TOWN BOARD 6/12/84

Curt Jordan received a permit from EnCon to dredge in front of the Hague boat launch to remove sedimentation that has filled in that area. He will work from the Hague Motel property after giving the Forest Ranger two days notice prior to commencing work.

The Board regrettably accepted the resignation of Aggie Watts as Director of the Hague Youth Program. In her letter of resignation, Aggie stated that she felt that it is a waste of tax dollars to continue the Youth Commission since the youth show a lack of interest in the program. The Board did not appoint a new Youth Director.

Additional signs are to be placed on Rt. 8 this summer by D.O.T. to warn truckers of the steep grade. These additional signs are the result of the Hague Town Board, Warren County Board of Supervisors, and Assemblyman Neil Kelleher's efforts to have additional signs since there have been seven accidents since 1979 involving non-resident truckers.

A letter from Jim Ward was read concerning the alleged changing of his property from Hamlet to Town Residential. The Board said it would look into this matter.

Dan Belden said that the septic system problem at the Town Park has been temporarily corrected. A baffle had been turned around which allegedly caused the system to back up. Belden felt that acid should be put in the leach field. Water saving (2½ gal. per flush) tanks are to be installed on the four toilets.

Linda Coffin, chairperson of the "Neighborhood Watch" program said 7 or 8 people attended the first meeting. Signs @ \$4.50 each stating that Hague is a "Neighborhood Watch Community" are to be posted around town. The Board approved the purchase of 10 signs for a cost not to exceed \$100.

Cable TV installation line work presently just north of the Country Club. Should be in

Hague shortly.

Supervisor Bolton has told Woody Cole, new Chairman of the APA that the legal fees, developmental administrator's salary, secretarial work for the Planning Board and telephone bills are too costly for a town with only 766 people. Bolton feels APA should pay these expenses.

The Board voted to remove the ladder from the north side of the Town Dock.

VIEWPOINT

I read with interest in the June 5 issue of the Times of Ti an article titled "Keep Mosquitos Controlled". It seems that Robert Means, entomologist with NYS Ecological Survey at the NYS Museum has been working on this project and has come up with the profound statement that "one of the best ways to keep the mosquito population down is to eliminate as many potential breeding places as possible." He suggests cleaning up your yard and neighboring lots, draining ditches and pools of standing water, cutting back brush and shrubbery, etc.

I would like to pose a question to Mr. Means. Did you, Mr. Means, check all this out with the APA? I have a prime example of a mosquito breeding lot - lots of underbrush, stagnant water, filled in ditches, etc. I have been going around in circles since last August to resolve this problem but I am told it is a wetland and may not be disturbed.

I'm confused. On one hand I'm told I should clean it up - on the other hand the APA says I must leave it alone. Let's get together somewhere along the way.

BEAUTY CONTEST HELD IN LAKE GEORGE

A most unusual beauty contest was recently held in Lake George Village and all of the contestants' weight was given in tons, not pounds. The contest was a part of the 1st Annual Tow Show, Towing and Recovery Assoc. Inc. These "beauties" were wreckers that had all of the equipment necessary aboard to go from the contest directly to a towing and recovery emergency.

Dick Frasier was co-chairman of the Tow Show which attracted 400 to 500 people to the 3-day event. Tow truck operators attended a seminar to improve their towing skills which included actual demonstrations of righting trucks and buses using air bags. (A set of 4 air bags, a compressor and hoses cost approximately \$15,000.) Operators also competed in a Gymkhana Roadeo which offered them the opportunity to pit their rigs and skills against other operators.

The purpose of ESTRA is to aid tow truck operators improve their professionalism through education, a process that is on-going throughout the year.

Dear Daphne:

I always thought the ice going out was the worst hazard for people living on the lake, but I found out last Saturday (June 2) that wind could be even more hazardous. One of the group that was taking the wild flower walk with Laura Meade as guide, viewed the lake from the old mine road and said, "The lake is sure rough today." Up in Graphite they just assumed it was a bit windier than usual. Little did they know what was going on at the lake level. Docks that escaped the fury of the ice and others, already rebuilt, were torn loose and carried south. I heard about one resident who spent most of the day fending off the docks that were smashing into hers. There were at least six docks that were finally pulled into the beach along with various and sundry planks and posts. Her boat had sunk at the dock so all in all it was a rough day. Along the shore from Forest Bay to Sabbath Day Point the waves beat against the shore. Beaches were eroded, docks broken loose and washed away. Boats broke loose - some completely destroyed. The wind velocity hit gusts to 54 mph and stayed around 40 mph all day. Blown over trees kept the power out for 7½ hours! It was the wildest day I have ever seen on the lake and certainly ever hope to see. The only "good" thing about it - there were no black flies for a few hours.

Almost time for the big fishing tournament. Lots of activities planned.

I've been thinking about what I read about the terrific record the bass fishermen have regarding the mortality rate of the bass they haul in. I wonder if anybody made a study of the number of fish that die "after" they are thrown back. For days after the tournament we seem to have more than the usual quantity of dead fish washed up on shore. Perhaps it is just a coincidence.

The flowers in town have all been planted. Frank Swinton planted the circle at the intersection and also along the brook. The town crew did the Town Hall window boxes and the Carillon Garden Club, with help from our local Girl Scouts, planted the flowers in the

park and at the Chamber of Commerce booth. The flowers really brighten up the town.

You can't imagine how strange the old school looks now - or should I say the lack of it. The town crew worked on getting everything out of it before Spark Huestis came with his bulldozer to push it down. It made for very interesting watching. Maybe by the time you get here for your vacation it will all be down and cleaned up.

It is hard to believe, but in the course of cleaning out the school, two steel beams were removed. Somehow, in the dark of night, these two beams got up, climbed the fence (the gate was locked) and slowly got away. Very strange! Sure would be interesting to know what happened to them. What is left of the school is being sold to anybody who wants to buy. Bricks are being sold for 5¢ each.

Remember last fall when the Park Commission recommended getting something done about the septic system since the toilets were not working. Some things never change. On the first weekend of the season that the park was open the toilets were still overflowing!

More and more of our summer friends are returning. Won't be long before you'll be home. I can't wait!
