- 3) How can BHNC help?
 - a. Hotline to share resources for housing intervention and pre-eviction situations
 - b. Connect seniors to social services counselors
 - c. Inclusiveness for marginalized populations in the community
 - i. Storytelling and supportive events
 - d. Advocate for ballot measures/legislation (state/local) that address housing affordability crisis, eg:
 - i. Organize to get rid of Costa-Hawkins (State legislation from 1995 that prevents cities/counties from applying rent control to units built after 1995; allows landlords to raise the rent as much as they want when a unit becomes vacant.) [Proposition 10 on November 2018 ballot would repeal Costa-Hawkins]
 - ii. Increase SF funding for homelessness [Our City Our Home proposition on November 2018 ballot provides permanent housing]
 - e. Job Training
 - f. Partner with organizations like Cole Hardware to help with home maintenance needs, "Rebuilding Together"
 - g. Connect people with "Home Match" services
 - h. Organize community pressure on market rate developers
- 4) Opportunities
 - a. Labor movement funding in development work
 - b. Safeway and Bank of America parking lots
 - c. Small sites
 - d. Tiny homes

- 5) Obstacles
 - a. Airbnb and market rate housing
 - b. NIMBY
 - c. Need for better communication and marketing
 - d. Anti-community politicians

Note: At the workshop entitled "Lifelong Education for Seniors" workshop, which was a seminar by a city college representative about continuing education, some seniors raised concerns about affordable housing: Our older neighbors—including those with Section 8 housing vouchers—are being priced out of their homes, and they fear for their future.
