I guess in a way, the political stage is always full of drama. When analysts and pundits say that this political season has been one of the worst, I don't know if this assessment is part of that drama



or not. But what I'm seeing and hearing is surely full of drama. Sadly, it is also real and concerns the lives of millions and the future of our country.

Both candidates have been, to say the least, like the Pharisee in the gospel today (Luke 18:9-14). Each has

consistently touted their qualities which, for them are God sent, particularly at this time in the history of the nation. Here are the words of the Pharisee:

"O God, I thank you that I am not like the rest of humanity – greedy, dishonest, adulterous – or even like this tax collector. I fast twice a week, and I pay my tithes on my whole income".

With minor adjustments, these words could easily be those of Trump and Clinton. What I don't know is whether they actually believe themselves like the Pharisee actually did. If they do, that would be indeed sadder and more tragic. It all points to pride.

On the other hand, we hear the publican or tax collector's humble prayer. Simple, and straight to the point: "O God, be merciful to me a sinner." That takes tons of courage and humility! That's a sign of mature person. No wonder he went home at peace with God.

After the debate on Wednesday night, I wonder which of the two candidates went home at peace with God. Do they even go home at peace with themselves? And I guess that's the nature of politics - it comes with the territory. Sadly.

For me, they squandered the few opportunities they had to truly humble themselves and pray like the tax collector and ask for forgiveness from the American people and from God. What we got was (and is always) a forced confession and an empty, halfhearted and short-lived apology, thanks to the media and WikiLeaks. And even as they apologized, they were still covering up a whole lot of things. Which is human so to say. But then I'd somehow expect them to not be so bold and audacious, like the Pharisee, in accusing the other candidate of the same and even worse sins. The Pharisee was even better than them - he actually didn't do what he said he didn't do. Politicians from Nigeria to the U.S. would actually do the things they boldly tell us they never did. If caught, they render a fake apology.

So, why am I wasting your time telling you what you obviously know already? As I write this, I'm very conscious that I'm ironically also behaving like the Pharisee, sitting at my desk on this warm afternoon, feeling as though I'm better than our two candidates and passing judgment on them. I guess I have to examine or judge their characters and policies to determine how to vote. But I realized that there's a politician, or a Pharisee in each of us.

We all must strive to imitate the tax collector, because together and individually we have fallen short of the glory of God. We all help to make the world a bad place to live. And we will all help to make the world, our country, our society, our homes, our beloved parish, our school, our work place, etc, a better place to live and to be.

May we all (politicians and citizens) imitate, always, the tax collector's beautiful example of humility, and may we strive to avoid the Pharisee's tragic example of pride that goes before the fall. Amen.





SIMON AND JUDE

Jude is so named by John, Luke and Acts, Matthew and



Mark call him Thaddeus. He is not mentioned elsewhere in the Gospels, except of course, where all the apostles are referred to. Scholars hold that he is not the author of the Letter of Jude. Actually, Jude had the same name as

Judas Iscariot. Evidently because of the disgrace of that name, it was shortened to "Jude" in English.

Simon is mentioned on all four lists of the apostles. On two of them he is called "the Zealot." The Zealots were a Jewish sect that represented an extreme of Jewish

nationalism. For them, the messianic promise of the Old Testament meant that the Jews were to be a free and independent nation. God alone was their king, and any payment of taxes to the Romans—the very domination of the Romans—was a blasphemy against God. No



doubt some of the Zealots were the spiritual heirs of the Maccabees, carrying on their ideals of religion and independence. But many were the counterparts of modern terrorists. They raided and killed, attacking both foreigners and "collaborating" Jews. They were chiefly responsible for the rebellion against Rome which ended in the destruction of Jerusalem in A.D. 70

COMMENT: As in the case of all the apostles except for Peter, James and John, we are faced with men who are really unknown, and we are struck by the fact that their holiness is simply taken to be a gift of Christ. He chose some unlikely people: a former Zealot, a former (crooked) tax collector, an impetuous fisherman, two "sons of thunder" and a man named Judas Iscariot.

It is a reminder that we cannot receive too often. Holiness does not depend on human merit, culture, personality, effort or achievement. It is entirely God's creation and gift.

God needs no Zealots to bring about the kingdom by force. Jude like all the saints, is the saint of the impossible: only God can create His divine life in human beings. And God wills to do so, for all of us.

QUOTE: "Just as Christ was sent by the Father, so also He sent the apostles, filled with the Holy Spirit. This He did so that, by preaching the gospel to every creature (cf. Mark 16:15), they might proclaim that the Son of God, by His death and resurrection, had freed us from the power of Satan (c. Acts 26:18) and from death, and brought us into the kingdom of His Father" (*Constitution on the Sacred Liturgy*, 6)
