**MY AMANA SOCIETY EXPERIENCE**

With the Fourth of July fast approaching, I know many of us are looking forward to fireworks over the Lily Pond. This piqued my curiosity about the pond so I set out to see what I could learn.

My first call was to our Conservation Officer, Jon Deegan. Jon took over the Conservation Officer position from Marc Phelps last September. Prior to that, Jon was a State Trooper in Williamsburg for 31 years, and part of his job was flying planes for the Department.

Jon and I talked about the diverse wildlife around the 150-acre pond. Otters, beavers, raccoons, bullfrogs, turtles, bull snakes, and muskrats are just some of the creatures that call the lake and its surrounding shores home.

The birds, though, most often steal the show. Pelicans and Blue Herons arrive every spring. Ducks (Mallards, Pintail, and Coots), geese (Canada, Snow, and Greater White-Fronted), and swans (Tundra and Trumpeter), as well as Gulls and Terns move through the Colonies putting on a spectacular show.

Otters were re-released by the Department of Natural Resources in 1987 to great effect. The Trumpeter Swan is another success story. Amana Forestry and the DNR released two mating pairs in 1997 and like the otters, their natural populations have mostly rebounded. Swans weigh an average of 30 pounds and were once Iowa's largest native waterfowl. They are now considered migratory birds, but maybe one day that will change. Random fun fact - a group of flying swans is called a wedge.

How the lake came to be and how the lilies (actually classified American Lotus) got there is a bit of a mystery that I will continue to research and hope to report on in the future. Spoiler alert - it's fascinating.

I especially want to thank Bruce Trumpold for taking the time to talk with me. I could not have written this one without his kind assistance.

**RUEDY BOOK -- FINALLY: A MANUAL ON HOW TO HANDLE CANCER**

Shirley Ruedy now has a book on Amazon, titled "Finally: A Manual on How to Handle Cancer." It is a collection of 70 of the 400+ columns she wrote over a span of 16 years as cancer columnist for The Gazette in Cedar Rapids. She is the wife of George Ruedy, formerly of Middle.

Shirley is a three-time cancer survivor and says readers trusted her because she had been "in the trenches," having had the three diagnoses and surgeries, chemotherapy and radiation. In all, she played in many roles, including that of patient; caretaker (of her terminally ill mother and brother); volunteer (counseling 176 women who had had breast cancer surgery), and journalist, interviewing top doctors and researchers here and abroad.

The book largely addresses the emotional aspects of cancer, rather than the science. Shirley, to her astonishment, found that what readers were really hungering for was to learn how to handle their emotions in all the different situations that arise in the cancer experience. So the book is not only for the patient but for the caretaker, the friend, the family member, the adult child, the neighbor, the co-worker.

The column was well accepted by both the lay and medical communities. In all, Shirley garnered 30 journalism, health and civic awards from local, state and national groups, one recognition being the Courage Award, given to her in the Rose Garden of the White House, as part of an anniversary celebration of the American Cancer Society.
