Boy Scouts from Troop 4 continue to make impressive progress removing saltcedars from Feather Lake II, the stormwater basin immediately west of our Feather Lake Wildlife Sanctuary. Eagle Scout Alex Carrillo led one project in November, and Eagle candidate Juan-Carlos Franco is currently leading another. Eagle candidate Carlos Gonzalez is next on deck. The scouts are doing excellent work and are having an important influence on the trajectory of vegetation development at Feather Lake II. A casual observer looking across the 10.5-acre central basin might not notice any change, but to a careful observer, it is dramatic.

Meanwhile, back at Feather Lake I, arrowweed (*Pluchea sericea*) continues to occupy large areas in the uplands surrounding the basin. Pruning and clearing is needed in some areas and will be the task for our next workday. It takes place **Sat.**, **February 6**, starting at **9 a.m.**

Feather Lake is located at 9500 North Loop at Bordeaux in El Paso, 0.3 miles west of Americas Ave. COVID-19 safety guidelines remain in place. Bring your mask.



This winter, El Paso County Water Improvement District No.1 is working to complete lining the Riverside Canal

along the east side of Rio Bosque Wetlands Park with concrete. The pace of work picked up noticeably after the Martin Luther King holiday. Access to Rio Bosque is still open via the levee road along the canal, but if you visit during the week, be careful in areas where work is in progress and be prepared for temporary delays to allow for movement of construction equipment.

Tours at the park continue, but they remain subject to possible cancellation if COVID-19 conditions so dictate. Due to the pandemic, tours are limited to 9 participants plus the tour leader, and masks are required. 
