Students will be inspired by the historic stories about Black Civil War veterans, business owners, and community leaders and how they overcame adversity to create their livelihoods in Appleton.

The tour includes challenging conversations about Appleton as a sundown town and helps students consider ways to indentify and evaluate primary sources used to uncover marginalized history.

How national figures challenged Appleton to become a place of equity and inclusion, such as Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. and Dr. Angela Davis.
