A Holiday Thought

Rabbi Moshe Abramowitz (From a theme suggested by Aish HaTorah)

While the world in turmoil and our lives upturned by the COVID-19 crisis, it is difficult to find a positive message for the upcoming Pesach season. In the writings found on the Aish Hatorah website, the words of Rabbi S.R. Hirsch zt"l (1808-1888, Hamburg-Frankfurt, Germany) can provide a thought provoking perspective.

Rabbi Hirsch wrote that closing "all synagogues by Jewish hands would constitute the strongest protest against the abandonment of the Torah in home and life." With obviously no knowledge of the coronavirus, in the late 1800s Rabbi Samson Raphael Hirsch wrote this chilling paragraph:

"If I had the power I would provisionally close all synagogues for a hundred years. Do not tremble at the thought of it, Jewish heart. What would happen? Jews and Jewesses without synagogues, desiring to remain such, would be forced to concentrate on a Jewish life and a Jewish Home. The Jewish officials connected with the synagogue would have to look to the only opportunity now open to them – to teach young and old how to live a Jewish life and how to build a Jewish home. All synagogues closed by Jewish hands would constitute the strongest protest against the abandonment of the Torah in home and life." – (as quoted in the "Introduction by Translator to Horeb, "The Classification of the Mitzvoth," p.1xix)

Our current coronavirus-inspired quarantined existence is hopefully the closest we'll ever get to witnessing Rabbi Hirsh's alien reality of shuls being locked down. That being said, Rabbi Hirsch saw something that was and is in dire need of rectification. Could this be the time we actually do something about it?

For far too long the synagogue has replaced the home in its centrality to Jewish life. Certainly, synagogues are ideal places for Jewish gatherings, communal prayer, and life-cycle celebrations. But life plays itself out primarily in the home, surrounded by the most profound influences any of us will ever know – our parents.

A Holiday Thought continued

Rabbi Hirsch's point is that Judaism and Torah need to be brought to life specifically in our homes if we want them to shape the next generation of Jews. We need to get the Torah out of the ark and into our living rooms!

And without a synagogue to go to, many of us are doing just with families praying together on their couches. Many organizations have increased their

online presence, and the plethora of learning opportunities available for download or livezooming on our digital devices allows for a steady stream of inspiring and spiritual thoughts to fill our abodes. It is within our powers to turn this period of global uncertainty into a precious opportunity for familial value-sharing and growth.

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A SEDER VORT:

Rabbi Ephraim Mirvis, Chief Rabbi of the UK.

In Shul every year on Pesach morning, I find that after saying 'Good Yom Tov', the first two questions that people pose to others are 'How was your seder?' and 'At what time did it finish?'

There is a perception out there, that the longer your seder lasts, the frummer you are. Actually, that's not necessarily the case. In the Mishna Masechet Pesachim there is a fascinating debate between Beit Shammai and Beit Hillel, with regard to Hallel. Beit Shammai tell us that before the meal, we recite the first paragraph of Hallel. Beit Hillel say that we must recite the first two paragraphs, and that's what we do.

Isn't it interesting that both Beit Shammai and Beit Hillel agree that we uncharacteristically split Hallel in two and we don't complete it before the meal. You see the second paragraph starts with the words *B'zeit Yisrael mi-Mitzrayim*, referring to our exodus from Egypt, and that is the primary theme of Maggid, the central part of the seder before the meal. That is because they both agree that there are some hungry people around the table, usually children and to be honest sometimes adults, and we shouldn't keep them waiting. At the seder we need to empathise with those who are there; don't drag it out so that it becomes too long, because you might lose the attention span of some of the participants. You could have a seder scenario through which, going into the early hours of the morning could afford you the opportunity to have an enthralling, inspirational seder experience by taking a long time to go into the inner depths of secrets of what is presented to us. It's quite possible that even with a short seder you have achieved the perfect Pesach experience

In other contexts, doing that will actually be a punishment for those around the table, because sometimes, in an educational context, it's brevity through which you can make the greatest mark and impact. As a result therefore, if your answer to the question 'At what time did your seder end?' is not 3 or 4am, give your answer with pride, because it's quite possible that even with a short seder you have achieved the perfect Pesach experience.
