John Ortberg is a Christian author, speaker and senior pastor of the Menlo Presbyterian Church in Menlo Park, CA. In his book <u>The Life You've Always Wanted: Spiritual Disciplines for Ordinary People</u>, we find this convicting statement:

"Love and hurry are fundamentally incompatible. Love always takes time, and time is the one thing hurried people don't have" (p. 87).

On the very next page, we find an added layer:

It is because it kills love that hurry is the great enemy of spiritual life. Hurry lies behind much of the anger and frustration of modern life. Hurry prevents us from receiving love from the Father or giving it to His children. That's why Jesus never hurried. If we are to follow Jesus, we must ruthlessly eliminate hurry from our lives-because, by definition, we can't move faster than the one we are following (88).

Oooh, that last line is a doozy: "we can't move faster than the one we are fallowing," because, if we do, we are no longer following!

I agree with Ortberg; from what I gather from the gospels, Jesus was never in a hurry. He always took time to relate to people and their situations. He took breaks to recharge, but he gave his time and lent his compassion moment after moment, day after day. He saw the bigger picture of what his Father was wanting to accomplish. He realized that his own exercise of selfless compassion complimented the Father's will. And he knew that taking his time was absolutely necessary to continue his role.

I've shared this before in one of my sermons. Noted preacher and hymn writer Philip Brooks, known for his great patience, was spotted by one of his friends feverishly pacing his floor. His friend asked him what was wrong. Philip replied, "The trouble is that I'm in a hurry, but God isn't!" (Excerpted From a sermon by Gordon Curley, Beware of Detours, 11/18/2010).

Like Brooks, we are often in a hurry. Our schedules, our wants, and our needs as well as family and work pressures, not to mention the bombardment of information in this information age, has us constantly on the run or almost always distracted. What is one to do?


The easy answer is: slow down. The more probable and harder answer is: "But I don't have time." Well, all of us have the same amount of time in a day – 24 hours. One wise person once told me, "Make your own schedule, or someone else will make it for you." We may simply need to literally schedule some down time – a moment for quiet and listening – in order to minimize hurry. The reward is the rekindling of our relationship with the Master of Time. Think about this as we enter a new year. A few more moments slowing down for spiritual nurture or recharging can make a big difference in 2020! Getting in touch more regularly with the supreme lover of our soul will help us to slow down enough to share that love!


