Do You Know What an Overdose Looks Like?

August 31 is International Overdose Awareness Day. <u>93,331</u> <u>Americans died from drug overdoses in 2020</u>, including illicit drugs and prescription opioids—compared to 16,849 drug overdose deaths in 1999. Here are common signs of overdose for opioid drugs:

- No response to stimuli
- Shallow, labored or no breathing
- Cannot be woken up
- Snoring or gurgling
- Blue/grey lips or finger tips
- Floppy arms or legs

Overdose symptoms vary depending on the substance used. Click to see common overdose signs for <u>alcohol</u>, <u>depressants</u>, <u>opioids</u>, <u>psychoactive substances</u> and <u>stimulants</u>. If you or a loved one have a substance use issue, call us at 813.246.4899 for help.

Meet Lori Provenzano

In August, <u>Amethyst Respite Center</u> (ARC) celebrates its 12th anniversary from its initial opening. Started as initially as a place for law enforcement to bring people who were inebriated to dry out, the ARC has evolved through the years, said Program Director Lori Provenzano. "Originally, the ARC was used for police to bring

people to avoid taking them to hospitals and other stabilization units and clients stayed for 3-10 days," she said. "Now, the ARC is licensed as a Level IV Residential Treatment program, so we typically have clients stay for 30 – 45 days getting the help they need in a safe environment." In the past, people had to be brought in by law enforcement, but now anyone can admit to the ARC which currently has 26 beds in a secure facility. In addition to the traditional ARC program, Lori oversees the Mental Health Jail Diversion Program and the Comprehensive Opiate Abuse Program, which is a partnership with Tampa Police Department. Tampa Police Department Partners with ACTS on Behavioral Health Unit

On July 15, Tampa City Council approved a contractual agreement between ACTS and the Tampa Police Department to move forward with a Behavioral Health Unit. The unit will include four officers and four mental health professionals, where they will work in teams to respond to mental health calls. This is a one-year pilot program with the anticipation of expansion in the future. The unit



is still searching for additional licensed mental health professionals to join the team.
