Beloved Partners in Ministry,

As March begins we find ourselves in the middle of our Lenten journey. Through the different voices and perspectives lifted up in our weekly worship monologues we are hearing about how God's will has worked in the lives of some of our Biblical ancestors. Wrapped up in these stories from the past, we are reminded of the ways in which we

continue to seek God's will for our lives, and for our community of faith.

Weekly in worship (and daily for many), we pray to God using the words of the Lord's Prayer. This prayer that Jesus taught to his disciples is a treasured example of how we are to pray and what we are to pray for. It reminds us to pray for the needs of others, to forgive as we are forgiven, and to seek God's will and God's kingdom.

Reverend Ellsworth Kalas is the author of the study our adult Church School class is reading through this Lent. He tells us that included in the Lord's Prayer, is a complaint. Like many of the Psalms found in our scriptures, the Lord's Prayer includes a lament that the world is not what it should be, not the way that God has intended for it to be.

When we pray: "Your kingdom come. Your will be done," we recognize that this world does not reflect the realm of God, and we are praying for God to do something about it. We are praying for God to make this world more like the kingdom. This is a dangerous prayer for us to pray because it requires something of us. For this world to reflect God's kingdom and God's will, we've got some work to do.

Kalas says that when we pray for God's kingdom to come, we are making our own commitment to the kingdom, and we are seeking God's help in bringing others to this commitment. Jesus' parables about the kingdom offer us a glimpse of what the kingdom of God is like...full of peace, justice, and love. That's what we have to reflect in our own lives and communities, that kingdom of God that we long for to be here and now.

Over the next few weeks of Lent, I invite you to take up a new Lenten discipline: To daily make God's kingdom visible. This will look different for each of us, but through acts of kindness and service, prayers for peace and justice, and gifts of our time and talents, we can make this world more reflective of the kingdom of God. And so we pray: "Your kingdom come. Your will be done on earth as it is in heaven."

Amen.

IS IT A COLD—OR THE FLU

Your body aches, your throat burns, your nose is stuffed, and you're coughing like mad.

ASK YOUR DOCTOR

DO I HAVE A COLD OR THE FLU? The speed and intensity of your symptoms can give you clues to which respiratory ailment you have. Colds come on gradually and are more mild. Flu symptoms start suddenly and can wipe you out.

SHOULD I GET A FLU TEST? A rapid flu test from your doctor can quickly determine if you've caught the flu with a swipe of your nose or throat. But results aren't always accurate.

WHAT CAN I TAKE TO HELP ME FEEL BETTER? Rest is the best prescription for respiratory ailments. Pain relievers and decongestants can ease symptoms while you recover. Antiviral drugs treat the flu, but you need to start them within 48 hours after your symptoms begin for best results.

HOW CAN I AVOID GETTING SICK IN THE FUTURE? To keep colds and flu germs away, wash your hands with warm water and soap or use an alcohol-based hand sanitizer. Put extra distance between you and anyone who coughs or sneezes. And get the flu vaccine every year.

10 WAYS TO DEAL WITH A COLD OR FLU

FLUSH IT OUT—use a clean neti pot or other nasal irrigation device to ease your stuffy, runny nose. **SLEEP IT OFF**—quality sleep gives your body the opportunity to fight infection, so get plenty of rest. **GET STUCK**—guard against the flu with an annual flu shot. Get yours today.

AVOID ANTIBIOTICS—they can't fight cold and flu viruses, so don't take them.

CALL IN SICK—don't share your illness with others. Instead, stay home and get better.

ENHANCE IMMUNITY— eat well and exercise regularly to help prevent colds and flu.

GET HELP— call a doctor if you have trouble breathing or you've been sick more than five days.

ACT FAST—take a prescription anti-viral within 48 hours of getting the flu to ease some symptoms. **HANDS OFF**— Cough or sneeze into a tissue or your sleeve, not your hands.

KEEP IT CLEAN—Clean and disinfect surfaces you frequently touch to stop the spread of germs.






