

The Reverend's Ruminations - April 2022

As I sat down to "ruminate" for this month's newsletter I took a glance back at April reflections past, and found it almost hard to believe that exactly two years ago I was discussing what a difference a month had made—a seemingly innocuous comment that might ordinarily preface an observation about spring weather changes. However, we all realize that the change was in fact the exponential worldwide and national spread of COVID-19 that had ignited massive, unprecedented changes to our world—changes that most of us never could have imagined two years ago (or even the *month* prior, back in 2020). We were about to enter uncharted territory, with "shelter in place" orders, mask mandates, and sudden, complete changes to the way we "did church," as well as so many other aspects of our lives.

Fast forward two years to this April and *most* of the major restrictions have been loosened. Church—as well as most aspects of society in a small, southern Minnesota town—have gradually returned to some semblance of what we knew as "normal." We are certainly not completely clear from the COVID pandemic, but two years have seen lots of changes and growth in the ways we're dealing with it.

One of the things that has been on many of our minds recently is the Russian invasion of their sovereign, democratic neighbor, Ukraine. The reports and the accompanying photos and videos of the sheer destruction being inflicted—much of it indiscriminately targeting innocent civilians—are almost more than many of us can bare. "Thoughts and prayers" may seem hollow, but I do hope that each of us are at least lifting them to God in an effort to bring about peace.

As I opened my copy of this year's UCC Lenten devotional, *The Long Haul*, I found myself contemplating the incredible strength and resistance of the Ukrainian people as I read from the March 23rd reflection on Numbers 13:17-18, entitled "Investigation Incomplete," by Rev. Kenneth L. Samuel, pastor of Victory for the World Church (UCC) in Stone Mountain, GA. Realizing that the submissions for this year's devotional would have been written and submitted at least a couple months prior, I was struck by the connection I saw to the situation continuing to unfold in Ukraine.

For those who did not get a copy of the devotional, here is Rev. Samuel's reflection in its entirety (as stipulated by the UCC's Pilgrim Press publishing company):

After some forty years of wandering through the Sinai desert, the Israelites finally arrived at Canaan, the land they believed God promised them. But before the Israelites took possession of their promise, they thought it prudent to investigate the land of Canaan and the people living there.

So Moses, the Israelite leader, sent spies into Canaan on an intel mission. The spies were to bring back a detailed report on the quality of the land and its produce. In addition, the spies were to bring back an assessment of the Canaanites. How did they live? Were their cities structured and fortified? Were they a strong or weak people?

But the instructions Moses gave to the spies overlooked something very critical. A true assessment of who people are cannot be fully derived by observing their numbers, or their infrastructure, or their military, or their environment.

A full assessment of any people or person must involve an understanding of their values, both personal and communal. Aside from people's everyday existence, for what causes/ideals are they willing to serve and sacrifice? And how are those causes/ideals reflected in the ethos or guiding principles of the people?

Beyond what people possess, incomplete assessments of who people are lead us into battles that we are not prepared to fight and into confrontations that could have been avoided. And beyond the knowledge of how people live, an investigation of what people live for requires much more than empirical observation from a distance. It requires honest person-to-person communication.

Perhaps what Vladimir Putin also overlooked was an assessment of the incredible heart and resolve of the Ukrainian people—the determination of whom has been on full display as they fight to defend their country. As we go about our relatively unencumbered lives, let us remember that no matter the situation or location, most of what we do as Christians is best accomplished through that same honest person-to-person communication. Thinking of inviting someone to church? Need to reconcile with a friend or family member? Have something that needs to be confessed to God? Make time to do so—honestly and, if at all possible, in person!

The Council met in Heritage Hall. The meeting was called to order by Moderator, Abigail Roiger. Pastor Cory led in prayer.

Larry Thompson and Dean Grotte from Facilities board informed us about an important change in the amount of stone needing to be replaced by Krause Construction. More stone is needed than was realized, and the cost is therefore higher. A motion to approve the extra funding for the stone project was M/S/C (Marilyn/Ellen).

Minutes of the February meeting were approved as printed. Motion M/S/C (Ellen/Kay).

A Zoom with Dan Hamlet about investments was tabled for the April Council meeting after technical difficulties.

Pastor's Report: Pastor Cory reported on his activities including home communion visits at Lakeview, home visits at Goldfinch and a funeral service at Lakeview Funeral Home.

BOARD REPORTS:

Christian Education: Ellen Germain noted that the children are doing a play on Palm Sunday, Confirmation Sunday is being set, and they are doing the Community Meal this month.

Hospitality: Cathy Celander reported that they did not meet this month. They have signed up and are working on the advertising for the Pie Social on June 11th.

Facilities: Larry Thompson reported that they will be getting the Little Free Pantry up soon.

Diaconate: Sue Kruse shared that we were able to have a normal Communion in March.

Missions: Izzy Cruz reported that the February Blessing Box offering for One Great Hour of Sharing was \$310. The MN Food Drive is the recipient of the March Blessing Box. February's Free Community Meal was hosted by Rotary and served 105 meals.

Worship: Dave Adams informed us that 25 palms have been ordered for Palm Sunday. Planning for Easter is in process.

Personnel: Jenny Willard will return in April.

OLD BUSINESS:

COVID changes: We will not be signing in. Masking sign changes will be made by Pastor Cory to reflect case numbers.

Pastor Cory closed with a prayer, and the meeting was adjourned by Abigail Roiger.





HyVee and Fareway Receipts Report Report as of 20 March 2022

During the last four weeks \$11,340.3 (7.56%) worth of Hy-Vee slips were received. After 34 weeks, Hy-Vee is at \$128,317.49 (85.54%) toward the 14^{th} \$150,000 goal. There were not as many from Hy-Vee as there had been in the past, so the next \$150,000 could still be reached around the 17^{th} of April 2022.

During the same four weeks, 9,011.97 (6.01%) worth of Fareway slips were received. After 63 weeks, Fareway is at 86,922.87 (57.95%) toward our 4th 150,000 goal. It will still take about a year to reach the 150,000.

This program started the first of March 2011, so any slips from then until now can be used. Any Fairmont Fareway and Hy-Vee food store register slip can be used. Even slips from Hy-Vee Gas, Coffee Shop, Food Service, and Pharmacy help us toward the goal. Thanks to all who bring/mail the slips to the Church, or mailing them or dropping them off at my house. Even the very small amounts help.





Sue (Bork) Kruse was born in Fairmont, Minnesota. She was only three weeks old when her father died so they moved to live with her Grandma Gladys Blatti (Blatti's Laundry).

Her family often traveled to Colorado to visit her Mom's sister Jean. Sue is happy that her middle name is "Jean".

Sue graduated from Fairmont High School in 1990 and went to Jackson Vo-Tech for Nursing Aide for about a year. She worked at the Lutz Wing in Fairmont as a Certified Nurse's Aide and also at Truman Lutheran. She moved on and became a Home Health Nurse--now about 20 years. Sue joined our church while Rev. Lyle Norris was here. (Randy joined our church later.)



Randy & Sue met at a friend's house in 1993 and they started dating. She was really happy when he asked her to marry him. They were married in our church 2015 by Rev. Scott Wachholz--the brother of Sue's best friend Jody Wacholz. They are like a family to her since she has lost all of her immediate family to heart attacks over the years.

Sue enjoys helping at church in many different ways. She is on the Church Council and has served on many, many committees.

POPOVERS

2 eggs

1 c. flour

1 c. milk

1/2 t. salt

Heat oven to 450. Generously grease 6 cup popover cups with shortening. Heat popover pan in oven 5 minutes.

Beat eggs slightly with whisk. Beat in remaining ingredients just until smooth. Bake 20 minutes. Reduce oven temp to 325. Bake 10 to 15 minutes longer until deep golden brown. Remove from cups immediately.
