
Who We Are

The C.E. and S. Foundation, Inc. was formed in 1984 as a private, non-operating family foundation. The history of the Foundation is rooted in the interest in supporting projects and initiatives that improve identifiable people's lives. Currently, the Foundation identifies, funds, and nurtures projects and organizations in the fields of Education, Global Competency, Disaster/Humanitarian Relief, and the Urban Environment. The Foundation is also dedicated to fostering philanthropic spirit and organization effectiveness through service to the field. Located in Louisville, Kentucky, the Foundation is managed by an Executive Director, an Investment Committee, and a Grants Committee and has assets in the range of \$76 million. In the past ten years, the Foundation has made more than \$63 million in grant awards.

2015 Funding Areas



In 2015 the C.E. and S. Foundation granted more than \$4MM in funding to non-profit organizations, the majority in the greater Louisville region.


These grants highlight the shift in the Foundation's focus, beginning in late 2014, to place greater emphasis on funding initiatives geared towards catalyzing

measurable improvements in educational outcomes within the cradle-to-career ecosystem in Louisville, Kentucky. Grantmaking in 2015 was largely shaped by the development and adoption of a new education grantmaking strategy. Through this strategy, the C.E. and S. Foundation allocated 62 percent of its funding to education efforts. This is a significant increase over the 44 percent allocated to funding education projects in 2014.

2015 Education Funding:

The C.E. and S. Foundation's new education grantmaking strategy includes four distinct focus areas:

- Build infrastructure to galvanize stakeholders, spur action, and measure progress;
- Prepare students for success from the start;
- Create conditions for schools to be effective and for JCPS to be the best urban district;



• Support at-risk students to college/career readiness and completion.

The Grants Committee funding decisions in 2015 supported all four of the education focus areas, with the greatest investment occurring in early learning to *Prepare Students for Success from the Start*. Based upon research that shows that children who are ready for kindergarten are much more likely to achieve academic success that carries them through to high school, college, and career success, the C.E. and S. Foundation approved two grants totaling \$750,000 to the Jefferson County Public Education Foundation to fund the expansion of Jefferson County Public Schools (JCPS) Kindergarten Readiness Camps in 2015 and 2016. By fully funding Year One expansion of the Kindergarten Readiness Camps (\$250,000), the C.E. and S. Foundation allowed JCPS to move aggressively to expand a small program that had demonstrated convincing and positive early results and had drawn the attention of state-level early childhood experts as an intervention with significant potential. Based upon the success of the first year of program expansion, Year Two funding of \$500,000 demonstrated the Foundation's interest in scaling programs that are effective so that they lead to systemic change.

With each grant awarded, the Foundation is committed to working with each partner to track progress in a meaningful way to both inform future grantmaking and identify and nurture best practices that will measurably improve education outcomes.
