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'Onomatopoeia'! What a new word! I remember back in grade school English class when I heard that word for the first time, I loved it. Even if we kids didn't know what it meant, we loved saying it! An 'onomatopoeia' is a word that actually 'sounds out' what it means. Its own sound as read out will define itself. Often, people may not even call an 'onomatopoeia' a word. They may just think you are dramatizing with your voice what you are trying to say. For example, when you hear someone say, "I'm not going into the crawl space, because I heard something down there 'hissing'". We all understand 'hisssssss' by its sound (It means trouble-a snake!) Or we don't have to guess what sound a 'Cuckoo' Bird clock makes. Or how about the old Batman & Robin TV shows that used so many 'onomatopoeia' words sanitizing the fight scenes by flashing 'Bam' and 'Pow' across the screen. Again, we know the meaning of these words just by their sound alone. I think Jesus is using an 'onomatopoeia' word today in this gospel story of a deaf-mute man who is healed by Jesus. The Deaf-Mute man learns to hear and speak by the touch Jesus' hands and Jesus' voice. The word Jesus used is 'Ephphatha!' from the Aramaic language. It means 'Be opened'. And Jesus does just that, to the man's ears and mouth (He opens them). Since the man hasn't heard sounds through his ears ever, or for years in his life, he naturally cannot speak audible words (he can't hear to compare or adjust his speech and enunciation). So Jesus, being the 'personal-touch' Savior He is, He ensures contact with the man by not only pressing his finger into the ear canal and touching the man's tongue (creating a circuit-so the man will feel the vibration of Jesus' voice) but also by speaking a 'universal' word (onomatopoeia) that mimics the sound of clearing one's throat passage (that is why Mark emphasizes Jesus' spitting first). Then, 'Ephphatha'! To speak that word echoes the guttural sound of getting something up and out of one's throat. To draw a picture, let's imagine it similar to the sound of a cat expelling a hairball (I know 'Yuck'- Hey, there is another onomatopoeia itself!). Before we feel turned off by such 'mucus mechanics', please note that Mark tells us in 7:33 that Jesus 'took the man off by himself away from the crowd." So, all of this happened in the private encounter of Jesus and the man alone (& whoever told Mark). So often, we see Jesus engaging people in such personal terms, creating one-on-one encounters and working to make every word and action tailored-fit to that person in front of Him needing it. So, I think Jesus pulls the man away from the crowd to help the man not be 'blown away' by loud crowd sounds when his ears are finally opened (similar to being blinded when turning eyes at night to a flashlight beam or when walking out of a movie theater in daytime). But that is our compassionate, understanding Jesus! The paradoxical question that remains after this healing account, though, is that once Jesus opens the man's ears

The paradoxical question that remains after this healing account, though, is that once Jesus opens the man's ears and mouth, he immediately ordered him not to tell anyone about the healing (Mk 7:36). He can finally speak, and Jesus asks him not to speak! But, this feature of Jesus downplaying his miraculous works, which is uniquely emphasized in the gospel of Mark, is more a matter of Jesus avoiding the 'news circles' of daily spectacles and drama (not wanting to show up on a catchy segment of 'Entertainment Tonight'). There is a time and a place for all things. Jesus does want the Good Word out there, but not as a flashy, hourly news headline but as the eternal 'Good News' of God's Kingdom. Jesus will send the apostles and disciples out on informational missions and Kingdom work later on (Luke 6:12, 10:1). Jesus is handling this miracle much like he handled the miracle at Cana in John's gospel, when he told the Blessed Mother apparently in front of others, "How does that concern affect me? My hour has not yet come" (John 2:4). Of course, Jesus does respect His mother's concern and He handles the need out of public view (only she and the waiters seem to know what Jesus performed-John 2:9). Perhaps His comment to her out loud, was to humbly take attention away from Himself as the source of the miracle in that moment of 'high drama'-no wine at a major festivity-being past 'last call at the bar' without ever having announced such to the celebrating crowd-that could have been a scene! But Jesus' call for silence (especially for a healed mute) about His miracles does make us scratch our heads, until we reflect upon helpful and unhelpful attention and news related to God's will and God's timing. But for sure, those touched by Jesus know! Peace, Fr Brian
