#### From Trauma to Addictions International Critical Incident Stress Foundation Monday, 02 August 2021 10 AM – 5 PM and Tuesday, 03 August 2021 8 AM – 5 PM

Explore the relationship between exposure to traumas and the often resulting addiction. Individuals who work in the "helping professions" are statistically at a greater risk for developing addictions. The use of alcohol, drugs and other activities as a means of self-medicating overwhelming job-related stress and chronic exposure to emotionally charged events is often common place. Taught by Dr. Ed Hatcher.

# Managing School Crisis - Theory to Application International Critical Incident Stress Foundation Wednesday, 04 August 2021 10 AM -5 PM and Thursday, 05 August 2021 8 AM -5 PM

Designed to prepare administrators and educators for the inevitable crises that occur within schools and/or that effect those in schools, this training reflects the 3 most common phases of a crisis: pre-crisis planning, acute crisis response and post-crisis activities. Special attention is given to the most common pitfalls associated with crisis response activities. Taught by Dr. Ed Hatcher.

#### Youth Mental Health First Aid (1 day class) Friday, 06 August 2021 8 AM – 5 PM

Youth Mental Health First Aid is designed to teach parents, family members, caregivers, teachers, school staff, peers, neighbors, health and human services workers, and other caring citizens how to help an adolescent (age 12-18) who is experiencing a mental health or addictions challenge or is in crisis. The course introduces common mental health challenges for youth, reviews typical adolescent development, and teaches a 5-step action plan for how to help young people in both crisis and non-crisis situations. Taught by a combined staff.

### Essentials of Emergency Service Chaplaincy 06 and 07 August 2021 8 AM – 5 PM

This course provides the foundation for Fire/Rescue/EMS chaplain service and teaches an established and credentialed system of protocols in order to provide chaplaincy to emergency service workers and the public. Participants must be members of FFC to get course credit. This class provides the initial requirement for Basic Chaplain Certification for the Tennessee Federation of Fire Chaplains. Taught by combined academy faculty.

The TFFC cooperates with the Federation of Fire Chaplains on a national level, providing automatic membership and networking with the addition of a state-wide certification and accountability system for chaplains.

The Federation offers programs that provide its members with educational opportunities in training conferences and materials.

The network of mutual support offered by the TFFC helps disseminate and share information with other chaplains.

Assistance is given to fire/EMS/rescue organizations to start or improve their chaplaincy programs.

- TFFC is non-denominational, nonsectarian, with no compromise on individual convictions.

#### **Benefits to Members**

- Written materials designed to help chaplains implement and sustain effective programs.
- Four newsletters each year to keep chaplains current in their field.
- Educational opportunities offered to chaplains in annual conferences and regional meetings.
- A Fire Chaplain Directory provided to all members to provide a network of mutual support and information sharing.

#### **Membership**

#### **Membership Qualifications**

- Appointed to the chaplaincy by a fire/EMS/rescue service agency
- Endorsement by their religious body for the ministry as a chaplain
- Currently serving as an emergency service chaplain
- \$100.00 annual dues

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#### **Chaplain Certification**

The Tennessee Federation of Fire Chaplains certifies qualified chaplains for service with a "Standard of Care" recognized state-wide.

#### **Qualifications for Certification**

- Qualifications for membership above
- Ordination or an approved plan of guidance providing clergy supervision for those chaplains without ordination
- Completion of 16 hour basic chaplain's course provided by either the Tennessee or National Federation of Fire Chaplains
- Completion of Individual Critical Incident Stress Management course provided by International Critical Incident Stress Foundation
- Familiarization with the appropriate service through 70 hours of validated emergency service cross-training
- NIMS 100, 200, 700 & 800 completion
- Continuing Education of 16 hours/year

#### What Emergency Service Chaplains Do

Fire/EMS/Rescue chaplains may perform some or all of the following duties:

- Counsel emergency service workers \*
- Counsel family members of emergency service workers \*
- Visit sick and injured emergency service workers at home and in the hospital
- Make death notifications
- Provide assistance to victims of crisis
- Teach emergency service workers in areas such as stress management, ethics, family life, and victim response.
- Serve as part of a Critical Incident Management Team
- Assist at the emergency scene
- Serve as liaison with other clergy in the community
- Provide for the spiritual needs of department members and their families
- Offer prayers at special occasions such as recruit graduations and award ceremonies
- Provide a listening ear
- Coordinate and provide family services in the event of the serious injury or death of an emergency service worker
- Serve as a ready resource for the chief or agency director
- \* (only within the scope of their training)
