#### Never Underestimate a Mom or Her Child

A partially deaf boy came home from school one day carrying a note from officials at the school. The note suggested that the parents take the boy out of school, claiming that he was "too stupid to learn."

The boy's mother read the note and said, "My son Tom isn't 'too stupid to learn.' I'll teach him myself." And so she did.

When Tom died many years later, the people of the United States of America paid tribute to him by turning off the nation's lights for one full minute.

It was "this Tom" that had invented the light bulb. He also invented motion pictures and the record player. In all, he had more than one thousand patents to his credit. <sup>1</sup>

This is what Thomas Edison had to say about his mother: "I did not have my mother long, but she cast over me an influence which has lasted all my life. The good effects of her training I can never lose.

"If it had not been for her appreciation and her faith in me at a critical time in my experience, I should never likely have become an inventor. I was always a careless boy, and with a mother of different mental caliber, I should have turned out badly.

"Her firmness, her sweetness, her goodness were potent power to keep me in the right path. My mother was the making of me." <sup>2</sup>



## The Acmar Community Quilt

In spring of 1955, S.T. Kimbrough, Jr. "Steve" drove his Mercury hardtop convertible over dusty rut-filled roads looking for the Acmar Community Church. Even though he had directions, he got lost several times. He arrived at the church at exactly 11 am. He slipped into the sanctuary and sat on the back left pew. The Sunday School teacher finished his closing prayer. He looked up and said, "Well, doesn't look like the Bishop sent us a preacher." In his suit, tie, and white buck shoes, Steve raised his hand and said, "It's me!" The congregation was stunned. The Bishop had sent them an 18-year-old basketball player from Birmingham Southern College! Due to the timing of his birthday and Annual Conference, Steve had received his license to preach when he was 15-years-old. They didn't want to wait a whole year until he would be the appropriate 16 years of age! As you might suspect, Acmar was his first appointment.



Steve Kimbrough grew up in a musical family. He was pleased to hear how Lois James beautifully played the piano. "Rock" Nation sat on a stool to her right in the corner. When the offering was received, Steve was surprised when Rock stood and played, "Whispering Hope," on his saxophone. Having been raised in his talented family, during his time at Acmar, Steve was able to provide some helpful tips for Mr. Nation and his saxophone. When he served at Acmar, most of the congregation came to the church each Sunday, and Baptist and Methodist preachers rotated Sundays. Steve was paid \$18.75 for each of the two monthly Sundays that he preached. The congregation was concerned that it cost him more than he received especially when he busted his oil pan on the roads. His mother, however, suggested to Steve that, based on his sermons, he was probably overpaid! All in all, it was a blessed experience for the congregation and Steve. He has spoken of the love, nurturing, and training that he received from the congregation that welcomed him as their pastor. Steve mentioned that three people came to the altar to receive Jesus Christ as their Lord and Savior during his preaching at Acmar. And all three joined the Baptist church!!

Every Sunday Mr. and Mrs. Hurst invited young Steve for Sunday lunch. There was a spread of meats, garden vegetables, and pie. Every Sunday, Mr. Hurst asked, "Do you know what kind of pie I like?" Steve would dutifully reply, "No, what kind of pie do you like?" Mr. Hurst would say, "Hot and cold!" To this day, Steve still laughs.



After serving at Acmar, Steve became Youth Director at Canterbury Methodist Church for a year before leaving to attend Duke Divinity School in 1958, and received his seminary degree. He has gone on to many great accomplishments. His primary ministry focus has been through his musical gifts. He served for many years as the Director of Music for the General Board of Ministries of the United Methodist Church. He has been described as a "remarkable singer, with a cultivated, easily flowing baritone of fine quality and a rare command of words and rhythms, (*The New Yorker*) and a "master of vocal art" (*La Stampa*, Rome). His voice has been praised as "magnificent and pure liquid gold" (*The Birmingham Post-Herald*). He made his operatic debut in 1968, in Mantova, Italy as a winner of the American Opera Auditions. He has sung nationally throughout the United States and internationally in such countries as Italy, Austria, Germany, Brazil, and many more. Steve is a recording artist, author, and has appeared on TV and in films.

S.T. Kimbrough, Jr. is now living in Durham, North Carolina. On Sunday, March 6, 2022, Steve drove the now paved roads to revisit Acmar United Methodist Church. Many things were different, but many good things were the same. Once again, he surprised the congregation, but he certainly was not a stranger this time!
