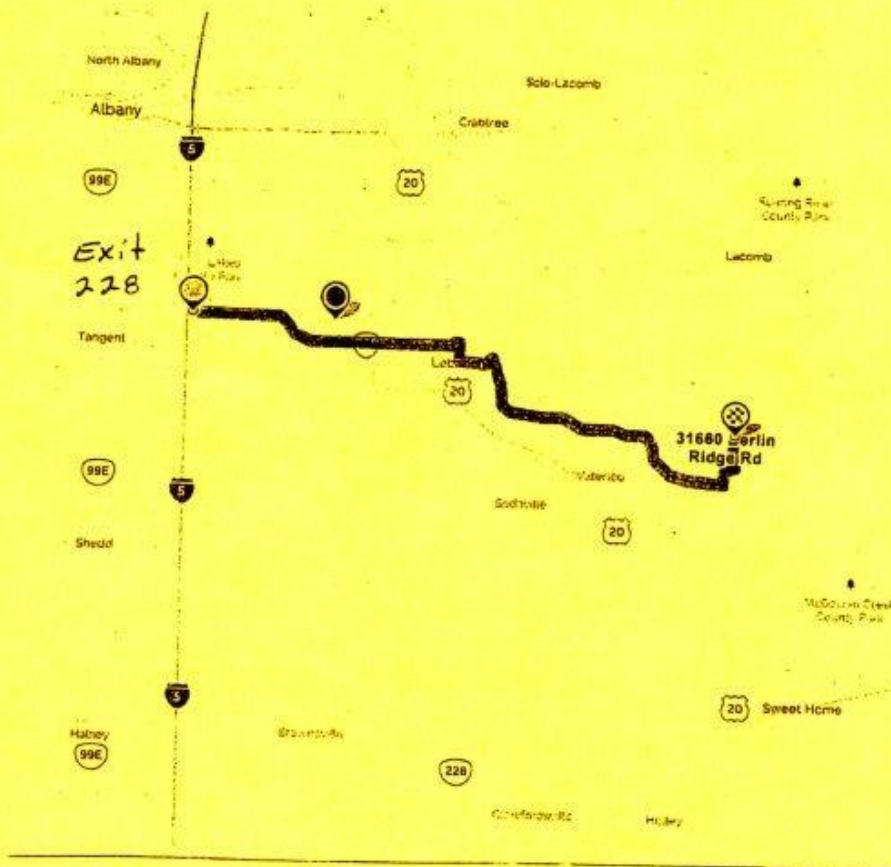

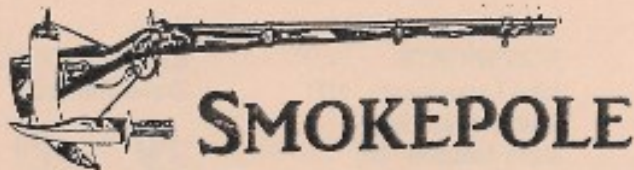

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE by Walt Evens

I hope everyone is doing well! Especially with the warm weather.

It looks like the country is getting back to "normal", whatever that is. I've heard that places like movie theaters will be opening back up in the near future. Many of us have already received, or will be soon, the Covid vaccination.

As I mentioned last month, look for the many Rondies scheduled for this year. I'm sure Melody will have them listed in the newsletter.

NOTE: We're moving forward with our outdoor encampment/shooting events. We'll be having a work party on Saturday, April 17th, meeting at the Walmart parking lot in Cottage Grove at 9:00 a.m. Then caravan out to the spot. Mostly we'll need tools for clearing brush and cutting up fallen trees in preparation for a Trail Walk. We can also discuss the best ways to set up and utilize this space. I checked ahead and if the weather doesn't change it will be partly cloudy with a high of 57 degrees.

LOCATION OF THE WORK SITE: This is an old rock quarry named Silverstairs, for a nearby creek. It is located on the south side of Patterson Mountain. The best access is from Cottage Grove, as the route is paved except for the last 3 miles. The second access is from Hwy 58, on a gravel road over Patterson Saddle, with a higher elevation.

From Cottage Grove: take the north exit from 1-5, left past the Village Green to Walmart, on the right. Continue east on Row River Road. Either road around Dorena Reservoir is fine as they rejoin above the lake. Stay on Row River Road past Culp Creek. At Disston there is a fork; go left onto Road 17 (past Rujada Campground) about 17 miles to the junction with Road 1790 (this is where the road from Hwy 58 meets the pavement). Go right on Road 1790 about 2.6 miles to Road 726. Turn left on 726 for 3 tenths mile to spur Road 803, left on 803 down into the pit.

From Hwy 58: Patterson Mountain Road (Road 17) turns off Hwy 58 between Mileposts 24 and 25.

Bring a chair, lunch and drinking water. It's exciting to be finally working on developing a trailwalk and camp site.

MARCH SHOOTING MATCH by Walt Evens

There were folks we hadn't seen since the whole Covid thing started. It was nice to see some old familiar faces.

Jim Eikenberry put on a really fun and challenging match. The first paper target was filled with colored clay pigeons. The larger ones were lesser points and the smaller ones higher. You had a total of 5 shots.

The third one was an elimination using a gong. Each shooter got to take a shot but all those watching were allowed to whoop and holler as much as they wanted to distract the participant. It didn't take as long as we thought it would. We finished up a little earlier than usual but I don't think we could have squeezed another target in without going over. It was a beautiful day with plenty of sunshine. Everybody seemed to have a great time.

A SALUTE TO ASTORIA

On April 12, 1811, a party of men set out across the treacherous Columbia River bar in a launch provisioned for the construction of a fur trading post. After several days of considering both sides of the mouth of the river, they had decided upon the south bank, above a small bay at Point George, named by George Vancouver in 1790.

While the men settled a camp and selected a site for the fort, their ship, the *Tonquin*, crossed the difficult bar and came into the bay. She was greeted by three volleys of musket fire and replied with three cannon salutes. Then the men set to the task of clearing the site of huge trees, tangles of lesser growth and rocks. It was agreed that the fort be named Astoria, in honor of John Jacob Astor, who had sent the men there to establish his Pacific Fur Company post.

On April 12, 1986, at the site of Astor's fort, three musket volleys were fired, and from the water's edge below answered the cannon, three times, echoing not among the huge trees of the *Tonquin's* day, but among splendid Victorian houses, with carefully groomed yards and commercial and public buildings. Below, traffic hurried along Highway 30, some of it bound for a marvel the adventurers would not have believed possible, a four mile bridge reaching from Oregon to Washington. Beneath the bridge passed enormous ships, carrying goods like their predecessors of two centuries, headed resolutely for Portland, some 100 miles upriver. The fort had decayed long ago, but a city now stood in its place. Astoria was 175 years old and celebrating.
