What happens when the lessons stop.......Doug Stickler

We all get there at some point. Maybe as a child or teenager it becomes apparent to everyone that we just aren't interested anymore. Or as an adult when we don't seem to be progressing, or funds are running low, or other things take priority and there just isn't enough time to practice.



When we stop taking lessons does that mean we've reached the end of our musical journey and this is as good as we're ever going to get? Maybe. There's nothing wrong with that and many musicians are fine taking that approach. Some of the accordion players I've known over the years stopped taking lessons in high school and never returned to the instrument. Others stopped and essentially reached the peak of their playing abilities. They were happy with where they were at and had no desire to press on to the next level.

For those that are fine with where they are at, that's great. Music at whatever level and in whatever form can bring us and others great joy and that's really the main point of it all. However, I can't help but think there's more out there, more joy, happiness, and satisfaction, if we just push ourselves to take the next step. For me, I couldn't just keep playing Charles Magnante's arrangement of Malaguena over and over again for the next 45 years and feel like that's as good as it gets. I also didn't want to constantly have that deer in the headlights look on my face and feeling in my stomach when put in front of a group of people and asked to play.

So, what's our next move after the lessons stop? We have options, and being a club member should give us opportunities to take advantage of those options. In some cases, we want to get better but don't know how. Maybe we just need copies of Palmer-Hughes books 8, 9 and 10. Or we could use someone objective and more experienced to tell us what they think about our playing and where we can improve. In many cases it's just a matter of having played through all of our available music and we're now ready to move onto something a bit more challenging. These are all problems where I think the solution is with our club members. I can't speak for everyone, but I have music to share and advice to give if someone wants to hear my opinion. I'm also open to hearing suggestions from others on how I can improve. I've never been very good with a bellow shake, so maybe someone can tell me how they learned.

We also have musicians who want to go in a direction that their lessons never took them, and that's in learning how to play by ear. The challenge there is knowing where to start. I was fortunate enough to have a teacher who showed me a few things before I stopped taking lessons. That was my starting point and I just kept going from there. At club meetings I've seen John Martin offer suggestions on how to get started. There are many things you can do to get started playing by ear. Talk to either John or myself and we'll share with you what we know. You might surprise yourself and find your confidence building and nervousness receding at club performances once you've developed a little ear training. You'll no longer be so focused on the music in front of you and will have the knowledge to know how to fake it if you lose your way when following the notes.

What I'm doing now with my music never would have been possible if I hadn't progressed after I stopped taking lessons. Many of the people I play with are much better than me, but they are generous with their support and encouragement, patient and tolerant of my mistakes, and constantly inspiring me through their own playing to become a better and more complete musician. Let's make sure we keep doing that for each other at every club meeting.
