SILK AND SALVAGE - A STORY OF A COLLABORATION

This is the story of my three-and-a-half-year collaboration with Bay Area quilt maker Sue Fox. Together we created stunning silk quilts and drew inspiration from our shared projects that fed our own, solo work.

This one-hour lecture, trunk show and Q &A session shows Silk and Salvage collaborative quilts as well as my own work. We'll discuss the pros and cons of working with other quilters and examine the way that contrasting styles and working methods can spark creativity.

Lighthouse Quilters Guild Guild Meeting August 30, 2021 Zoom Virtual Meeting

The guild welcomed Rosy Petri from Milwaukee, a quilter who has used raw edge applique to create imaginative quilt portraits of Black performers, sports stars and political figures. Rosie loves to use vibrant colors and unusual fabrics in her quilts, which she stretches over canvas so that they can be hung. Rosie's quilts have been shown at the Racine Art Museum and in public buildings in Milwaukee and elsewhere in the country. Rosie's quilts can be seen at: thisisparadisehome.com. She has also made postcards and prints of her portraits.

Guild members also discussed the holiday party and concerns about planning it in the midst of re-emerging Covid concerns. We will need a minimum of 40-50 members to be able to offer this event. It was decided that we would reconsider whether to go forward with the event at the October Guild meeting.

There was also extensive discussion of the lack of Guild members who have volunteered to take on leadership roles in the Guild when current board members' terms end in December. Several members insisted that we find ways to continue the Guild, even if there needs to be modifications in activities in coming months. There is enough money in the budget to continue Guild programs and host the Quilt show next year. Regina Scott Brooks asks the board and Guild members consider whether the Quilt Show should be held if no one steps forward to lead in 2022.

Nancy Gruenewald of Menomonee Falls earned a first place ribbon and \$75 for her entry into the Wisconsin State Fair. The award is granted by our guild to a first place quilt that incorporates outstanding artistic endeavor and skill in hand applique and is hand or machine quilted.



Cares and Concerns

Jeanne Steidtman has resigned her position as hospitality co-chairman for personal reasons. The board accepted her resignation and thanks her for giving of her time. While this does not create an immediate need, the position is open for the potential return of meetings held at the church in 2022.

Judy Martin has been acting secretary this year, and will be unable to complete her term this year for medical reasons. The board extends wishes for a speedy recovery. A volunteer to fill in for her would be welcomed.

Important Message From Your Board

When the board met on September 13, a few key issues were discussed. Please review and come to the September meeting prepared to discuss further options.

- 1. The current board has served beyond the term limits set out in the organization bylaws. Laura Sanders has volunteered to pick up the position of Membership Chairman. Kirsten Weiss has agreed to help set up programs for our meetings for 2022. Some positions remain vacant at this time. A few of the members will remain in their positions until they are filled. We meet via Zoom now and will continue to do so for convenience, meaning you may not need to get out and drive at night. Each member of this organization should take a turn at fulfilling a leadership role.
- 2. The holiday party will not be held as planned in November. With the ongoing pandemic, it is not feasible to plan an indoor gathering that may need to be canceled at the last minute. Collection of reservations and money could get complicated.
- 3. The membership form will be published in the October newsletter. It is imperative that everyone who desires to continue membership will need to submit a form with a check for dues. Although we may not meet at the church in the immediate future, funds are needed to maintain the Zoom subscription and operating expenses. We need to determine the actual number of the membership. Membership grants you access to the Zoom presentation on meeting night.
- 4. This organization is open to all who propose the art of quilting and meet for mutual interest and sharing of our talents. The board expresses a desire to expand our organization to include all fiber artists in the membership.
- 5. Everyone is affected by the ongoing pandemic in some capacity. The board understands the impact on the membership, but also stresses the reality that your board members are also feeling some of the same concerns that keep the membership from getting more involved.
- 6. Virtual meetings are not as much fun as the fellowship of sitting with your friends, but consider the opportunities we have to hear and learn from outstanding speakers from all across the world. This takes less planning as the in-person gatherings where we share wonderful treats and the fruits of our quilting sessions.
- 7. In planning the 2022 meeting programs, the board discussed scheduling only the lectures. Any workshops associated with the lecture would be announced; members would schedule the workshops themselves. Rationale: Anyone can go online and select a workshop presented by a featured speaker or any other topic of interest. Members can share what they attended through the Show and Tell part of the meeting.
- 8. Attendance at the Zoom meetings averages less than one half of the membership. The board members have no way to determine how many active members we have or the interest level of the offered programs. Not everyone is comfortable or "computer savvy" enough to join the meetings remotely. We are as eager as the rest of the group to meet in person again.
- 9. It is possible for all of us to work together to maintain this organization; it is not the responsibility of the board members alone; we are here to lead the group, and welcome all input from the membership.

The World's largest quilt is the AIDS Memorial Quilt. This is an activist project started in San Francisco as a way to document the pandemic of AIDS in America. The small group of friends and families soon grew, as they quilted panels with names of those who have suffered from AIDS. There are more than 48,000 panels. It weighs approximately 54 tons! Over two million people viewed the quilt over the weekend of October 11-13, 1996 in Washington, D.C.
