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Pastor's Perspective

John Wesley was a great believer in making life better for people—particularly for people on the margins of society. Because of that, he worked tirelessly to address the social ills of the society in his day. He helped to bring about the change in labor laws for children—no longer wanting kids as young as four being sent off to factories where their tiny little fingers could access spaces that adult fingers could not reach. Besides working to change labor laws that put young children into the workforce (12 hours/day, 6 days/week) to help feed their families, the Wesley brothers and the early Methodist movement began to address the issue of literacy. Public education was not yet in place in England—and certainly not in the "colonies"—and only the children of those who could afford tutors or private schools were being taught to read and write. To address this issue, John and his friends worked to establish Sunday Schools.

In the beginning, Sunday School's purpose was to teach children to read. Because books were very expensive and not easily available, Bibles were seen as the primary resource for reading material. Of course, the purpose for choosing the Bible was two-fold; not only to teach children to read, but to teach them the stories of the Bible and introduce them to the Christian faith as well. Sunday was the day chosen for these schools because it was the only day when these children did not work, so it was the only day available for such an activity. One schedule for the day was class time from 10:00-1:00, a break for a bit to eat and time to worship, and then time to return to class. Time was not limited to just learning reading from the Bible, but also learning to write and work with numbers. Children were encouraged to take their lessons home and share them with their parents (because John Wesley believed that the home had an important part to play in educating a child). Through this practice, many adults also learned to read and write, and so the practice of sending a child to Sunday School even if the parent did not attend church regularly, was born.

Because John Wesley felt that learning was so important, the Methodist Movement began to establish schools that would educate adults as well. As the

changing work climate unfolded, Sunday Schools also adapted and changed, eventually becoming the active programs of the 1950s-2000s, including the addition of Vacation Bible School and summer camps. Our world looks very different than the one in which John Wesley felt it was important to begin a place and time to teach all children to read...write... and "do numbers". It has also changed a great deal from the Sunday School that shaped me and many of the adults in our congregation.

Why the history lesson? Because we are in the process of changing "Sunday School" once again! In response to changes in our society and different needs for educating ourselves in the Bible and Christian Formation, we are establishing Wednesday night programming for all ages, particularly focusing on the needs and schedules of our families. We are calling this program: Family Matters. In John Wesley's England, the work week was pretty rigidly set to 12 hour days, 6 days a week; work on Sunday was strictly forbidden (some even argued against Sunday School for this very reason). Sunday was set aside as a day for church and family. This is very much not our day, where work is often far less defined, likely to spill over into weekend time, as are school and sports events; chaotic schedules are the norm, Sunday School's purpose is not to teach our children to read and write, and our SS teachers are unpaid volunteers who are often working full-time jobs with their own chaotic schedules.

We are creating a time for families to eat together... worship together...and then at the same time to study the Christian faith in groups geared to various ages and interests. Beginning **September 4th**, we will host our first **Family Matters**, beginning with dinner at **6:00 pm**. Dinner will be followed by **Worship led by a multi-generational Praise Band**, and then groups will disburse for various **Small Groups**. You are invited to come and be part of the Family of God, gathered at Gothenburg's First United Methodist Church! I look forward to seeing you then...Blessings! Pastor Jamie
