remarriage

*Destruction of the Wicked

*Conditional Immortality

*Rapture of the Man child Class

*Return of Jesus Christ to earth again; bodily and visibly

*A ministry supported by tithes and offerings

These doctrines shall be adhered to in the teachings of the Apostolic Faith Bible College, which in addition to other doctrinal teaching approved by the Board from time to time if they are not inconsistent with the above basic doctrines.

" I Left A Part of Me There"


Traveling to Guatemala and working at the "Cocina del Amor" was a big step and doing something by myself without parent supervision was a change.

Where Has the Holiness Gone? By Ron Noble—Follett, TX

Remember the part of a song that say's, "O Be Careful Little Mouth What You Say?" We might sing that but are we really careful about what comes out of our mouth? My Mother used to say, "from your lips to God's ear," and I do realize from reading the Bible that God does indeed listen to us!

There should be a difference between the speech of a Christian and that of a non- Christian is hardly something that needs to be addressed. Yet at times I listen to the words (and attitudes) that come out of some people's mouth that are indeed Christians and I wonder.

The Psalms and Proverbs are filled with verses about our speech so let's consider the other phrase that David wanted to find acceptability with God in: **the words of his mouth**. He went on to say in Psalms 17:3 what he was going to do, "I am purposed that my mouth shall not transgress," and in Psalms 141:3 he has his request, "Set a watch O Lord, before my mouth, keep the door of my lips."

First, of course, examine the connection between this and the meditation of the heart. Why is it so important to 'monitor' the thoughts of the mind and heart? The Bible says in Proverbs 4:23 to "Keep thy heart with all diligence, for out of it are the issues of life."

Oh, I know there are times that we open our mouth and stupidity falls out and we claim that we spoke without thinking. But, most of the time, don't we pre-meditate what we are going to say? Don't we take into consideration ahead of time what our communication will reveal? "Oh, no", (some might say) I just speak my mind. Whatever comes to me, I give to others'. While this may ne all right sometimes, do you think it's the best way every time? When someone tells me that they just "let her fly". I always want to ask "And how's that working for you?" I've heard it said that if you are ever going to give someone a piece of your mind, make sure you can spare it. From the New Testament, Luke 6:45 reads, "A good man out of the good treasure of his heart brings forth that which is good, and an evil man out of the evil treasure of his heart brings forth that which is evil: for of the abundance of the heart his mouth speaks."

Do you and I get that? Is this saying that whatever is in the heart will eventually come out? If this is true, then I believe it to be evident that much of what we say has already been 'said' in the heart..., don't you? Our mouth is going to say what's in our heart so this is obviously the reason why we should be careful what we meditate on.

In a class I taught at Bible School, four areas of conversation were discussed. These are really easy to see once you think about them. Areas one and two are "what we should and shouldn't say to God" Among several things that I believe God loves to hear is our hearts cry of praise, thanksgiving, intercession and request. And don't forget to take words with you when you go to Him (Hosea 14:2—Take with you words and turn to the Lord: say unto him, Take away all iniquity, and receive us graciously, so will we render the calves of our lips.) However, I'm much afraid that I have given Him the opposite at times...what about you? Has He ever heard from me words of griping, ingratitude, or concern only for me? I've read in the book of Numbers that Israel murmured in the wilderness and God heard them and it displeased Him. But when or where did they first murmur? Didn't it begin in their heart (heart murmur).

Areas three and four are about what I speak to man, what I should and shouldn't say. I'm almost afraid to consider this. Oh I know the answers in my mind of how I should talk. I'm just not sure that even if the right words come out of my mouth, they would come from the heart! Does that make sense? See, I've noticed that it's not only with our actual words that we communicate with others. Isn't it true that many times we reveal out of the abundance of the heart by our body language? Sometimes our stance on things or how our mood is (mental disposition is partly what this means. Look it up!) affects other peoples perception of what we say. We may say the right thing, but how many times have we spoken our real feelings by our actions. For instance- our verbal words to our spouse or friend may be "I love you" but does it show? Does sincerity abound? Do we mean it or is it just from the teeth out (I've heard it said). Has anyone ever said to you "Don't speak to me in that tome of voice?"

So what should we say to our fellow man but words of encouragement and that which is beneficial and prod him into God? The Bible says in Proverbs 15:23 that "a word spoken in due season, how good it is!" and in 25:11 that "A word fitly spoken is like apples of gold in pictures of silver."

Unfortunately, words that are beneficial for us to hear and sometimes give to others aren't always pleasant words. What about the admonishment for us to give or receive reproof, rebuke or exhortation? Are we ready for that? Hebrews 10:25 states that we need to exhort "one another and so much more as ye see the day approaching." (read the context of this also).

Let's press on further. Have you ever considered Ephesians 5:3-4? "let it not be once named among you, as becometh saints: Neither filthiness, nor foolish talking, nor jesting, which are not convenient but rather giving of thanks."

Holiness:

Filthiness? Well, that is understandable (I think)! Does that include risqué and off colored jokes and language? I'll leave that between you and God. But foolish talking. Really? What all does that include? Again, I'll leave that between you and God! Who among us haven't let our tongue slip over saying things that we ought not (or not saying what w should)?

I would like to mention something about slang and I realize this may be a gray area and controversial so I'll not be naïve enough to try to list what I think is cuss (something we as Christians would never do.... Right?) or slang words! The only thing I will say about this is two quotes I've heard from somewhere in the past. Concerning cussing, I've heard it called "the mark of a vocabulary illiterate". About slang, "it's nothing but second hand cussing". Enough said!

I guess the bottom line is that at the end of the day, can we come before God and ask Him if everything we have said has been alright for Him to hear. Has our speech been acceptable and has it met with His approval.

"O be careful little mouth what you say" (because it has a little member called a tongue and if left unattended and un surrendered to God, can cause great damage.
