

Do you want to be the Greatest?

Do you want to be great? Do you want to do great things? Surely, we all want to be great and want to do great things too. There is nothing wrong with that. After all, we call God, who created us in his image, a great God, don't we? So, we are destined to be great. Probably greatness is in our DNA. Wow...isn't that amazing to know that we are born to be great? But wait a minute: what do we mean by "being great?"

Throughout our history there have been many different understandings of "greatness" or "being great." There are some classical examples worth mentioning. Adam and Eve, for instance, thought that being great means becoming like God with a possibility of becoming more powerful than the God who created them (Gen.3:1-24). This led them to give in to temptation, of eating the forbidden fruit. Surely, they were wrong and were forced to leave Eden as a result of their arrogance. Others understand being great means ability to show the might of human mind and technology. The construction of the Tower of Babel is an example of this (Gen 11:1-9). But God confused their language which led to the destruction of the tower of foolishness. Many people think that being great means having power, wealth and fame. King Herod, who called himself Herod the great, during whose sovereignty Jesus was born, is an example of this. He was known for building many fortresses, palaces and monuments, of which all were attributed to his greatness. But he was harsh to people. He even killed three of his own children. When Jesus was born, he wanted to get Him killed too. For him, Jesus was a threat to his greatness. For King Herod, greatness means having individual plans, pleasures and purposes above the lives of others and often at the cost of others. He was great because he was able to bring everything centered on him. Nowadays greatness is often associated with wealth, power and fame. One is great when one is rich, powerful and famous. If you are in the list of billionaires, you'll appear in Forbes Magazine. And often for accumulating wealth, clinging on to power and fame, one sacrifices others including one's own dignity.

Do you think Jesus was impressed with such understanding of greatness or being great? Of course not! He definitely dismissed them as false. We recall His temptations in the desert. Greatness rooted in wealth, power and fame was offered to Him. But He refused to accept it. For Jesus, it was a false greatness.

He taught his disciples the new meaning of being great. He said, 'if you want to be the first that is the greatest, you must be the servant of all.' Jesus knew very well the right moment to pass His teaching on the true meaning of greatness to His disciples. He was aware of the "power struggle" among His disciples for the top position in the core group. Surprisingly, He didn't scold them. He probably understood this natural desire to be great. But He corrected their understanding of being great. According to Jesus, true greatness does not depend on being served by others but in serving others. It is in the service of others that one discovers one's greatness. Further explaining the new vision of being great, Jesus took a little child and brought the child into the midst of His disciples. The children, in Jesus' time, were considered lowly, marginalized, overlooked, vulnerable, and deserved less attention. Jesus warned His disciples that unless they were willing to receive and care for a child, that is lowly and vulnerable, they were not great. Thus, being great lies not in having wealth, power or fame, but in the service of others. Our service to the marginalized, vulnerable, voiceless and those suffering social injustice, makes us even greater. Jesus did not simply teach us the new understanding of greatness but also gave us His life examples. He was always at the service of others. He preached the Good News to the crowd, cured the sick, mute, and dumb, gave sight to the blind, healed the lepers, consoled the afflicted, and even raised the dead. The purpose of His service to others was to bring joy and life to others. He said, 'I came that they may have life, and have it abundantly' (John 10:10). Jesus was truly a man of His words for He himself said, 'The Son of Man did not come to be served, but to serve, and to give his life as a ransom for many' (Matt.20:28). He sacrificed His own life

We all want to be great and do great things in our lives. As followers of Jesus Christ, let us earnestly seek for greatness that is rooted not in wealth, power and fame, but in the service of others especially the least of the brothers and sisters of Jesus. Fr Aloysius




