

To amend Federal Law as it deals with identifying nationalities of its citizens.

The Nationality and Official Language Act of 2017

Effective Jan 1, 2019, all terms used to identify the heritage of its citizens will be eliminated from all Federal forms that are designed to be completed by its citizens. For example, terms such as Hispanic, Spanish, Non-White, Caucasian will no longer be allowed. In its place will be two choices: U S Citizen and Non-U S Citizen. The sole exceptions shall be federal medical forms and federal census forms.

All forms of written, audio and visual communications, forms, signs and documents, distributed by, or on behalf of, federal agencies meant for consumption by the general public within in the United States shall only be available in English. Exceptions shall be within confines of an official U. S. port of entry, written forms required for entry into the United States and treaties or other official documents with foreign governments, copies of which may be in any language.

English is declared the official language of the United States.
