Lillian Resident Travels Along the Mighty Mississippi By Bicycle

A 2,000 mile trip in 25 days doesn't sound too impressive until you find out that Vince Cooke did it on a bicycle. The adventure began Memorial Day weekend when he and his wife, Michele, drove to Venice, La., the Mississippi Delta, about 80 miles south of New Orleans.

While Vince pedaled the backroads on his bike, Michele took the highways to predetermined locations where the two would meet for updates, snacks (fried ice cream being a favorite), meals and overnights.

Sometimes the backroads could hardly be identified. Although he had a turnby-turn description of the trip thanks to Michele, after he finished a 2,000 Google Maps, many times the roads had mile bike ride at the site of the no signs and Vince had to go by the exbeginning of the Mississippi River act mileage as indicated on his schedule.

The weather didn't do them any fa-

vors, either. After two days of rain and no signs of letting up, they headed back home for a week and then resumed their trek to a grand conclusion. A few other glitches happened along the way, like the time they agreed to meet at Dairy Queen, but found they were in two different locations. A quick adjustment and they were together again as planned.

Of course, in some areas where Vince rode, cell phone reception was weak or non-existent, but he managed to get where he was supposed to be, just like others in the "olden days" before the internet.

Vince says the best part of the trip of course was the finish, the successful accomplishment of his goal, but he said the beauty of the headwaters of the Mississippi River was really inspiring. The great Mississippi begins in a tiny kneedeep river in Itasca State Park in northern Minnesota, about 50 miles from Lake Superior. It travels north in a fish hook configuration and gradually makes its way to the Gulf of Mexico.

This wasn't the first bicycle adventure for Vince. It all began with 150 mile rides for Multiple Sclerosis and then eventually to four-to-five-day state rides. A Charlotte to Nashville ride took place in 2006 and in 2016 he traveled Route 66. Other trips included Natchez Trace, Lake Erie and the Blue Ridge Mountains.

Along the Mississippi route the travelers encountered a major spillway system, the birthplace and home of Laura Ingalls Wilder in Mansfield, Mo., and Madonna Chapel in Bayou Goula, La., "the smallest church in the world." They took time along the way to read roadside markers to learn about the history

Big Jake & the Tag-A-Longs will provide music for singing and dancing from 11 a.m. to 2 p.m. At 2:15 the 50/50 drawing will be held. Tickets are six for \$5. They may be purchased any time before the event from any Optimist member or on Labor Day at the club.

Each year the club hosts a fishing rodeo, Easter egg hunt and breakfast with Santa and provides scholarships to graduating seniors. Members also read to kindergarten and first grade students and tutor others at Elberta Elementary School. They also serve students at Elberta Middle and High Schools.



The Studer Foundation recently awarded the Lillian Recreational Park a \$2,500 grant to purchase ADA compliant equipment, as well as benches for parkgoers to enjoy.

The park will use the grant to purchase two Americans with Disabilities Act-compliant picnic tables designed to allow wheelchair users to easily wheel up to the picnic table and sit comfortably.

At least one of the tables will be installed under the sunshade structure next to the children's playground.

The grant will also allow the park to purchase benches for parkgoers to use as they enjoy nature. The new benches will provide great spots to watch the antics of the crazy squirrels or to rest before continuing on a hike around the walking trail.

"We are so grateful to the Studer

Foundation for this grant," said Juanita Dodd, LRP president.

"We can't wait to hear the sounds of joy and laughter coming from families as they use the new picnic tables, and we particularly appreciate that these tables will help ensure no one feels excluded from family activities because they can't get close enough to the table to comfortably enjoy a picnic with their family. Everyone will finally be able to join in on all the fun. What a great gift the Studer family has given the park and our community."

The Pensacola-based Studer Foundation is dedicated to improving life for local communities by funding nonprofit organizations that serve children, the disabled and the elderly.

This is the first grant they have awarded to the Lillian Recreational Park.







A man on death row received a letter from the father of the man who he had killed. The letter said, "You are probably surprised that I, of all people, am writing a letter to you, but I ask you to read it in its entirety and consider its request seriously. As the father of the man you took part in murdering, I have something very important to say to you. With all my heart, I forgive you. I realize it may be hard for you to believe, but I really do. I want to make you an offer. I want you to become my adopted child. I believe you are worth the offer.

"If I can forgive you for your part in my son's death, I can forgive you for anything. Some would call me foolish, but I wish for you to call me your father." The letter is signed, 'Sincerely, God the Father of Jesus."





### **Introducing a Martyr From Our Era**

In previous writings I have highlighted a biblical figure or saint from many years ago. This month I focus on a 20th century martyr, Jonathan Myrick Daniels, born in Keene, N.H., in 1939. When in high school, he had a bad fall which put him in the hospital for a month. It was a time of reflection. Soon after he joined the Episcopal church, began to take his studies seriously, and considered entering the ministry.

After high school, he enrolled at Virginia Military Institute (VMI) and was elected valedictorian of his graduating class. In the fall of 1961, he entered Harvard University to study English literature, and in the spring of 1962, while attending Easter services

at the Church of the Advent in Boston, he underwent a conversion experience that led to a decision to study for the ministry. After a year of work to repair family finances, he enrolled at Episcopal Theological Seminary.

In March 1965 Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. asked students and others to join him in Selma for a march to the state capital in Montgomery. News of the request reached the campus of ETS and during a service at the chapel, Daniels decided he ought to go. Later he wrote: "I had come to evening prayer and as usual I was singing the Magnificat with the special love and reverence I have always felt for Mary's glad song. As the lovely hymn of the God-bearer continued, I found

myself peculiarly alert, suddenly straining toward the decisive, luminous, Spirit-filled moment that would, in retrospect, remind me of others. Then it came. 'He hath put down the mighty from their seat, and hath exalted the humble and meek. He hath filled the hungry with good things.' I knew then that I must go to Selma."

He left that week, intending to stay only that weekend but he and a friend missed the bus back, and began to reflect on how a short visit looked to those living in Selma, and decided they must stay longer.

Daniels devoted many of his Sundays in Selma to bringing African-Americans high school students to church with him. Many parishioners openly resented their presence.

In May, Daniels went back to seminary to take exams and in July he returned to Alabama. On Friday, Aug. 13, Daniels and others went to Fort Deposit to picket three businesses. On Saturday they were arrested and held in the county jail for six days. After their release on Aug. 20, four entered a shop for a soda and were met by a man with a shotgun who told them to leave or be shot. The man aimed the gun at a young girl and fired. Daniels pushed her out of the way and took the blast himself. He was killed instantly. Upon learning of Daniels' murder, Dr. King stated that "one of the most heroic Christian deeds of which I have heard in my entire ministry was performed by Jonathan Daniels."

The civil rights movement continued, growing attention to injustice with each event, each march, and sadly, each death. The story of Jonathan Daniels is now part of the Civil Rights Memorial in Montgomery. Daniels is remembered as one who sacrificed his life for another one.

### **Berdine Logar Rittenhouse**

Berdine Logar Rittenhouse, 91, of Lillian, passed away July 6, 2021, in Pensacola. She was born to Edward and Alice Singley Logar in Weston, Penn., on Jan. 4, 1930. In addition to her parents, she was preceded in death by her husband, Junior LeRoy Rittenhouse, and her brother, Edward "Edle" Logar.

Berdine was a loving wife, mother, grandmother and sister. She was a member of Lillian United Methodist Church.

She graduated from Black Creek Township High School and attended Bloomsburg State Teachers College earning a bachelor's degree in business. She went on to obtain a master's degree from the University of Alabama-Birmingham with a specialization in genealogical records. She became a business teacher and taught genealogy at Pensacola State University and at the University of South Alabama in their elder hostel program. She also taught at Marion College in Roanoke, Va., and worked for General David Sarnoff, who had been CEO of RCA at the Pentagon during the Korean War.

Berdine was an expert in genealogy, especially Pennsylvania-German history. She and Dot Brown pioneered the genealogy movement in the 1980s in south Alabama and west Florida, co-founding the West Florida Genealogical Society, where she then served as president. She also co-founded the Baldwin County Genealogical Society and was a genealogist for the Rittenhouse Family Association for many years, tracing her family linage back to 1588 in Germany. She was awarded an honorary life membership for her contributions to the association.

Berdine was also a passionate gardener and loved the outdoors. She served as a member of the Lillian Garden Club, Lillian book club, Daughters of the American Revolution, Helping Hands and Sarah's Circle. She was a founding member of Celebrate Recovery at Lillian United Methodist Church and also founded the committee that added the carillon and steeple to the Shepherd of the Bay Lutheran Church in Lillian.

Berdine performed at The Little Theatre in Richmond, Va. She won best supporting actress for the season at the Little Theatre of Charlotte. She was creative, a gifted writer of short stories and a fabulous storyteller. She was a beautiful, passionate soul who lived life to the fullest.

Survivors include her son, David Rittenhouse, of Lillian; a brother, William Rittenhouse, of Grafton, W.V.; and her grandson, Nathan Rittenhouse of Miami Beach.

Services were held July 12 at Lillian United Methodist Church with Rev. Daniel Randall officiating. A committal service followed at Barrancas National Cemetery, Pensacola Naval Air Station.


