


GOING DEEPER - Understanding Active Participation -

The Catholic Mass is not about me! (It's communal; it is in giving that we receive)

As we come to the last bulletin article of this series on understanding the Catholic Mass (inspired by the 3-year Eucharistic Revival of the Catholic Church in the U.S.A.), the last article is quite fittingly about how the Mass is always communal, which means that it is not about YOU! It is certainly not about me! And that is something each and everyone of us should say when we come through the door of the church every single weekend; "Lord, help me remember that my attendance and my participation during this Mass is NOT ABOUT ME, but rather, it is about others." It is about what we can give rather than about what we can get. What can you give to God? What can you give to other people through God's grace? Those are the most important questions when we come to Mass.

All of us have grown up in a very individualistic world where most of our lives are naturally focused on our own wants, needs, desires, dreams, and hopes. Most of us are not horrible, terrible people in this sense, but we do need to check ourselves very dramatically at times to ask God, "how can I make my life more about YOU and less about me?" Mass is a perfect example of this problem and the potential solution that God offers to us. When a lot of people come to Mass, we all tend to focus on what part of this worship or celebration could be better to allow me to have a better experience? For example, we might say, "I wish the music would be better in this way or in that way," or we might say, "I wish the temperature was more comfortable" or "I wish the preaching was better" or "I wish these people didn't distract me so much!" or "I wish the church had more decorations in this way or in that way." The list truly goes on and on forever. The point I'm trying make here, is that yes, of course, all of us should be striving to make every Catholic Mass as beautiful, and as devout, and as prayerful, and as insightful, and as peaceful as possible. However, our mindset should be focused on two things – what can I actually control? And more importantly, what can I do for God and for other people when I'm here?!

When people ask me, as a Catholic priest, a question about, "why does the Catholic Church still believe that Catholics need to be at Mass every single Sunday?" (**other than health or weather emergencies), I usually begin with this exact point. Yes, it is true that "Keep Holy the Sabbath Day" is a commandment and is referring to attending Mass each and every Sunday, but on a very personal level, I usually appeal to this aspect of our faith where we are focused on giving to others rather than just getting for ourselves. If God is going to bring us to be with Him in heaven forever, and we are going to be perfectly happy and fulfilled forever in simply being with God and loving Him and worshipping Him in that sense, THEN wouldn't it make sense that at least once a week, we come to give Him that love and that worship and that glory that He deserves? And to give to others as far as the Body of Christ around the world as well as our local part of the Church, at least once a week? The beauty of this truth is that when we give to God what He deserves, then God returns what we try our best to give back in an overflowing gift to us of His grace and His very Divine Life. When we make the Mass NOT about ourselves, then we can finally begin to receive that God is primary actor in our hearts at Mass. God is the primary actor in our souls when we hear the Scripture readings and the homily. God is the primary actor in our minds when we sing, or pray, or worship Him. When we pray for the people sitting near us or try to say hi to them and meet them after Mass is over, when we pray for the church and the entire world throughout the Mass, and when we offer our entire lives to God as a sacrificial prayer, THEN we can realize that God is trying to break through our hardened hearts and give us His peace, His joy, and His grace. May we thank God that He calls us at least once a week to make something NOT about ourselves, and may we thank Him to loving us so much at the Catholic Mass, that our reception of His Word, Jesus Christ, can transform us and change us from the inside out to worship God in all that we do and all that are throughout our lives as we prepare for heaven.



Today we celebrate the feast of Epiphany. Epiphany means manifestation or a sign of God's presence. When we have an epiphany, we understand or see something from a new perspective.

What do we celebrate on Epiphany? Who are the Maqi?

You may think of the Magi as the Three Kings, but the Gospel never mentions kings. The Magi were probably scholars, or wise men, who studied stars. The likely served a king who counted on them for information and predictions.

How many Magi were there?

The Gospel does not tell us how many . Most nativity scenes have three magi. This idea came from the fact the three gifts were offered to the baby Jesus.

The Magi regularly studied the stars. This time, the extraordinary star they saw in the sky caused them to leave home and follow the star. The star settled over the place where Jesus was born. The Magi were strangers, people from another country, yet Mary and Joseph welcomed them. The Magi honored Jesus and offered gifts to him.

Like Mary and Joseph, we can share Jesus with others. We do this both by words and actions. We can share stories about Jesus. We share Jesus when we are kind, generous, loving and welcoming. You could be like the star the Magi followed and lead others to Jesus.

Living or Faith: Do two thinks this week to share Jesus with others.




