The Reverend's Ruminations - April 2024

"In like a lion, out like a lamb" is the old saying, but it seems that we really got to experience the converse this year!?! Maybe I shouldn't have spent so much of last month's "rumination" talking about the possibilities for March after what had been such a dry and warm February. And yet, as I began my Holy Week preparations and leaned (cautiously) into April, I did find myself reflecting on those very words I penned last month:

"Perhaps in a way, it would actually be helpful to have a cold and snowy [early] March... while I don't necessarily prefer the cold, snow, and ice of a "normal" Minnesota March, don't those conditions more readily invite you to spend time spend a bit more time by a crackling fire, praying or reading your Bible or a Lenten devotional?... Maybe being forced inside by biting windchills wouldn't automatically change your perspective, but then again, maybe it would inspire more reflection for some of us."

Likely many of you disagreed with that thought during most of March, but now that the joy and promise of the Easter season have once again arrived, wouldn't you agree that a bit of "suffering" — whether through a bit of nasty early spring snow or through your chosen form of Lenten reflection or sacrifice — made the miracle of Jesus' resurrection even more joyful and powerful?

But now that we've celebrated that most holy and blessed day of our faith, what are we to do? "Easter people" sounds like a clever nickname in the midst of the Easter Sunday celebration, so how do we live into that name in the days, weeks, and months ahead? Believe it or not, the Easter celebration is <u>not</u> just one big Sunday when we put on a new dress or tie, greet some of the folks that last came to church on Christmas Eve, and add an Easter egg hunt to entice the kids. In the seasons of the church, we are now in **Eastertide**, the fifty days from Easter Sunday to Pentecost Sunday. Let's live like it!

Over the last forty days, did you spend some time with our UCC Lenten devotional, *Bend*? Did you spend more time in prayer or Bible reading? Did you give up a favorite snack as a symbolic participation in Christ's suffering? Good! Maybe rather than celebrating that you can now eat chocolate, have a beer, or let up on your devotional studies, you should look at what you *gained* from such practices. I'm not necessarily suggesting that you continue in that sacrificial tone, but perhaps you did in fact learn some new things about your prayer life, your Biblical understanding, or even your diet!?! I encourage you to stick with those elements of Lent that proved beneficial to you, whether spiritually or physically.

One of the best ways we can continue the celebration throughout Eastertide is to learn more about what it means to be **Christians** — from the Greek **Χριστιανός** (transliterated as Christianos), meaning followers of [Jesus] Christ. Perhaps you're familiar with C.S. Lewis' explanation of the concept in his famous book, *Mere Christianity:* "Every Christian is to become a little Christ. The whole purpose of becoming a Christian is simply nothing else."

Well, here is a great first step toward Lewis' goal: spend some time learning about the early church. Maybe you're not a history buff, but take some time (as we will be during the Sundays of April and May) to read from the Acts of the Apostles. As the introduction to Acts says in our confirmation students' NRSV Student Bible, *The Guidebook*, says:

"Think of Acts as the collection of DVD extras, bonus materials, the continuing story of the Gospels. The stories of the apostles take us behind the scenes and give us a real-life look at what happened when the followers of Christ started living out their new beliefs. Jesus was gone from the earth. He had sent the Holy Spirit to help his followers proclaim the gospel, but they still had to work out the everyday realities of living in community and obedience as they worked to share the good news of Jesus with the world. Acts is full of compromise, conflict, love, community, greed, generosity, powerful living, and [even] violent death."

Not everything about being a Christian is glamorous, but when we begin to understand what Jesus was encouraging us to be and do in the world, we each become more faithful disciples in a world that desperately needs the grace and love that our Savior offers. May your continuing, life-long journey start with the blessing of Easter and move confidently forward toward becoming more and more like Christ each and every day!

Members Present: Abigail Anderson, Amber Brummond, Kay Campe, Marilyn Forstrom, Christina Hainy, Catherine Johnson, Sherry Larson, Larry Lasch, Marcia Musser, and Abby Shoen. Members absent: Jane Kotewa, Sue Kruse. Ex-officio members present: Dara Bliesmer. Ex-officio members absent: Pastor Cory.

The Council met in Heritage Hall at 6:00 PM. Moderator Kay Campe called the meeting to order and led in prayer. A moment was taken to "celebrate generosity" for the generous giving at the "First Congo Kids' Store" that will go toward camps and the donations of Easter egg-fillers.

Motion to approve the minutes from the February 21, 2024 meeting was M/S/C (Marcia Musser/Catherine Johnson).

Treasurer's Report: Catherine Johnson estimated that the church requires \$14, 754/month to meet our obligations and goals. Giving in January and February was near that. However, some members donate their pledges at the beginning of the year. Volunteers are still needed for a short-term committee to review and make suggestions for our reserves at Edward Jones. Let Kay or Catherine know if you are interested. A motion to receive the treasurer's report was M/S/C (Abigail/Larry).

Pastor's Report: Pastor Cory was absent.

BOARD REPORTS:

Christian Education: Abby Shoen reported that the children will sing on Palm Sunday and have a "Last Supper." On Easter Sunday, the youth will read the Scripture readings and have an Easter egg hunt.

Hospitality: Sherry Larson said that they met with the Facilities board and worked on editing the Facility and Property Use document. They are still revising it.

Facilities: Larry Lasch reported meeting with Hospitality. Council also discussed the Facilities board getting contracts from vendors. After discussion about the furnace/AC unit, a motion was made for Facilities to look into and order a furnace/AC unit. (Abigail Anderson/Sherry Larson)

Hy-Vee & Fareway Report as of 24 March 2024

During the last 4 weeks, \$13,077.19 (6.54%) worth of Hy-Vee slips were received. After 16 weeks, Hy-Vee is at \$68,078.45 (32.54%) toward the 17th goal which is now \$200,000.

During the same time, \$1,806.36 (1.20%) worth of Fareway slips were received. After 51 weeks, Fareway is at \$57,990.17 (38.66%) toward our 5^{th} \$150,000 goal.

This program started the first of March 2011, so any slips from then until now can be used. Any Fairmont Fareway and Hy-Vee food store register slip can be used. Even slips from Hy-Vee Fast & Fresh (Gas), Coffee Shop, Food Service, and Pharmacy help us toward the goal. Delivery slips/sheets can also be used. Thanks to all who bring/mail the slips to the Church, or mailing them or dropping them off at my house.

MEET OUR BOARD OF THE MONTH: DIACONATE BOARD





I hope you've noticed that almost every Sunday, we share responsively in a reading from the Psalms. This book of our Bible is filled with incredible emotion — praise, struggle, triumph, hardship, and hope — many of which may have been written to be sung. The psalmist appears to have encountered many of the same highs and lows that each of us go through as the seasons of our lives unfold. But have you spent much time examining the Psalms? Now that April is upon us, why not encounter them in a new way?


Lyrics of Life is an 8-session series of short videos unpacking several of the main themes in Psalms:

We sometimes feel like we need to curate our emotions when we talk to God. But God wants us to come to him honestly, no matter what we are feeling or going through. Join Bible teacher Lisa Harper as she teaches from the book of Psalms, looking at the variety of circumstances faced by followers of God. In this eight-session series, we learn how to find comfort in any situation based on this songbook of the people of God.

Do you sometimes get the feeling that being a Christian is exclusively about how well you follow the Ten Commandments — or some other rules and regulations that feel like they were decided on by a bunch of crusty old men a hundred years ago? Well, maybe there's more to it than you think! Take some time this month to check out **A Contrarian's Guide to Knowing God:**

Sometimes what we believe about the Christian life comes from a single but prominent point of view—an older Christian we look up to, a preacher, or a parent. But is there only one way of living the life of a Jesus follower?

The Christian life—even one centered on grace—can still feel like a long list of dos and don'ts. But what if there's more (and less) to our faith than we typically believe? In this series based on his book A Contrarian's Guide to Knowing God, pastor Larry Osborne tackles popular assumptions about Christian living that create stress and failure rather than growth and joy.

Lezlee's Taco Soup

- 2 16 oz. jars mild salsa
- 2 lb. hamburger, browned
- 2 cans refried beans
- 2 cans whole kernel corn, undrained
- 2 cans black beans, rinsed & drained
- 2 pkg. taco seasoning
- 4 cans water (use empty corn can)
- 16 oz. Velveeta, cubed or shredded



Combine all ingredients in a large saucepan & stir until heated through & cheese is melted.

Serve with tortilla chips, shredded cheese, salsa, sour cream, etc.

Makes about 8 quarts.
