




Radnor Races

Help sorting and organizing orders was provided Mr. Cady, Mr. D, Mr. Dondaro, Dr. Motel, Ernie, Mr. Hornickle, Mr. Pizzuto, Mr. Rothberg, Mr. Sao, Mr. Shea, Mr. Siegle, Mr. St. Clair, and Mr. Wark. Mr. Fox, who worked on the flower sale website, observed that, "We couldn't have done the sale without the help of the volunteers. They are very much appreciated!"

Due to improvements in the sorting process, unloading took only two hours and the assembly of scout orders took an additional four hours. Compared with previous years, which turned Jim Fox's hair gray, this improvement was a huge headache reducer. Our new checkout system was added to try to ensure that each scout got the correct plants saving their parents an extra drive back to the cabin. We hoped to reduce the time spent pondering why an order has three extra Better Boy tomato plants and one missing oregano plant.

This year we saw a significant increase in online ordering. Customer feedback was largely positive for viewing plant pictures and ordering at their leisure from their phone, tablet, or directly from the scout. For selling, each scout got credit toward their future scouting trips.

Please Donate to Chester County Council Friends of Scouting (FOS) Campaign

Chester County Council is in the midst of our 2019 Friends of Scouting campaign. "FOS" raises a significant portion of Council's operating funds. Consider the following as you think about contributing to Friends of Scouting:

- ALL of your contribution stays right here in Chester County Council. This is an important point to underscore particularly as the media bombards us with news that Scouting's National office is considering filing for bankruptcy protection.
- Council receives no funding from National. Chester County Council is financially completely self-funded. We fund the salaries of our professional Scouters, utility fees for the Council office, license fees for training materials, and funding to bring Scouting to children in Chester County who could not otherwise afford to participate.
- FOS is the key Council operating budget fundraiser that is supported by Troop 78. In the past, the Troop made the decision not to participate in Council's popcorn drive, which is another important source for Council operating income. Accordingly, it's essential that Troop 78 have high participation in the FOS campaign.

While Troop 78 is one of the top unit contributors to FOS, most of that contribution comes from a small group of donors. The fact is that most families that have been involved with the Troop for five years or less do not contribute to FOS. My request is simple: Whether you can contribute \$10 or \$1,000 to FOS, we need every Troop 78 family to participate in the drive.
