



October 14, 2018 Twenty-Eight Sunday in Ordinary Time Mark 10:17-30

Dear St. Pius X and St. Anthony Church Family,

Have you ever asked a question and immediately began to regret ever asking it? Maybe as you are leaving a friendly home visit to welcome a new neighbor, you ask going out the door, 'Do you need any help settling in?' To your surprise, he says back, "Yeah, we are about to deep clean the bathroom and basement, do you have some time?" Then we think, "Well, I didn't mean that wide-open an invitation?" I think the man in the gospel feels that way, regretting that he asked Jesus, 'What else might I do?" He had just boastfully told Jesus of his long history of faithfully living all the commandments. And he volunteers for more! (What did they teach him in the army about that?) So, Jesus adds 'Oh, okay then, the next level is for you to go sell everything you have, giving it to the poor'. But that is too much; because the man walked away sad. Our hope is he returned to Jesus, but we do not know. I think it is likely he came back, because notice the gospel said 'Jesus looked at him, loved him and then said 'Go, sell everything....' (Mark 10:21). Jesus did not just 'say something back', but he 'looked and loved him' and then responded. What was going on in those extra moments of 'looking and loving'? I trust that by Jesus' extra look and careful glance to him, it was His knowing way of easing the 'hard landing' of the man. Jesus was giving him the strengthening grace to face his personal truth that his riches owned him instead of him owning his riches. Are they his 'possessions' or do they 'possess' him? Jesus knows they control him. But Jesus conducts this 'divine intervention' to help the man face the fact that He is addicted to luxury and fame. Even the man's religious duties are only being done to 'popularly look good' to other people. Appearances and material success control the man. He is too caught up in how he looks in the eyes of other people, keeping up with worldly standards instead of just living for God.

The apostles seem just as challenged by Jesus' radical call to divest themselves from clinging to material security and riches, because later they ask Jesus about the 'eye of the needle' story. A lot can be said about this proverb of Jesus, but I simply point out that camels were the pack mules of the desert. They carried baggage. They were already a large animal. To get them through any passage, required them unloading first, then passing through the gate, and maybe picking up the load again on the other side if necessary. Maybe like at KY Lake Dam, when a tug-carrier of four wide barges needs to reposition their load down to two barges wide to lock through the dam. They may even need a taxi tug to carry the released load on through behind the original tug. Jesus' parable may be as simple as that: We have to be willing to unload baggage in this life, to receive greater good in the life to come. This weaves well with what Jesus tells Peter, after being told the apostles have sacrificed so much already. Jesus says, "Amen, I say, there is no one who has given up house or brothers or sisters..... or lands for my sake....who will not receive a hundred times more now in this present age... & eternal life in the age to come. (Mark 10:29-30)

More than anything, Jesus is testing our willingness to trust him and divest ourselves of all our assets, ambitions and agency to rely fully on Him. Holding back nothing and hiding nothing for our own selfish use, actually frees us to fully serve him and receive abundantly all that he desires to give us. We have to make the room though, by opening up, to receive what he has in store for us! I have to open my hand in order to receive what he desires to place in it! And most of all, I will realize that what Jesus gives is so much more than anything I already had! What we cling to in our supposed riches is only 'peanuts' compared to the feast that what God wants to share with us. Jesus says in Luke 6:38 "Give and gifts will be given to you...... For the measure with which you measure will in return be measured out to you." In our daily prayer, let's ask God without regret, "Is there anything I can do for you?"
