



Sunday Reflection – Nineteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time

The dramatic incident on the sea of Galilee revealed Peter's character more fully than others (Mt.14:22-33). Here we see Peter's impulsiveness - his tendency to act without thinking of what he was doing. He often failed and came to grief as a result of his impulsiveness. In contrast, Jesus always bade his disciples to see how difficult it was to follow him before they set

out on the way he taught them. A great deal of failure in the Christian life is due to acting on impulse and emotional fervor without counting the cost. Peter, fortunately in the moment of his failure, clutched at Jesus and held him firmly. Every time Peter fell, he rose again. His failures only made him love the Lord more deeply and trust him more intently.

The Lord keeps watch over us at all times, and especially in our moments of temptation and difficulty. Jesus assures us that we have no need of fear if we trust in Him and in his great love for us. When calamities or trials threaten to overwhelm us, when pandemic and fear of death hover us, how do we respond? With faith and hope in God's love, care and presence with us? Let us pray: Lord Jesus, help me to trust you always and to never doubt your presence and your power to help me. In my moments of doubt and weakness, may I cling to you as Peter did. Strengthen my faith that I may walk straight in the path you set before me, neither veering to the left nor to the right.



St. Clare of Assisi

Tradition says that St. Clare's father was a wealthy representative of an ancient Roman family and her mother was a very devout woman belonging to the noble family of Fiumi.

As a young girl, Clare dedicated herself to prayer. At age 18 she heard St. Francis of Assisi preach during a Lenten service and

asked him to help her live according to the Gospel.

Clare refused to marry, as her parents wished, and fled to the Porziuncola Chapel below Assisi. While there, Clare's hair was cut off and she was given a plain robe and veil in exchange for her rich gown.

She received her vows in 1212, and then began the Second Order of St. Francis - the Poor Clares. Many joined Clare, including her sister St. Agnes of Assisi, and soon the Poor Clares were housed in the church and convent of San Damiano, near Assisi. Clare became abbess there in 1216.

Besides its "privilege of perfect poverty," forbidding the ownership of property even by the community, Clare's order is noted for its apostolic aim: she considered its penitential prayer life a spiritually vitalizing force for church and society. This view was shared by the popes and by the grateful citizens of Assisi, who credited Clare with twice saving their city from destruction.

She was credited with other miracles in life and after death. In 1958 Pope Pius XII declared her patron of television, citing an incident during her last illness when she miraculously heard and saw on her wall the Christmas midnight Mass which was held in the basilica of San Francesco located on the far side of Assisi.

St. Clare is also the patroness of eye disease, goldsmiths, and laundry. She is often pictured carrying a monstrance to commemorate the time she warded off the soldiers at the gates of her convent with the Blessed Sacrament.

We will celebrate the Feast of the Assumption on Friday, August 14, at 6 p.m. There will be no 9 a.m. Mass that day.


You can register for the 6 p.m. Mass the same as you would for other days.
