## Kindergarten

We are "March"ing into a new month with visions of spring in our heads. We have been spoiled by the beautiful weather and hope it is a preview of what is to come in spring. The children are progressing very nicely and we are thrilled with their progress.

We are continuing with our third unit, "The Power in Our World". We have been working on Creating word families using the short vowel sounds. Please encourage your child to think about these word families as they are writing. For example, if you can spell cat, you can also spell rat, mat, hat, etc. When reading with your child at home, encourage them to share the reading strategies introduced in reading groups-Eagle Eye, Lips the Fish, Stretchy Snake. These will help your child as he/she continues on their reading journey.

In math, we have begun our study of subtraction. We are learning how to separate a whole into groups to find the difference. We are also working on adding groups of objects.

During science and social studies, we are studying weather and its patterns. We look forward to learning about Maryland weather and how to prepare for different types of weather.

## First Grade

March is always a "meaty" month of learning. Our first graders will be working extra hard to get ready for second grade by mastering those necessary first-grade skills. Please continue to support good work habits by completing nightly

nomework assignments. Flash cards are a great way for children to memorize and master both addition and subtraction facts to 20. Helping the children with the basics will make it easier as they progress. They are aVailable at all dollar stores and well worth the cost or you can make your own with your Child's help!

For social studies and science, we have been working on the theme: I am curious about how to share ideas. In Unit 2: The Science of Sound -The students have discovered that sounds are created by vibrations and that the sounds Can be soft/Ioud or low/high. We have modeled how sound waves travel and how different musical instruments make sound. In the rest of this unit, the students will determine the difference between noises and music, as well as how sound travels distances to communicate a message.

Look out spring!! The first graders will be working on an exciting unit about BUBBLES!!

In math, students will continue to explore and understand how to compare two-digit numbers using their understanding of place value. They will also be subtracting multiples of ten from multiples of ten, using their understanding of place value. As the unit continues, students will partition circles and rectangles into halves and fourths, which will lead to an understanding of how to tell time to the hour and half hour (on an analog and digital ClOCK). There will also be a very exciting unit about geometry where we will learn all about the properties of shapes.

We will try to go outside daily at recess, but the weather can be fluky. Dressing your child for the daily forecast will allow the children to enjoy recess and hopefully avoid illness.

## Second Grade

We know that we are lucky teachers to have such great students and families! We continue to "March" on! We have just finished up our Theme 3 Unit 1: Environmental Stewards. Students learned ways to protect their environment. They enjoyed researching various habitats around the world. As a culminating activity, students made a diorama of a habitat. They turned out beautiful! The students really expressed their creativity. Some students decided to display their work in the media center for others to see.

Now we've moved on to our next unit, Storytelling. Second graders are already discovering ways to tell stories through dance, art, drama, music, and language. Throughout this unit, students will explore Native American culture. We will also enjoy reading folktales and fables.

Our geometry unit is over and students have completed the Checkpoint Assessment. We are pleased with their progress! Please continue to encourage your child to use math vocabulary and describe solid and plane shapes throughout their environment. Our next unit in math is adding and subtracting numbers within 1,000 with and without regrouping. Students have started by using base ten blocks to represent three digit numbers and drawing models. It's important that students have a strong understanding of place value. They should practice breaking apart numbers. For example, 345 is really $300+40+5$.

Last but not least, reading comprehension homework and/or fluency is due on Fridays. Most students are turning in their assignments. Please double check with your child. These activities are designed to reinforce reading standards that have been taught in class and to give the students additional practice answering questions by referring to text details.

As always, thank you for your continued support. We're ready to SPRING into new learning in March! Second Grade Team

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Third Grade


Wait! March already? Aye! LUCK o' the Irish to all our wee lads and lassies and their mums and dads during this return of the green (spring- FINALLY!) month! We will be working really hard to be sure to have covered topics that might be seen in PARCC, along with its interesting vocabulary and question formats. With any LUCK, we should be able to show our district that Windsor Farm third graders rock when it comes to learning! So kiss the Blarney Stone and wear the green, get out the four leafed clover and wish us LUCK in April when we take the PARCC!

In reading, we will continue to work on theme three. We will use literary and informational text to engage in exploration of extreme behavior in people and in nature. Students are also focusing on different types of poetry. We will compare and contrast the themes, determine the central message, lesson, or moral and distinguish their own point of view from that of the narrator of those of the characters.

Students will be learning and using researching techniques and various resources to gather and report information about an animal of their choice. It is a fun, high interest unit and we know the students very much enjoy it. Of course, we continue to also read novels and non-fiction regularly, both as a class and independently so students can hear fluent reading and become so themselves.

We will also be following the Iditarod, "The Last Great Race", so you will probably hear your child talking about mushing and using some vocabulary like Gee and Haw. We've each chosen a musher to follow in the race and some students may want to get their parents involved with the race, too. It's pretty exciting! And no one can resist the cuteness and strength of those dogs!

In math, we continue to learn about fractions. Reading, writing, using fractions, comparing fractional amounts, improper fractions, placing fractions on a number line, and using a ruler with fractions will all be tested on the PARCC, so we are spending instructional time making sure our students have the basics down. We'll continue to infuse using the four operations and practicing our facts. Problem solving with multiple steps still tends to be a problem for many students.

Please have your child practice this skill daily, and remind them to look for key words to know which operation is being asked for.

There are still lots of things to learn and we will be as busy, busy, busy as leprechauns this month.

We all feel we are so LUCKy to work with your students!

## Grade Four

As we begin March, the $4^{\text {th }}$ grade team is hoping spring is around the corner.

We continue to work on fiction and non-fiction types of stories. The comprehension skills learned will be theme, character analysis, author's purpose, drawing conclusions and author's perspective (RL

## 4.1- RL 4.9-Literary) and (RI.4.1-RI.4.9-

Informational). Grammar instruction will focus on adjectives and articles. All students will continue to participate in advanced learning strategies such as Socratic seminar and higher level questioning. They will be exposed to the Jacob's Ladder program and they will use components of the William and Mary program.

This month in math, students will continue to learn about measurements. Students will be exposed to customary and metric measurements. They will need to be able to convert measurements as well. Also students will be learning about Area and Perimeter. It is important for students to continue to practice their mastery of basic facts as content becomes more challenging. One way to help your child with math is to have them use the First in Math website.

In science, we will explore the topics of electricity, circuits and magnetism. Students will discuss conductors, series and parallel formations, and physical properties of magnets. The "Big Ideas" we will investigate is how electricity and magnetism affect our lives.

Students will continue their study of Maryland. In Unit 3 and 4 we will discuss the War of 1812 and the changes in the United States. Content will focus on the time period from the 1800's to the present.

Looking to the future, $4^{\text {th }}$ grade will be taking a field trip to Annapolis on May $16{ }^{\text {th }}$. More information will be coming home in late March. Thank you

Fourth Grade Team

## Grade Five

Math- In Unit 7, students will be working with coordinate planes. They will learn to use a pair of perpendicular number lines, called axis, to define a coordinate system, with the intersection of the lines (the origin) arranged to coincide with the 0 on each line and a given point in the plane located by using an ordered pair of numbers, called its coordinates. Students will learn the names of the two axis and how the coordinates correspond (e.g., $x$-axis and $x$ coordinate, $y$-axis and $y$-coordinate). They will understand that the first number indicates how far to travel from the origin in the direction of one axis, and the second number indicates how far to travel in the direction of the second axis. Students will then move on to represent real world and mathematical problems by graphing points in the first quadrant of the coordinate plane, and interpret coordinate values of points in the context of the situation.

In Unit 8, students will recognize volume as an attribute of solid figures and understand concepts of volume measurement. They will then measure volumes by counting unit cubes, using cubic cm, cubic in, cubic ft, and improvised units. To do this, they will understand that a cube with side length of 1 unit, called a "unit cube," is said to have "one cubic unit" of volume, and can be used to measure volume. They will also understand that the notation of cubic unit is written with an exponent of 3. (e.g., in3,m3) From there, students will move on from concrete to abstract and understand that formulas are more efficient ways to find volume. Throughout the unit, students will relate volume to the operations of multiplication and addition and solve real world and mathematical problems involving volume.

Reading-Fifth graders are lucky to have some amazing books to read this March! In the ALPS single subject class, we will kick off March by beginning a William and Mary unit with literature circles focusing on the cyclical pattern of change. Students in the Exploratory Trail classes will be continuing guided reading with a variety of novels and nonfiction texts, including informational texts, biographies, realistic fiction and fantasy stories. Our StoryWorks Magazine will provide some high interest selections on the history of television, a debate on allowing chewing gum in school, and a fiction story about treasure found on a beach. March's Interactive Read Alouds will focus on understanding poetry, and will include works by Longfellow and Whitman.

Writing ~"To drink or not to drink...chocolate milk...that is". That is the question fifth graders will
need to answer and support this month. The students will focus on argumentative writing. They will need to develop their thesis and support that thesis with facts, evidence, and quotes. One of the most challenging concepts the students will encounter is to thoroughly explain what the quote means and why it is relevant to their thesis. In addition, they will need to include possible counterarguments. Once again, this is a process in which we will work on step by step.

Social Studies - We will begin our BizTown lessons in preparation for our March $31^{\text {st }}$ trip. JA BizTown is part of the Junior Achievement program. While visiting JA BizTown, each student will become a town citizen and assume a job in one of the town businesses. Students will experience economics first-hand by producing and/or selling products, receiving a paycheck, working as a member of a business team, repaying a business loan, shopping, and managing a personal bank account.

Science- We are wrapping up our unit on motion by discussing and applying Sir Isaac Newton's Three Laws of Motion. We will then discuss how motion is observed and measured in light.

## Band and Strings


ur spring orchestra and band concert will be on Thursday April 20th here at our school. We will begin our evening concert at 7pm. If you can help your child to remember to bring their instrument to school this will really help them to succeed. Students who forget to bring their instrument to school on their assigned days are still required to attend class and participate. There are also a number of students who are not bringing their instruments home. I really need your help to get your child to bring their instruments to school and take them home to practice. This is the most difficult issue I face each year. In beginning strings we are now working on quarter note, eighth note, and half note rhythms in our books on pages 20-25. We will continue on to learn the notes on the G string on pages 26-27 and then onto a review of $3 / 4$ time on page 28 in our books. Intermediate and advanced strings students are now starting to practice concert songs along with sight-reading and warms ups in our purple books. Please have your child remember to bring their purple book 2 with them every class. We use these books to work on skills that all students need to enhance their understanding of key concepts: music theory, technique, playing in tune, dynamics bowing etc. all used in our concert songs. We have begun practicing our concert songs in class. Beginning band students have increased their range to include concert pitches Bb , C, D, Eb, F, G and low A. We are using warm ups in our books on page 18 along with rote echoing of pitches to develop ear training skills. Advanced band has already started working on concert pieces. In March we will begin before school rehearsals for all groups. I will make sure to get this schedule to you well in advance so that you can plan ahead. She notes that kids' career focus is strongly influenced by adults' ideas of what is "best," and that these can be based on unconscious gender and class bias. "We want our children to have opportunities to build on their strengths, explore their passions and be empowered to solve problems that matter to them." Dr. Martin quotes education expert, Jaime Casap, who urges, "Don't ask kids what they want to be when they grow up but what problems they want to solve." Guide children toward those workplaces of the future by asking:

Investigador Educativo y Profesor, Dr. Katie Martin, compartió sus ideas para hablar incluso con los niños más pequeños de sus sueños de carrera en este mundo rápidamente cambiando.
