

A Message From Fr. Brian Johnson November 1, 2020 Mt 5:1-12a

Dear St. Pius X and St. Anthony Church,

Happy All Saints Day! My favorite definition of a Saint is one that a little girl told once in her school classroom. She said, "A saint is one of those people in the stained glass windows at Church because they let the Light of God shine through them!" That was very Insightful of her!

In today's gospel, Jesus goes up the Mount and begins to teach (Matt 5:1-2). After Jesus delivers the Beatitudes, he continues teaching by saying, "You have heard that it was said to your ancestors, 'You shall not kill'...., But I say to you, whoever is angry...." (Matt 5:21-22). Those two details of 1) teaching on a mountain & 2) commenting on 'Thou shall not' speak loudly to me that Jesus is standing in the sandals of Moses and taking his teaching a step higher up the mount to God. Jesus says to His followers, "Your holiness must surpass that of the scribes & Pharisees, or you will not enter into the kingdom of heaven" (Matt 5:20). In John 9:28, the Pharisees will even claim, "We are disciples of Moses." So, I view this mountain teaching scene as Jesus taking the bare bones of the Law of Moses and giving it flesh--filling it with heart. He wants His disciples to draw even closer to the life of heaven. So, to really avoid sin, we go to the heart. As Jesus started to teach about the fifth commandment, He was saying, "If you don't want to get anywhere near the sin of murder, first work on anger and rivalry." He goes on to provide further antidotes against temptations to the 6th & 9th commands forbidding adultery/ lust (Matt 5:27-28), the 8th command against lying (Matt 5:33-34) and the 7th command against theft & retaliation (Matt 5:38-39). Jesus is providing the inner heart or spirit needed to follow the law with full faith. Absolutely, we follow the letter of the law. We avoid the physical actions that the law prohibits and we perform specific actions that the law does command us to do. But there is more to 'living the law'. Jesus wants us to understand the goodness and purpose of the mandates. That way, we fully abide by the law because we know the intention of the law-giver, Jesus God Himself! More than us just simply going through motions, Jesus wants our heart in our actions (once more with feeling!) A little later in Matthew's gospel (15:4) Jesus will teach on the 4th commandment about honoring parents. He quotes Isaiah 29:13 where God convicts the "people who draw near me with words only.... though their hearts are far from me." Jesus wants the law reflected in the acts of our bodies, but also in the thoughts of our hearts. He wants God's law to be written not only "in ink, but by the Spirit of the living God, not on tablets of stone but on tablets that are hearts of flesh" (2 Corinthians 3:3). Or how about what the prophet Jeremiah said about God's living law that God "will place (His) law within them, and write it upon their hearts; I will be their God, and they shall be my people: (Jeremiah 31:33). This brings us back to the mountain where Jesus was teaching His disciples what we call the 'Beatitudes'. Like the later Transfiguration scene where Jesus reveals His divinity in shining glory, I think on this mountain here, Jesus is revealing His heart to us. He gives us the proper Spirit or intention of the Law. Jesus teaches that 'the poor, the meek, the merciful, the mournful, the pure of heart, the persecuted, the peacemaking, and those hungering for righteousness' are the 'blessed'. The Beatitudes tell of the true children of God, being comforted, being satisfied, seeing God, and that the Kingdom itself belongs to them. If such virtues and motives are in the hearts of Jesus' disciples, then the result is a faithful and full following of God's law. Jesus' Beatitudes reveal the heart of the Ten Commandments, so that we can abide and perform them with the same Spirit as Christ's own. This same reflection is what Jesus meant later in this same chapter 5 of Matthew when He said, "Just so, your light must shine before others, that they may see your good deeds and glorify your heavenly Father" (Matt 5:16). Jesus will remind His apostles of His transfiguring heart that should shine through us (like the little girl's definition of Saints), when he says in Matthew 13:43 "Then the righteous will shine like the sun in the kingdom of their Father." So, shine on, Christians!

Another Saint in Time of Plague: St. Pantaleon (born 275 AD – died 305)

St. Pantaleon is more popularly recognized in the Eastern Rite and Orthodox Christian tradition than in our western Roman tradition. But he is still often invoked as a living illustration of one who strongly perseveres in faith despite opposition by adversaries or obstacles such as sickness and plagues. Other honored saints such as St. Alphonsus Ligouri, mentioned him frequently in their sermons about corporal works of mercy, healing and persevering under persecution. Unfortunately, details about St. Pantaleon are limited. Early church martyrologies record most of what we know (Martyrologies are death records and brief bios of saints). St Pantaleon was born in 275 AD, into a wealthy family of Nicomedia, Turkey. His father Eustorgius was not Christian but his mother Eubula was and she instructed Pantaleon in the Christian faith. Following his mother's death, he grew slack in practicing his faith and eventually left the church. He pursued a medical career, and distinguished himself as an excellent student under a master physician Euphrosinos, as popular as the once known Hippocrates. St. Pantaleon became the Imperial House physician to Emperors Galerius & Maximiam. In his medical practice once tending to a sick man in the city, he ran across a respected holy priest named Hermolaus. They talked about medicine and faith over several encounters, and St. Pantaleon returned to Church practicing his faith again with zeal. Fr. Hermolaus had introduced Pantaleon to the Divine Physician Christ and shared many scriptural accounts of Jesus being with raising the sick to health again(especially from the gospel of Luke-another distinguished Roman physician). Hermolaus asked St. Pantaleon, "You are studious about the medical science of the body's healing. How about the spiritual science of soul's healing?" St. Pantaleon was thoroughly converted back to his faith in Christ. He was very devout in Church, yet kept busy with his renowned practice of medicine. He even introduced his father Eustorgius to faith and he became Christian. Upon his father's death, St. Pantaleon freed his father's slaves, and distributed the large estate of wealth among the poor of Nicomedia. He offered his services for free and was beloved to all the poor of the country. He became the envy of his colleagues, so much so, that during the reign of Diocletian, his confreres denounced him to the emperor as a subversive Christian. Out of respect, the Emperor sought to just dismiss St. Pantaleon, but Pantaleon was so devout that he publicly confessed Christ in the square in front of the whole city and dramatically healed a paralyzed man in the Name of Christ. Out of pressure from the elites, the Emperor hesitantly ruled that he be burned to death as a 'magician' alongside other condemned Christians. After humiliations and abuses of his body, he was eventually beheaded. At his execution, he forgave his attackers and killers. His gentle reaction and kindness even to his torturers won over two of them who converted to the Christian faith by his witness. His name 'Pantaleon' means 'all compassionate' in Greek (pas=all & eleos=compassionate), or in Latin it means 'strong through all' (pan=all & leonine=strong). His life and faith story was widely circulated throughout Italy in the Middle Ages among pilgrims and many church sites. His name was especially invoked in the city Venice (because of great trades of healing/pharmaceutical spice herbs?). Interestingly, his name was capitalized in one of Shakespeare's comedy plays 'As You Like It', in the line about the 'lean and slippered Pantaloon' because of him wearing loose and more modest trousers that covered his leg calves instead of the other fashion of more revealing 'knee breeches'. Apparently, trousers started being called 'pantaloons' and later shortened to 'pants'. Maybe that is too far a stretch afield from our original Holy Doctor from Nicomedia, but it is interesting Catholic trivia. St. Pantaleon was known also as one of the Fourteen Holy Helpers (grouped together in the 1300's) called upon for prayer and intercession against the Bubonic plague. St. Pantaleon, pray for us.
