After graduating from Wahlert High in Dubuque, where he played baseball for the Golden Eagles, Steve attended Loras College before earning his degree in education from University of Northern Iowa in Cedar Falls. He taught for a couple years in a small parochial school before moving on to the Shellsburg Community School District. He was a phys. ed. and social studies teacher and coached baseball, basketball and track at Shellsburg. He ultimately became the Athletic Director there.
