Great Lent is the longest fast of the Armenian Apostolic Church and will encompass all of March this year. Yet Great Lent (Uto Juhp/Medz Bahk in Armenian) is not merely a period of fasting, but rather is a **penitential** period, a time set aside for us to reconcile ourselves with one another and with God. Penance, one of the **sacraments** of the Armenian Church, has a negative ring to our contemporary ears. At its heart, though, penance is the process whereby Christians recommit themselves to God and to each other, to contemplate their lives and the place of God in them, and ultimately to be reconciled with God. Of course, as Christians, we know that the ultimate reconciliation, the sacrifice of the Son of God, Jesus Christ, on the Cross and His Glorious Resurrection three days later has already occurred. As individual Christians, baptism is our acceptance of that ultimate reconciliation. However, we all surely know that, as St. Paul says, we all sin and all fall short of the Glory of God—even after our baptism. Penance, then, is the thoughtful, meditative process by which we reconcile ourselves to God and one another even in the full knowledge of our salvation through baptism by the Resurrection of Christ.

It is no coincidence that the longest period of penance in the Armenian Church calendar, Great Lent, leads us directly to Easter. If Easter, the celebration of Christ's Resurrection for the forgiveness of sins, the healing of the whole world, and our reconciliation with God is the ultimate reconciliation, it makes sense that we should undertake our own process of reconciliation, of penance, to help us prepare for the great mystery of salvation at Easter. This dynamic was intimately understood by the early Church. Often, in the first centuries of Christianity when many adults converted and needed to be baptized, their baptism would happen on Easter. The period of Lent leading up to Easter was, for these "neophytes," both a time of penance and a time of instruction. What would it mean to be a Christian? How should one act after baptism? What, exactly, is that great mystery of God-become-Man, dying on the Cross, triumphing over sin and death through the Resurrection, for the salvation of the world?

Catechism is the name we give to this preparatory instruction before baptism. Perhaps we think of catechism as a distinctly Catholic practice—many of our friends probably took catechism classes as children leading up to their first communion—but the idea of catechism has a long history in the Armenian Apostolic Church as well. According to the historian Agathangelos, whose *History*

PARISH COUNCIL CORNER

This year, our parish will celebrate another anniversary. In Yettem, we cherish the opportunity to celebrate anniversaries.

Our church was the fifth Armenian church established in North America and the third in California. First was Our Savior Church in Worcester, Massachusetts in 1889, followed by Holy Trinity in Fresno in 1895, Holy Cross in Union City, New Jersey in 1899, and St. Gregory the Illuminator in Fowler established in 1902 and consecrated in 1910. St. Mary Yettem was established in 1909 and consecrated in 1911.

On June 12, 1945, the first wooden church that served this community well for many years was destroyed by fire. Although tragic, plans were made immediately to rebuild an even better church. Construction started in 1946 and was completed in 1947 – SEVENTY-FIVE YEARS AGO. During this coming year we will share more information about the building of the magnificent church sanctuary that we appreciate today that was consecrated on November 16, 1947.

The architect selected to design our current church was Lawrence Cone. Lawrence Karekin Condrajian was born in Istanbul on July 20, 1888. In 1911 he emigrated to the United States. He changed his last name to Cone in the mid-1920s. In 1912, a Fresno architect encouraged him to design the Holy Trinity Armenian Apostolic Church. Cone was Fresno's first Armenian architect. Holy Trinity Armenian Apostolic Church was the first church built in the tradition of Armenian church architecture in the United States.

Armenian church architecture has long been recognized as the first church architecture to reflect a unique style. In designing this church, Cone followed very closely the style of old Armenian churches in Armenia and Turkey from the fourth to seventeenth centuries. (Etchmiadzin Cathedral, 4th century; St. Hripsime church, 7th century; and Aghtamar Holy Cross church, 10th century)

Although there are older churches in the United States used for Armenian services, Holy Trinity, and St. Mary Yettem are unique in that the older churches were either existing church structures not built for Armenians or built by Armenians with no reference to Armenian church architecture.

St. Mary Yettem is indeed unique in many ways!



NATURE AND FASTING

In the fifth century, the Armenian Catholicos Hovhannes Mandakuni wrote a beautiful treatise called "On Love and Sanctity Whereby Creatures Prosper." There, he compared the fruit from the Tree of Life to communion, the Body of the Lord Jesus Christ. Filled with the images of flowing water and green, blooming, life in the Garden of Eden, Mandakuni's text connects the importance of fasting to the renewal not only of our souls but to the health of the whole world.

While we often think about fasting in connection to deprivation, or perhaps with St. Gregory the Illuminator as a process that helps calm the storms of our lives, there is another line of thinking about fasting in the Armenian Church: one that focuses on renewal. Remarkably, this renewal is described not just as a relationship between humans and God, but as a renewal of the whole world!

On Wednesday, March 9th, Dr. Christopher Sheklian will give a talk on "Nature and Fasting" following the Peace Hour in the sanctuary of St. Mary Armenian Church of Yettem. The is a meditation on our Lenten practice of fasting and the connection of fasting to nature and the renewal of the whole world, drawing on the ancient wisdom of the Armenian Church.



ACCIDENT

On Saturday February 5, 2022, shortly after most of the participants left the Ladies Society meeting, a drunk driver slammed into the northeast corner of our sanctuary staircase.

The driver was traveling at a high rate of speed southbound on Road 144 and failed to notice the stop ahead and a car waiting at the intersection. The driver then swerved further to the East blowing past the stopped vehicle, across Ave 384, plowing through the cyclone fence and bushes and then coming to an abrupt stop when hitting the cement steps leading into the vestry. A female passenger in the vehicle was taken by ambulance to the hospital for a broken foot. The unlicensed and uninsured driver was not injured and was arrested with a blood alcohol level of .15.

The Parish Council will be working with our insurance company (\$1000 deductible) to authorize and then make the necessary repairs. We will also continue our work with Caltrans to plead for additional safety measures to protect our property.

Ladies Society Featured Member Bea Míkaelían Soxman

Beatrice (Anahid) Mikaelian Soxman was born May 11, 1941, in Visalia, California. Her parents were Hacher and Takouhi Mikaelian, who themselves were from Chomaklou, Turkey, coming to Yettem to be among so many of their compatriots from the same village. Bea was their youngest child. She spent her childhood on the family farm in Monson helping box raisins, irrigate, as well as other farmer chores. She could be seen, at the age of 9, driving a tractor to the Monson store to pick up items there.

Bea attended Armenian School in Yettem, the Monson-Sultana School, and Dinuba High School. She played clarinet in the Dinuba High Band. She could always be found attending the Yettem Sunday School classes. She sang in the church choir and was a member of ACYO. After high school she attended Fresno State College and graduated in 1964 with a major in business. While at Fresno State she met Jim. Romance blossomed, and they were married in the St. Mary Armenian Church, Yettem, shortly after graduation. The couple both started teaching at Orosi High School three weeks after the wedding.

Jim and Bea welcomed two daughters, Donna in 1969, and Tracy in 1971. Bea took the next few years off from teaching to care for the girls but returned to teach at Mt. Whitney High School in Visalia. When Golden West High School opened, she moved there to become Business Department Chairperson. She finished her educational Vocational career as Director/Administrator for the Visalia Unified District. Bea was always a strong supporter and advocate for vocational education. She has shelves full of awards and certificates of recognition and appreciation for service to students and the schools. These honors come from the California Assembly, Visalia School District, Golden West FFA, and others for her work in advancing career education for students.

Her leadership talents were not confined to education. The church was the main recipient of her dedication to serve. She was a Sunday School Superintendent, a member of AGBU, Mr. and Mrs. Club, Ways and Means, Ladies Society, and of course, the Parish Council. She served many years as Parish Council Chairperson and could always be found at church functions making sure everything went well.

Bea's extended family are pillars of the Yettem community. Her mother Takouhie was sister to Haig Sheklian. Bea has admirably followed in her footsteps and carved her own path along the way. She brought her husband Jim Soxman into the fold, and he has embraced the Yettem community and church and contributed in incalculable ways. Her daughters Donna and Tracy continue her legacy.

How fortunate we are to have Bea among us all these years. Beatrice Anahid Mikaelian Soxman was truly an Armenian Daughter of Yettem.



of Armenia provides the details of the well-known story of St. Gregory the Illuminator and the conversion of Armenia in 301 A.D., the first mass conversion of Armenians to Christianity was preceded by a long sermon of instruction given by St. Gregory: a catechism! This catechism, one of the foundations of Armenian Christianity, is available as a stand-alone English translation by Robert Thomson, published by St. Nersess Armenian Seminary as *The Teaching of St. Gregory.* Reading the foundational catechism of the Armenian Church during the penitential period leading up to Easter would make for a beautiful Lenten practice.

Early Armenian Christian theologians understood the intertwined importance of catechism and penance in the period leading up to Lent so well that they did something quite remarkable with the Armenian Church calendar. Every day of the year there is a set of readings from the Bible. The calendar of readings sets the Gospel reading we hear every *Badarak* on Sunday, but it also has readings for the rest of the days of week. During Lent, there is a beautiful extra devotional practice hidden just under the surface of the daily readings. For many of the days of Lent, the daily Bible readings are the same readings used by the fourth century Bishop of Jerusalem, St. Cyril of Jerusalem, in his own Catechetical Lectures. These sermons, delivered during Lent of 349 A.D., are the most famous example of catechesis, preparing people for baptism on Easter, in the history of the Christian Church. When the early Armenian translators and theologians set the Armenian calendar, they embedded the readings St. Cyril used for his sermons in the calendar of readings for Lent. So, in addition to The Teaching of St. Gregory, we have another possible devotion for Great Lent: we can read the sermons of St. Cyril of Jerusalem, alongside the Bible readings for the day, on the day of Lent when those readings are given Calendar. found in the Armenian Church St. Cyril's sermons can be online (https://www.newadvent.org/fathers/3101.htm) or in several nice, published books. May all our Lenten journeys be fulfilling, as we prepare ourselves, through catechesis and penance, to encounter the great mystery of salvation, the Resurrection of Our Lord Jesus Christ on Easter Sunday!
