The Sheltie Seanachie is the Club's Monthly Newsletter. It provides a forum for sharing information, discussing issues concerning the breed, and club activities.



PVSSC: Class Is In Session



DO you feel you don't have the time or skills to train your dog, or do you think training is expensive?

Join us at our April 16, 2018 when the program will be on TRAINING. We will show you how training doesn't take a lot of time and can be FUN

Cathie Skoog will present an overview of several "positive" canine dog training theories in preparation to "begin" training our dogs at meetings. The goal is to demonstrate how easy it is to train our dogs and how much fun it can be for us AND our pets. At each meeting we will learn a couple of new manners/skills or tricks. The training will culminate at the end of the year with dogs earning their AKC Canine Good Citizen and AKC Novice Dog Trick Titles. The CGC and Trick Titles go at the end of your dog's name.

Following the discussion on positive training techniques, we will begin training. So bring your dog's favorite treats and join us at our next meeting, on Monday, April 16.

Cathie has been a member of PVSSC since 2004. She is an AKC Canine Good Citizen and Trick Test Evaluator, an AKC Farm Dog Certification Judge and a WCRL Rally Judge. She is a member of the Association of Professional Dog Trainers (APDT). Her dogs enjoy being trained and hold titles in obedience, rally, agility, herding, Barn Hunt, Course Ability and FastCAT.

The purpose of the PVSSC training is much more than passing the AKC CGC Test and earning Trick Titles. Most Shelties enjoy being trained. Shelties are a working breed and one of the more intelligent breeds; through training our dogs are happier, more alert and a bond is created with owners by working as a team. We want to help those interested in training by dedicating time to this important topic.

CANINE GOOD CITIZEN (CGC):

Dog owners strive to have a dog that is a joy to live with. A dog that is well-mannered at home and in the community. The AKC's Canine Good Citizen (CGC) program provides a good starting point for all dogs.

The CGC test is a nationally recognized program that instills a sense of responsibility and good manners in dogs and owners alike. The test consists of the following practical exercises:

1. Accepting a friendly stranger

4. Walking on a loose leash

8. Reaction to another dog

2. Sitting politely for petting

5. Walking through a crowd

9. Reacting (or not reacting) to a distraction

3. Appearance and grooming

6. Sit and down on command

10. Supervised separation.

7. Come when called

Dog Trick Titles: On May 1, 2017 the AKC launched the Trick Dog Program, in conjunction with "Do More with Your Dog!"

Trick training encourages "people to integrate their dogs into their lives in different ways through <u>positive training</u>" and provides exercise, mental stimulation and hopefully is a fun and rewarding experience for the dog and handler.

There are four levels of titles. Each level builds on the previous level and as a dog advances the levels have more difficult tricks:

- AKC Novice Trick Dog (TKN) The dog performs 10 tricks from the Novice list. If a dog has a Canine Good
 Citizen (CGC) certificate or title on record at AKC, it can do 5 Novice tricks (CGC + 5) to earn the Novice title.
- AKC Intermediate Trick Dog (TKI) The dog must have the Novice title, plus perform 10 Intermediate tricks.
- AKC Advanced Trick Dog (TKA) The dog must have the Intermediate title, plus perform 5 tricks from the Advanced list.
- AKC Trick Dog Performer (TKP) In this title, handlers perform a short routine with at least 10 tricks previously learned.

AKC OFFERS RALLY CHAMPION TITLE (RACH) AND Two New Rally Titling Classes



The AKC made significant changes to its Rally Program that became effective November 1, 2017. These were the first changes to the program since its launch in 2005.

Besides making changes to the signs and adding new exercises, the AKC added three new titling classes: Rally Intermediate (RI), Rally Master (RM) and RALLY CHAMPION (RACH) – pronounced ROCK.

- RALLY INTERMEDIATE (RI): Previously after earning a Rally Novice Title (RN) the next step is to move to the Advanced (RA) class. Often times dogs aren't quite ready to move to the Advanced level, not because they can't do the exercises, but rather in Advance the dog is off-leash. With the establishment of Intermediate, now exhibitors have the option after Novice of entering Rally Intermediate or Advanced. The new RI class is for dogs that have won the Rally Novice title, but have not yet earned a qualifying score in the Advanced class. The Intermediate course is the same as the Advanced course but does not have a jump and the dog is "on" leash. Dogs do NOT have to earn the RI title prior to entering the Advanced class. To earn the RI title three qualifying legs must be earned, as with Novice, Advanced and Excellent Classes.
- RALLY MASTER (RM): The Rally Master Class is an exciting, new class with an increased level of difficulty. Ten (10) Qualifying scores must be earned to receive the RM Title.
- RALLY CHAMPION (RACH): To earn the RACH title, the dog/handler team must earn 20 triple qualifying scores at the same trial in Advanced B, Excellent B and Master, in addition to accumulating 300 points. Points are calculated by a dog's score in each class/trial. At least 200 points must be earned from the Rally Master class.


Mollie earned her OPEN Barn Hunt Title (RATO), placing FIRST and was the HIGH SCORING DOG in the Open Class.

TEMPERAMENT TEST AKC THERAPY DOG

Mollie and Savannah passed the Temperament Test (TT) given by the American Temperament Test Society, Inc (ATTS).

Mollie and Savannah enjoy going to visit seniors at Assisted Living Homes and the goal is for them to become certified Therapy Dogs.

WHAT IS A TEMPERAMENT TEST? A canine temperament test evaluates a dog's temperament and behavior in a variety of situations based on a standard test and observing the dog's reaction.

The following is taken directly from the ATTS website:

The ATTS test focuses on and measures different aspects of temperament such as stability, shyness, aggressiveness, and friendliness as well as the dog's instinct for protectiveness towards its handler and/or self-preservation in the face of a threat. The test is designed for the betterment of all breeds of dogs and takes into consideration each breed's inherent tendencies.

The test simulates a casual walk through a park or neighborhood where everyday life situations are encountered. During this walk, the dog experiences visual, auditory and tactile stimuli. Neutral, friendly and threatening situations are encountered, calling into play the dog's ability to distinguish between non-threatening situations and those calling for watchful and protective reactions.

Failure on any part of the test is recognized when a dog shows unprovoked aggression, panic without recovery, or a strong avoidance

Please note: Dogs must be at least 18 months old to take the ATTS test. Shelties are shy by nature so if you decide to test your dog, please make sure your dog is able to take the test without getting stressed. Mollie is 10 and Savannah is 7. Two years ago, Savannah would NOT have passed the test if she had taken it. I did NOT sign Annie up for the test, as she would have been frightened. Before you sign up for the test, review the test criteria and assess YOUR dog. If you have any questions, contact Cathie Skoog.

AKC Therapy Dog Program

WHAT IS A THERAPY DOG? Therapy dogs tend to be friendly, affectionate, gentle, and confident in all situations. They enjoy human contact and being handled, petted and sometimes in clumsy manner. The primary role of a therapy dog is to make physical contact with people by providing love and comfort to people in long-term care, hospitals, retirement homes, schools, mental health institutions, or stressful situations like natural disaster areas.

The AKC has an **AKC Therapy Dog Program**. The purpose of the program is to recognize owners and dogs who have given their time by volunteering as a therapy team. The recognition is in the form of AKC titles based on a number of visits.
