"WE NEED YOUR HELP"

As the efforts to obtain funding for restoration of the Octagon House gain momentum, "WE NEED YOUR HELP"! The Board of Directors finds itself stretched very thin in several areas. In addition to local fundraising efforts, such as spaghetti dinners, silent auctions, and various other events, there are multiple efforts behind the scenes that require copious amounts of time and effort by members of the board.

Currently, a business plan is being developed with the help of Cindy Fields and her staff of the Small Business Development Center located in Abingdon. A well-developed and detailed business plan is vital to procurement of grant funding of this magnitude.

The plan encompasses three major areas: the total estimated costs to complete the entire project, the educational component as it relates to Virginia's Standards of Learning (SOL's) and Common Core curriculums, and projected future abilities to support the project once completed. Thankfully, these three components have been in development for some time and are now beginning to take shape. We hope to have the plan completed by September and have it available for your viewing at the annual meeting. As this project grows, expands, and takes shape, specific areas now require more manpower than can be fulfilled by the Board alone.

As dedicated as members of the board are in their efforts, we are now at a crossroads between planning and action. Unfortunately, the action needs are now outpacing the ability of just the Board of Directors to complete. This is why, "WE NEED <u>YOUR</u> HELP".

2018 Foundation Annual Meeting

Thank you to all who attended the Annual Meeting in September 2018 to see the preliminary planning and design work of the Octagon House complex completed by VA Tech Community Assistance Design Center. Also on display were copies of the VA Tech book of Octagon House designs and "Southern Splendor", which included a section about the Octagon House.

Consortium of Smyth County's Historic Places

As we have learned through the process of applying for US Federal grants, historic places and museums in Smyth County are at a disadvantage. Any federal grant funds dispersed through agencies, such as the National Park Service, are dictated by a specific protocol. This protocol requires any grantee to have active SAM (System for Award Management) and DUNS (Data Universal Numbering System) numbers, which certify business locations in order to receive and administer federal contracts or grants. Additionally, some grants require a grantee which would distribute grant funds to more than one sub-grantee. However, the grantee must be a locally registered non-profit or certified county government.

During our recent attempt to obtain such grant funds, we were hindered by the lack of any certified non-profits having been assigned a DUNS or SAM number. The foundation approached county government officials who, after researching the issue, informed the board representative that Smyth County is not certified to disperse such funds. Only three municipal locations in Southwestern Virginia are certified to receive and disperse these specific grant funds. However, county officials are continuing to investigate the matter for feasibility and will present their findings to our board representatives.

Therefore, board member Derek Orr, in consultation with Michael Pulice of the Virginia Department of Historic Resources, is in the process of developing a planned consortium of museums and historic places within Smyth County. This consortium will be able to give one voice to our needs and strength through numbers. Many times individual entities must rely on similar entities, whatever the need or cause may be.

A public meeting will be held either in the month of May or June for all interested parties. The date will be announced in the Smyth News and Messenger, local radio stations, our FaceBook page, our website (www.smythoctagonhouse.org), and other media outlets. Please join us for this important meeting.

Holston Mills History

The Octagon House Foundation represents more than the mansion house itself. Our aim is also to educate the local populace and others about the history of the area. Holston Mills...have you heard of it?

Many would never realize that a fully functioning antebellum town once thrived around the intersection of South Fork Road, Redstone Road, and Old Mill Road west of South Fork Baptist Church, below Thomas Bridge.

Often towns were defined by their industry, their location along trade routes or railroads, or their access to natural resources. Holston Mills had a thriving textile and manufacturing industry established by the Thomas Family along the South Fork of the Holston River. Eventually, this industry was solely owned by Abijah Thomas, owner of the Octagon House.

However, Holston Mills had one institution many other settlements lacked—a post office. Many letters and correspondence still exist with the Holston Mills stamp. The original document (right), dated April 11, 1879, appointed the first US Postmaster, Edward M. Worden, to that position.
