From the Desk of Rabbi Daniel Polish

What are we to make of Purim? Clearly it is a holiday unlike any other on our calendar. It is a foolish holiday. We celebrate it with a complete absence of seriousness or sobriety. It is has no connection to the cycle of nature or to the agricultural calendar. It is the only one

of our festivals that celebrates purported events which are wholly unconnected to the land of Israel. It is a diaspora celebration.

And it resonates with events that Jewish communities around the world have experienced too many times. Its story is of a community of Jews secure and integrated as a minority in the land they called home who suddenly find themselves destabilized, their very presence begrudged them and their lives threatened. Dark forces rise in power, gain the ear of the king, and are filled with malice towards them. Now the Jews are in peril. The ground has shifted beneath their feet. Well could they tremble. And perhaps we should tremble as we read of their plight.

And yet the story of Purim is not told to incite self-pity or fear. Quite the opposite. After all, look at the way we celebrate it. It is a story of assurance. In the end, the dark forces do not triumph. Indeed, by the conclusion of the story they are hoist on their own petard. The evil they had intended for the Jews now befalls them. Facing the threat, the Jews, as would be expected, engage in religious acts, calling for divine protection. But also they know that their salvation can come "from another place". That Jewish community survives because they take matters into their own hands. Rather than wait passively to be saved, they act. And in acting they redeem themselves. By their own deeds they save themselves from destruction and tragedy. The happy ending that we celebrate on Purim is the fruit of their own effort.

As I said, Purim is all foolishness. Surely nothing about this story relates remotely to the realities of our own experience.

MUSIC SABBATH ON MARCH 3rd-"HOT OFF THE PRESSES"

So many of us attend synagogue for comfort and solace. I like to think that the musical renderings of our liturgy add to one's ability to find Sabbath 'peace' and introspection. Many of us find that very comfort in familiar tunes. It can be jarring to hear new melodies and there is not a Cantor in existence that hasn't heard, "why can't we just sing the 'regular' tune?".

So, what about those 'regular' tunes? Yes, there is a great deal to be said for that which we know. It is easy, it washes over us and through us, like an old friend. We know how it goes, we know how it sounds in our voice and, we know we like it that way. It can be hard to learn another melody to the same text, and, you may ask yourself, why should I?

I am here to tell you that the vast treasury of Jewish music exists because throughout the generations Jews have always utilized new melodies and compositions. From art music to folk tunes, Jews have continually incorporated the music of their surroundings and lent it to the experience of the synagogue. I have to chuckle at how many of you recently sent me the U-Tube video of the *Adon Olam* prayer sung to the tunes of the Broadway hit, "Hamilton".

However, this is a long standing Jewish tradition. The songs of the synagogue should not be stale. Just as our Rabbis continue to grow through their new interpretations of sacred texts, so do we in learning the newest iterations of Jewish melodies. Our Reform movement is particularly adept in fostering and publishing new melodies for the synagogues. Many of those melodies come from the widely successful Reform Jewish camping movement, but others are more complex compositions that come from Jewish musicians and composers primarily from the US and Israel.

On **Friday night, March 3rd**, we hope to bring you some of these new tunes. Some of the tunes have been slowly introduced into our congregation but we will take the opportunity to teach them to you (slowly!). I hope you will join us and have an open heart and mind to what's new and contemporary in Jewish prayer today.

"IN THE DARKROOM" by Susan Faludi

"In the summer of 2004 I set out to investigate someone I scarcely knew, my father. The project began with a grievance, the grievance of a daughter whose parent had absconded from her life. I was in pursuit of a scofflaw, an artful dodger who had skipped out on so many things—obligation, affection, culpability, contrition. I was preparing an indictment, amassing discovery for a trial. But somewhere along the line, the prosecutor became a witness."

So begins Susan Faludi's extraordinary inquiry into the meaning of identity in the modern world and in her own haunted family saga. When the feminist writer learned that her 76-year-old father—long estranged and living in Hungary—had undergone sex reassignment surgery, that investigation would turn personal and urgent. How was this new parent who identified as "a complete woman now" connected to the silent, explosive, and ultimately violent father she had known, the photographer who'd built his career on the alteration of images?

Faludi chases that mystery into the recesses of her suburban childhood and her father's many previous incarnations: American dad, Alpine mountaineer, swashbuckling adventurer in the Amazon outback, Jewish fugitive in Holocaust Budapest. When the author travels to Hungary to reunite with her father, she drops into a labyrinth of dark histories and dangerous politics in a country hell-bent on repressing its past and constructing a fanciful—and virulent—nationhood. The search for identity that has transfixed our century was proving as treacherous for nations as for individuals.

Faludi's struggle to come to grips with her father's metamorphosis takes her across borders—historical, political, religious, sexual--to bring her face to face with the question of the age: Is identity something you "choose," or is it the very thing you can't escape?

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Susan Faludi is a Pulitzer Prize-winning journalist and the author of *The Terror Dream*, *Stiffed*, and *Backlash*, which won the National Book Critics Circle Award for Nonfiction. A former reporter for *The Wall Street Journal*, she has written for *The New Yorker*, *The New York Times*, *Harper's*, and *The Baffler*, among other publications.

Morse School Tzedakah Project



<u>An Urgent Request from the Social Action Committee</u> <u>Tzedakah for a Morse Elementary School Family</u>

We received a specific request for help this week from the social worker at the Morse School. A mother of 4 children attending the Morse School has just been able to reunite her family of 4 children. She is a single parent struggling with minimal hours in a minimum wage job and also trying to meet the care needs of her 4 young children. She has just found a 2-bedroom apartment. Mom sleeps on the couch in the living room. The 3 girls share a room and the son has his own room. They really need beds and dressers. A set of bunk beds would be ideal since 3 twin beds won't fit into the girls' room. They also need curtains for privacy, bed linens, towels and any household items.

The children and mom also need clothing. These are their sizes:

- -for 6 year old girl- pants size 7, shirt medium, shoe size 3;
- -for 8 year old girl- pants size 8, shirt medium, shoe size 4;
- -for 9 year old girl- adult women's pants size 10, shirt xl, shoe size 9 women's.
- -for 10 year old boy- pants size 12, shirt large, shoe size 8.

We still need to find out what mom needs but we know she wears a size small. She is really focused on her children's needs right now.

The steering committee of the Jewish Social Action Coalition is putting this out to each of our congregations hoping that we can provide this family with a new start. If you have any of these items in good condition that you can donate, this is a great way to recycle things you are no longer using and help a family create a home.
