


School Employee Focus Groups ≈ 295 employees

Responses collected during an unstructured conversation about what students need in order to achieve educational excellence.

- 1. to discover their passions and interests through engagement in community activities such as sports, music and volunteering
- 2. to be ready to start school
- 3. a family with access to parent education
- 4. to graduate from high school with a post high school plan
- 5. positive social behaviors and receive mental health care as needed
- 6. physical, mental, and academic fitness (basic needs met)
- 7. to **read** at grade level
- 8. access to community mentorships and/or apprenticeships
- 9. appropriate, supervised recreation in the community (especially teens and tweens)
- 10. access to **transportation** for participation in community activities.
- 11. connections to people from other races and live in a community with leadership that reflects our global diversity






Community Agency Focus Groups ≈ 50 employees and volunteers

- 9. physical health






Parent Focus Groups ≈ 140 parents

- 13. access to mentors in the community






Community Focus Groups ≈ 180 community members

Responses collected during an unstructured conversation about what students need in order to achieve educational excellence.

- 1. to participate in areas of interest (music, sports, and volunteering) in our community, and be recruited if necessary so participation reflects our diverse community
- 2. to be **ready** to start kindergarten
- 3. to receive top AP and ACT scores and attend elite colleges
- 4. to explore interests in the trades, agriculture, and food science
- 5. to have their stories of their successes told, positive public relations communication
- 6. to have positive relationships with adults in the community
- 7. to have parents engaged in education (parents are a child's first and most important teacher)
- 8. to have access to affordable, structured and safe recreation outside of school
- 9. to develop life skills such as a strong work ethic, problem solving and leadership skills
- 10. to graduate from high school with a plan for college or career
- 11. to have basic needs met
- 12. to have their mental health needs met
- 13. to have high quality **teachers** who deliver individualized instruction
- 14. to have access to academic support in and outside of school
- 15. to learn to **read** by third grade
