# 2023 Accomplishments

- ★ Reorganization of three stalls (the names ie. Beans and Ham, etc are the names of horses who lived in the stalls:
  - Beans and Ham: We reorganized this stall to include both the Jocko Lakes and the Rice Ridge fire maps, and the history of Smokejumping in Seeley Lake. The idea of smokejumpers was test driven at Winthrop WA, but the training center was established in Seeley Lake at Camp Paxson, during WWII with conscientious objectors.



• **Popcorn and Peanuts:** Not only was Seeley Lake named after Jasper Seely (correct spelling.) Jasper was the first US Forest Service ranger. Seeley Lake was the site of the first ever USFS logging job in 1905. The display is rounded out with photos of early day loggers and their living environment

We have applied for a micro grant from Missoula County



- Thunder and Lightening: The tools used by early loggers, including an early two man chain saw, are displayed along with photos of the old ways of logging. The stall then transitions to the 1920's style of resorts. The Tamaracks and Double Arrow Resorts are still in business today.
- ♦ Building storage in the common room: A system of cupboards has been built to house the folding chairs, media equipment and a small amount of storage for annual users. The top of the chair cupboard has an area for a seasonal display curated by our docent Jana Phipps. If you have items or an idea for future displays please contact her at the museum.





- ◆ Basic housecleaning and organization: We had an additional shed built onto the end of our garages to store the community stage, lawn mower and lumber for displays. As part of this organization, we worked on stall #4 to make room for the Chamber of Commerce totes while they are in reorganization mode.
- ★ 4th of July: The Seeley Lake Historical Museum and Visitor Center took over the organization of the 4th of July with Tom Browder leading the charge. Since the "Barn Board" is mostly made up of the Historical Society board members, we were heavily involved. If you have an idea for the 4th 2024, please share.
- ★ Recreating the manger displays: To create a better visual experience while viewing the contents of the mangers in the stalls, we have been adding lighting. As it is a work in

progress, there are several styles while we find one that is both effective and affordable. We have been adding hinges to the manger lids to facilitate updating and cleaning.





- ★ Fort Missoula Grant: Fort Missoula is blessed with a mill levy from the county. They do have an opportunity for grants to the small county museums and we applied for one to add a back porch to the Maloney cabin. We hope to include a clothesline, kitchen garden, and repurpose the outhouse into a tool display.
- ★ Teaching immigrant cooking to the 4th grade: 4th grade social studies included immigration to Montana. How and why did different ethnic groups migrate here. To add a bit of interest to this program Steve and Cheri Thompson are teaching cooking. Starting with Native Americans, and using bison, chokecherries and different native dried fruits the program was off to a great start with fry bread tacos. Next came the English as they migrated from the 13 colonies and shepherds pie and singing hinnies were on the menu. The Chinese came with both mining and railroads and orange chicken, beef and carrots both over rice and rice pudding for dessert. Christmas brought the POW's of WWII, Italians. To honor them lunch was pizza, cannolis and gelato. Over half the class made pizza over Christmas vacation.
- ★ Miscellaneous: Thanks to Pat Donich the building was chinked and the garden weeded. An original table and chairs from the Tamarack were donated, and movie nights continued. A start was made on our new relationship with our neighbors to the west. See Dea and Ron's article, next.

### Our Neighbors to the West

The Flathead Indian Reservation is over the mountains west of Seeley Lake. It is home to the Confederated Salish and Kootenai tribes. The tribes are a combination of the Salish, the Pend d'Oreille and the Kootenai. The Clearwater valley has been occupied by the Salish people for thousands of years. Tribal elders still remember many of their traditional names for places on modern maps.

Place names demonstrate a relationship the the land. Selis is pronounced SEH-leesh. It is usually written in English as 'Salish.' Their territories extend from the Bitterroot Mountains and the present-day border between Montana and Idaho to the Yellowstone, Musselshell, and upper Missouri drainage systems far east of the Continental Divide. Frequent use-areas reached even further, at least as far as the Bighorn River (Bighorn Sheep's Waters).

The following list contains modern names, an attempt at the Selis spelling and the Selis interpretation of the place.

**Seeley Lake** - Epł Ċix(w)ċx(w)t – HAS OSPREYS

Outlet at Seeley Lake - Epł X(w) yú / Ep Stqép – HAS MOUNTAIN WHITE FISH, HAS DAM

**Trail Creek/Morrell Creek area** - Xqcné — CLEARING BY WATER

**Upper Jocko Lake** - Čłsusuwene() – REFERRING TO THE WATER RECEDING

Slippery John/Grouse/Buck Cr Confluence - EP Sqeymn - HAS TIPI POLES

**Beavers Creek near confluence with Placid Creek** - Sntlqla - PLACE OF SWEATHOUSES

Placid Lake - Čłglie – REFERRING TO WATER

**Ridge south of Placid Lake** - Smxečs()íčn - GRIZZLY BEAR RIDGE

### SLHS - Salish Visit

In autumn of last year, October 2023, the SLHS was fortunate to receive a visit from respected members of the Salish tribe who came over from St. Ignatius to meet with us. The gathering was opened by the grandmother elders with smudging and prayers. A warm conversation followed where we began to consider ways to connect with and share important information that the tribe has lived, understood, and named about this area for thousands of years. The tribe gifted us with a publication produced by the Selis-Qlispe Culture Committee, Confederated Salish and Kootenai Tribes called Names Upon the Land - An Ethnogeography of the Salish and Kalispel People: A Portfolio of Maps and **Signs.** We've included a few of the local area's names from that compilation for you and encourage you to further explore this rich ancient history. Over time, it's our hope to continue these conversations with our neighbors to the West, and to co-create and feature an exhibit at SLHS that represents Salish history, values, and their historic use of the Seeley-Swan area.
